# WHEN IS A MAN 21?

## A Question Not So Very Easy to Answer After All.

New York Sun "It is often said that law is applied common sense," said Professor John Wurts, of the Yale Law School, the other day, when in town. "While it is

other day, when in town. "While it is true that law principles originated in common gense, the law itself is the comcommon sense, the law itself is the com-bined experience of many men; for no two men uninstructed in law will agree as to what is applied common sense. "Then there are many rules of law which indoubtedly have a common sense origin, but conditions having changed, history fails to disclose this origin. Yet these very rules must be retained in or-der not to shake personal and property rights. Therefore no man cang depend rights. Therefore no man can depend on his own uninstructed common sense to know the law. "To drive this statement home, I have

frequently put to an incoming law class the question, 'When does an infant de-come of age?' The answer is always unanimous: 'When he is 21 years old.' "The next question appears ridiculous to some, and makes them laugh, while

others set their alleged common sense at work, and never with correct result: "When is a man II years old?" "One student says, 'On his list birth-day,' but of course he does not mean it, for he is about a year out of the way. Another ventures, 'On the Ilst annivers-ary of his birthday.' This sounds better, but even if correct is not specific enough. 'When he has completed his Zist anniversary', 'at the beginning of that day', 'on his Zist anniversary, at the precise hour of his birth,' are other answers. "And then I surprise the guessers by saying that they are all wrong. "In computing time it is a general rule that the law disregards part of a day. In applying this rule, suppose a man was born just one minute before mid-

night on January 2, 1880. "At midnight he had lived but one min-ute, yet the day on which he was born was ended, and the law considered him one day old. So in computing the 21 years which a man must live in order to reach his majority we do not begin with the moment of birth, but with the commencement of the day of his birth. "Now, since we must start with the first moment of January 2, 1880, it is per-haps natural to say that this man did not heps natural to say that this man did not become 21 years old until the close of January 1, 1901. Mathematically speak-ing this is true. "Twenty-one years in that same re-quirés that the last moment of January 1, 1901, should have arrived in order to make the man of age, and, obviously, he was of are at that point of time. Here
