

DAYS OF MISERY NEARING AN END

Eyes of the Emperor Are
Opened by the Patent Dis-
affection in the Army.

FRIGHTENED INTO ACTION

Goremykin Soon to Be Dismissed and
the Principle of a Responsible
Ministry Is Soon to
Be Accepted.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 28.—The campaign which the opposition elements in Parliament are waging to compel Emperor Nicholas to dismiss the Goremykin Ministry and accept the principle of a responsible Ministry promises to be successful soon. Both the Emperor and the court are being frightened into surrender by the alarming spread of revolutionary ideas among the troops.

When the Preobrazhensky Regiment, "His Majesty's Own," pronounced its solidarity with Parliament at Krasno-Selo, less than a dozen miles from the Peterhof Palace, the Emperor's eyes opened and the court began to realize that there was only a step from that to declaring allegiance to Parliament as against the government.

Even the Procurator-General of the Holy Synod, M. Pobedonostsev, who today celebrated his sixtieth jubilee of his entrance into the service of the state, and who has been much at Peterhof recently, is said to have taken the position of a lifetime and to have advised the Emperor to yield to the demand for a responsible Ministry as the only means of preserving the throne.

Concessions to the Army.

The government's sudden fear of affronting public opinion, after finding the army infected with the revolutionary propaganda, is shown in the hurried grant of a new trial to seven men condemned to death at Riga, the acquittal of six others and the commutation of death sentences imposed on the three murderers of the foreman of the Putloff Iron Works.

The news from the provinces shows that general anarchy is growing in Altura and Tauride Provinces the peasants are abandoning the fields and in Tula Province roving bands are marching through the country, dragging in their wake not only the workers from the fields, but the domestic servants of the gentry.

In the Baltic Province the Governor-General has again granted the landowners permission to organize armed patrols.

Conservative Group Gives In.

The only conservative group in the lower house of Parliament, which is headed by Count Heydon, has at last bowed before the storm of radicalism and declared in favor of practically the whole of the Constitutional Democrats' program, including the expropriation of state, church, crown and private lands, insisting only on their distribution into private holdings.

The agrarian scheme drawn for the government by M. Stuchinski, Minister of Agriculture, is now complete. It has not been finally approved. It will reject the principle of expropriation, but contains enormous concessions from the program announced by the Goremykin three weeks ago, by providing for the distribution of all lands belonging to the crown in European Russia, but neither the crown lands belonging to the Emperor nor the lands belonging to members of the imperial family, or of the church, or included in it.

Too Late to Stem Tide.

Besides, the scheme contains the original features providing for the distribution of the lands of private holders, which would be sold under the present basis and the colonization of peasants, etc. Such a scheme proposed at the opening of Parliament might have helped to stem the tide, but wrung from the government, it comes too late.

Parliament seems practically to have abandoned its attempts to frame legislation. Its whole energy is directed to attacking the government by the medium of interpellations, for the double purpose of strengthening its authority with the masses and ousting the ministry.

Today the presentation of the Bialystok report was again postponed. "The interpellations began with a demand to know why the government prohibits the proposed meeting of the Peasants' League at St. Petersburg, while permitting that of the nobles, and also why the members of the Peasants' League arrested at Moscow several months ago have not been released."

Rumors of New Ministry.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 28.—The Constitutional Democrats were hurriedly summoned to a caucus this afternoon, and it was again rumored in the corridors of the Lower House of Parliament that negotiations are proceeding with them for the formation of a Ministry headed by M. Mouroumstev, president of the Lower House.

Jewish Population in Panic.

LONDON, June 28.—According to a dispatch from Warsaw to the Jewish Chronicle, Uman, 115 miles southwest of Kiev, is in a ferment, and a massacre of Jews is feared. The Jewish population of the town is in a state of panic.

FIREMAN IS ON TRIAL.

Accused of Assaulting Coalpasser
With Butcher Knife.

Judge Cameron held a special session of the Municipal Court yesterday afternoon to take the testimony of the officers of the United States Collier Station, in the trial of Martin Colwell, a fireman on the ship, accused by W. H. Ridings, second assistant engineer, of assault with a dangerous weapon.

The accused was brought into court with his head tightly bandaged, both eyes blackened and the whole face bearing numerous scars.

Ridings testified that he was awakened late Tuesday night by a quarrel in the donkey engine room, and on investigating found Colwell and a coalpasser engaged in an argument. Telling them to go to their quarters, Ridings went back to sleep, but he heard quarrelling again, and this time saw Colwell chasing the coalpasser all over the ship flourishing a large butcher knife. Ridings further testified that he took a belaying pin and hit Colwell on the head, knocking him senseless. After that the accused was put into irons and next day turned over to the city authorities on the charge of assault.

Several witnesses were heard in the case, and the most amusing testimony was given by the coalpasser who was chased by Colwell. During the interroga-

RAID ON KANSAS SALOONS

COSTLY FIXTURES DESTROYED
AND LIQUORS SPILLED.

Property Owners Warned That
Buildings Rented to Joint Keep-
ers May Be Destroyed.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 28.—The anti-saloon crusade at Kansas City, Kan., was renewed today with increased vigor. In addition to destroying stocks of liquor and bar fixtures, C. W. Trickett, the Assistant Attorney-General appointed by Governor Hoch to enforce the prohibition law, today threatened to demolish saloon buildings if the owners persist in renting their places to jointkeepers. Many of these buildings are owned by brewing companies. Today Assistant Attorney-General Trickett began sending out warnings to property-owners.

"This is to notify you," reads the warning, "that if you permit said premises to be again used for the sale of intoxicating liquors, so as to make necessary the issuance of a second writ of abatement, I shall order the premises sufficiently demolished so that no third trip will be necessary, and in addition will cite you for contempt of court in aiding and assisting in violating the order of the court."

There are about 100 saloons in Kansas City, Kan., about 50 of which have been closed. The liquors and fixtures in 35 of these had been seized by the county officials up to today. A portion of this

property was destroyed yesterday, and today the officials continued to spill liquor and break up costly bars, tables and other furniture already brought in, and to search for still more.

Despite the warnings of Assistant Attorney-General Trickett, many saloons remained open today. The costly bar fixtures owned by the brewers were removed in many instances to the Missouri side for safety and the joint keepers continued to run their places with cheap furniture or none at all.

Many joint keepers contented themselves by selling bottle goods only, using tubs for refrigerators.

GIVEN CONFEDERATE FLAGS

Daughters of the South Receive Em-
blems of Lost Cause.

The bimonthly meeting of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, Oregon Chapter, was held last night in the committee-rooms of the City Hall, with a large attendance of Southern people residing in this city. Mrs. Elizabeth Craig, president of the organization presided. The feature of the evening was the presentation of the Daughters by Frank L. Thornton, late of Houston, Tex., of two beautiful Confederate flags. The Oregon Chapter having been without a flag up to the present time, felt especially appreciative of the gift, and the sentiment attached to the stars and bars by the loyal daughters of the Southland made the occasion memorable. Mrs. Craig as president, officer, graciously accepted the gift, and an address of acceptance was made by Mrs. Stovall, historian of the chapter. Mr. Thornton was given a rising vote of

thanks and made an honorary member of the chapter.

A delightful programme had been prepared by the committee in charge, which proved thoroughly entertaining. Colonel D. J. Haynes, a Southerner, who wears the G. A. R. button, addressed the chapter in interesting vein, and Miss Minnie George gave a finely interpreted reading of Father Ryan's immortal poem, "Puri That Banner." Miss Thornton's presentation of Kipling's "Recessional" was splendidly given, her rich voice being particularly suited to that style of elocution. Miss Duff's sweet voice was heard to advantage in a solo, and the stirring strains of "Dixie" brought the entire audience to its feet in song. A social hour terminated the evening. The next meeting will be devoted to Georgia.

Bullet Holes in Heads.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., June 28.—The decomposed bodies of Alfred Bettles and his wife

were found in bed at their home here today, with a bullet hole in the head of each. Circumstances indicate that Bettles murdered his wife and killed himself on Monday. He is known to have been jealous of her.

Rivalry for Kaiser's Cup.

NEW YORK, June 28.—The 21st anniversary of the National Saengerfest will be celebrated at Newark, N. J., on Sunday, and 600 singers and 400 musicians are expected to take part. The festival will

be of particular interest this year on account of the keen rivalry of the Brooklyn Arion and the Junger Maennerchor of Philadelphia, in the competition for the Kaiser's prize. This was presented by the German Emperor, and in 1890 these two clubs were pronounced equal in the contest for it. Three years later at Baltimore, the Junger Maennerchor won for its perfect rendering of the Kaiser song.
