TAFT IN DEPEW'S PLACE

ELECTED MEMBER OF THE
YALE CORPORATION.Chinese Minister Credits Secretary
of War With Running-the
Government.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., June 27.—Two thousand Yale alumni sat down to the annual alumni dinner in University Hall this afternoon at which President Hadley announced that Secretary of War William H. Taft had been elected a member of the Yale corporation, to succeed Chauncey M. Depew, whose eight-year term had expired. The announcement of Secretary Taft's election was received with great applause. President Hadley then announced the total of the alumni fund of the year as \$126,237 against \$52,500 a year ago. Sir Chen Tung Liang Cheng, the Chinese Minister, in thanking the university for bestowing a degree upon him, said it would not only be a source of sincere gratitude to the Emperor of China, but a stimulus to hundreds or even thousands of Chinese students to come to Yale for an education. He said he would ever be proud to be a son of Yale, if only an adopted son. He looked upon Yale as a National Institution, because "a Yale man practically runs the National Government" (referring to Secretary Taft). Among the honorary degrees bestowed by Yale University at the commencement exercises today were those of doctor of laws on Sir Chen Tung Liang Cheng, Chinese Minister at Washington, and Benjamin D. Magruder, Justice of the Supreme Court of Illinois. The programme of exercises followed closely that of previous years, except that in reference to a protest which had been made, the hymn "America" was substituted for the Lutheran hymn beginning, "A mighty fort-

ress is our God." This hymn and Psalm lxxv, to the York tune, have been on the commencement programme for more than a century, the York tune having been sung at the opening of the college in New Haven in 1716. The change is said to be based on sectarian grounds.

Degrees Awarded at Harvard.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 27.—Accompanied by all the pomp and ceremony characteristic of similar previous occasions, the 27th commencement exercises were held at Harvard University today. The recipients of degrees today were 317, not including the honorary degrees or degrees out of course. Only graduates of 25 and more years' standing were admitted to seats for the exercises in Sanders' Theater, reserved for the alumni. Among the honorary degrees conferred was Doctor of Laws, Ethan Allen Hitchcock, Secretary of the Interior. Secretary of the Navy Charles J. Bonaparte was the presiding officer at the Alumni Association meeting. It was voted to amend the constitution so as to make eligible for membership in the association men who have received degrees from the law, scientific and graduate school of the University.

BILLS NOT COUNTERFEITS

Made for a Georgia Bank That Is
Now Defunct.

SALT LAKE CITY, June 27.—It developed today that the \$1000 in bank bills found in the shoes and neckties of Edward Cook and Thomas Rowley when they were arrested last night were not counterfeit. The bills were legally printed for a Georgia bank, now defunct. Originally the bills were printed on but one side of the paper. This defect had been remedied by pasting them back to back. The charge of attempting to pass counterfeit money will be dismissed and the charge of obtaining goods under false pretenses substituted.

FORTY FEET TOO MUCH

BURTON SAYS NEW YORK HAS
MUCH LESS.Survey of Coos Bay Will Probably
Be Provided for in the
Next Bill.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 27.—Senator Fulton, with other Pacific Coast Senators, has been flooded recently with letters demanding the passage through the House of the Fulton resolution authorizing the survey of the entrance of Coos Bay, with a view to providing a 40-foot channel across the bar. Senator Fulton again took the matter up with Chairman Burton, of the House rivers and harbors committee, today, and was told, as on previous occasions, that the resolution will not now or hereafter be reported. Burton says it is absurd to talk about a 40-foot channel at Coos Bay. New York harbor does not have that depth, and Hamburg, Germany, one of the world's greatest harbors, has only 32 feet. Burton says Coos Bay has no population or commerce to justify a 40-foot channel, and for that reason he never will consent to such a survey. When the river and harbor bill is framed at the next session, the survey of some reasonable channel may be authorized. Senator Fulton today brought about the passage through the Senate of a bill creating the United States District Court in China, with a full complement of court officials. Before adjournment the bill will be signed. It having already passed the House. This is the bill which J. H. Brown, of Portland, has been pushing. In the main conference on the pure-food bill Fulton's amendment was adopted prohibiting misbranding of canned salmon. After January 1 it will be unlawful to mark and sell as Columbia River salmon

any salmon not taken in water of that stream.

Public Building for Baker.

WASHINGTON, June 27.—The Senate public building committee today told Senator Fulton it would agree to appropriate \$75,000 for a public building at Baker City, \$15,000 to finish the grounds at Salem, and probably give \$500 for Eugene. The committee turned down the requests for buildings at Oregon City and La Grande. The Secretary of the Interior has withdrawn from entry 12,000 acres in townships 1 and 2 north and south, ranges 15 and 16 east, for an additional reservoir for the Umatilla irrigation project. The House today passed Fulton's bill authorizing the issuance of patents to purchasers of grazing lands on the Umatilla Indian Reservation, whenever they prove the lands are unfit for agriculture. W. N. Barrett, of Hillsboro, appointed to Annapolis Naval Academy by Senator Fulton, has passed the entrance examinations.

FAITH IN THE BAY CITY

Claus Spreckels Says It Will Be
Greatest Port on Hemisphere.

CHICAGO, June 27.—"San Francisco will soon be Greater San Francisco in deed as well as in name. Things have settled themselves since our terrible disaster, capitalists are putting their money into rebuilding and enlarging and in beautifying, and the people generally are exercising a great degree of confidence in the city's future prosperity." Claus Spreckels, of San Francisco, who with his wife was in Chicago yesterday, thus expressed himself in discussing the future of his home city. All financial interests, he said, although he spoke especially for the sugar interests, were firm in the belief that San Francisco would become the largest and most important port of entry in the Western Hemisphere. "When our Oriental trade, already large, has become still larger, and when new modern buildings have sprung up out of the ruins, as they surely will, San

Francisco will be a greater city in all ways," he said. Mr. and Mrs. Spreckels are on their way to New York and may go to London before returning West.

Sues Many Phonograph Dealers.

NEW YORK, June 27.—A remarkable lawsuit because of the number of defendants and the amount of money involved has just been begun in this state by the New York Phonograph Company against 240 dealers in phonographs and their supplies in the state. Each suit is for \$10,000, making the total amount involved \$2,400,000. The

action grows out of long-standing litigation between the New York Phonograph and the National Phonograph Companies, representing the Edison interests.

Horror of the United States.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—President Roosevelt has approved the joint resolution of Congress expressing the horror of the people of the United States as the result of the massacre of Hebrews in Russia and expressing sympathy with those bereaved. The approved resolution will be sent to the State Department, where

it will be published officially as an act of Congress. There is no requirement in the terms that it shall be officially communicated to the Russian government.

Oregon Students Get Degrees.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., June 27.—(Special.)—Among those who received the master of arts degree today at Yale University were: Francis K. Jones, of Newberg, Or., graduate of Pennsylvania College, Iowa; '96; M. A. O'Holter, of Pacific College, '01; and Homer McKoon, B. D., of Pacific Theological Seminary, '05.
