

BOTH CREWS ARE FIT

Yale-Harvard Race Expected to Be Very Close.

FAST TIME IN PRACTICE

In the Preliminary Events Yesterday Representatives of Each One of the Big Universities Scored a Victory.

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 27.—Not in many years has such a difference of opinion been held by college men and others as to the probable outcome of the "varsity" eight event of the Yale-Harvard regatta on the Thames as prevails here tonight. Both crews have been doing record-breaking in their time trials and they are in splendid physical condition.

The feature of the closing day of training was the rowing of two minor races, which are now looked upon as of considerable interest to the men in quarters. These were the four-oared mile race for freshmen substitutes, which Yale won by a quarter of a length, and the half-mile and the race for graduates, which Harvard won by one and a quarter lengths. Last year Harvard won both of these events. The weather bureau predicts clear skies, moderate breeze and smooth water for the races.

SISZ, FRENCHMAN, WINNER.

Takes the Grand Prize in Automobile Race of Senar Circuit.

LEMANS, France, June 27.—Sisz (France) today won the grand prize for the automobile contest over the Senar circuit. Sisz, who finished first yesterday, started at 6:55 A. M. today and did the first round in 1 hour, 5 minutes, 15 seconds. When he passed the timekeepers he was driving at the rate of 148 kilometers per hour. He held the lead throughout the last circuit, which he completed in 1 hour, 7 minutes, 38 seconds. The distance (total) was 1238 kilometers. Nazarro (Italy) was second and Clement (France) third.

Sisz, in the two days, racing six hours per day, covered the course in 12 hours, three minutes and 57 seconds, including stops for repairs, averaging over 100 kilometers per hour.

MISSES HER HOME PORT.

La Paloma, with Cabin Flooded, Sails by Hawaii.

HONOLULU, June 27.—La Paloma, the Hawaiian entry in the ocean yacht race, arrived here this morning. La Paloma sailed a distance of 2447 miles. Owing, it is believed, to a defect in her chronometer, she missed this late start yesterday when she should have arrived. Her cabin was flooded the entire distance.

FIRE MENACES ST. JOHNS

Early Morning Blaze Destroys Two Large Buildings.

St. Johns was again threatened by fire at 1:30 o'clock this morning, and two large buildings were burned to the ground before the blaze was under control. The fire broke out in the rear of Halberg's furniture store and spread rapidly until it had entirely consumed that building. It then spread to the Undertaking establishment of Zeller, Byrnes & Blackburn, which it also destroyed. Electric wires fell and it was feared that these would set fire to adjoining buildings. The loss to the undertaking establishment is estimated at \$1000. No insurance was carried. The loss to the furniture company could not be learned this morning, but it is said to have been about \$1000.

St. John's feeble fire-fighting apparatus prevented the blaze jumping to other buildings. Even those who were burned out are loud in their praise of the small force of fire-fighters that restricted the flames to the two buildings.

In the rear of the undertaking establishment lived the family of Mr. Blackburn. They escaped, but lost everything. In a rooming-house above the furniture store lived several families, who got out of the building with difficulty.

TOLEDO LED IN PERSON

Vigorous Attack Made by Revolutionists in Guatemala.

MEXICO CITY, June 27.—According to reports from trustworthy sources in Salvador and Guatemala there are at the present time operating in Guatemala several large forces of revolutionists. General Toledo, at the battle of Amolot, Mila, led his troops in person, vigorously attacking. Many on both sides were killed. It is reported that men enlisted in Texas for the revolution were sent in Salvador.

Honduras Revolution Threatens.

NEW ORLEANS, June 27.—Reports that a revolution is being planned in Spanish Honduras; that American residents there are making arrangements to leave the country and that yellow fever quarantine regulations in force on the Honduran coast are in danger of demoralization from the anticipated political upheaval were made public here today by the Louisiana State Board of Health.

THE DAY'S DEATH RECORD

Jerry Dunn, Sportsman.

ELIZABETH, N. J., June 27.—Jerry Dunn, a well-known sportsman, died here today at 20 years of age. He had achieved considerable notoriety by killing Jim Elliott in Chicago. Elliott, who was a noted pugilist of that day, had a match on to fight John Sullivan when Dunn killed him. Dunn was acquitted on a plea of self-defense.

Mrs. Harriet S. Huntington.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—Mrs. Harriet S. Huntington, mother of Henry E. Huntington, Willard R. Huntington and Charles B. Burdell Hollister, died here today of an illness of several weeks. Mrs. Huntington was 86 years of age. Her home for many years was in Ontario, N. Y., and she came here on the winter to make a visit to her daughter, Mrs. Hollister.

J. N. Free.

TOLEDO, O., June 27.—J. N. Free, known all over the country as the "Immortal J. N. Free," died today at the Toledo State Hospital for the Insane, 70 years of age. He had traveled all over the United States paying neither hotel bills nor railroad fare. He had been an inmate of the insane hospital for several months.

William Hendrie, Horseman.

HAMILTON, Ont., June 27.—William Hendrie, president of the Ontario Jockey Club, died here today. He was well known all over the United States and Canada. Among the many race horses which he bred were Martin and Belmont, 64 famous several years ago.

Sister of General Custer.

MONROE, Mich., June 27.—Mrs. David Reed, sister of General George A. and Thomas Custer, who were killed in the Indian battle of the Little Big Horn in Montana, June 25, 1876, died at her home here today, aged 90 years.

Colonel B. F. Hurley.

HAGERSTOWN, Md., June 27.—Colonel B. F. Hurley, who in 1863 was appointed by President Lincoln Secretary of the then Territory of Washington, died today, aged 72 years.

Alex Muir, Song Writer.

TORONTO, Ont., June 27.—Alex Muir, author of Canada's National song, "The Maple Leaf Forever," died suddenly last night.

Senator Stewart Dead.

TACOMA, Wash., June 27.—(Special.)—Tacoma Senator Carey L. Stewart died this afternoon, at his residence in Puyallup.

DISCIPLINE IS TOO LAX

Department Will Be Entirely Reorganized if Plan Is Carried Out.

Looting Scandal Basis of Proposed Changes.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 27.—(Special.)—Mayor Moore will probably cause a shake-up in the Fire Department soon by dismissing Chief Ralph Cook and several of the captains. The Arlington dock fire, with its resultant looting charges, will be made the basis of the charges for which the removals will be made, but a continued lack of discipline in the department is the real cause of the changes.

Chief Cook was in ill health at the time of the fire and when the Federal Government began its investigations, went off to California on a month's leave of absence to recuperate. Since his return he has been unable to do his service commission inquiry, but persistently refuses to get out of office.

If Chief Cook is displaced, as it is authoritatively announced he will be, an Eastern fire expert will be brought to Seattle to reorganize the Fire Department and place it on a new footing.

SNAKE CHARMER GOES WRONG

Gets Drunk and His Pets Terrify Spokane.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 27.—(Special.)—About six weeks ago an amateur snake charmer rented a plot of ground on Front avenue and set to work with a bag containing about 50 different varieties of snakes. Business must have been good, for on the second day the snake charmer got drunk, went to sleep without closing the mouth of the snake bag, and nearly all the snakes, some of them rattlers, are at large in that quarter of the city, where today the rustling of a paper sack sends the loungers scuttling to the center of the street.
