ST. JOHN'S SCHOOL ELECTION.—Election of two Directors will take place this evening at the St. John's Schoolhouse to take the place of H. W. Brice and I. G. Ogden, who resigned for the reason, it was charged, that all was not straight relative to the contract let for the addition to the building. Candidates mentioned are C. W. Potter, H. W. Brice and C. Carhart. The contract complained of was for \$600, and was let to a partner of A. M. Culp, chairman of the Board of Directors. W. L. Thorndyke and Willis Moxon called attention to the irregularity at the meeting June 15, with the result that two Directors at once stepped down and out. Mr. Culp remained. Another result was that the contract was thrown out and new bids were advertised for the job, which will be received tomorrow. It is also held that the price, \$650, was in excess of the amount authorized by the taxpayers of the district some time ago, when it was estimated that the cost of the improvements should be about \$300. These improvements consist of the two classrooms, an assembly hall and installation of sanitary plumbing. The new bids will show whether this work can be done for less than the \$650.

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATION POSTPONED.—The United States Civil Service Commission announces the postponement to July 13 of the examination scheduled for July 11, to secure eligibles from which to make certification to fill a vacancy in the position of farmer (qualified in irrigation), Navajo Indian Agency, N. M., at \$200 per annum, and similar vacancies as they may occur in the service. On July 25 examinations will also be held for planning-mill foreman, at \$100 a month, in the United States penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kan., and vacancies as they may occur in any branch of the service requiring similar qualifications, besides an examination for poultryman at \$500 a year in the Indian service at Chilocco, Okla., and vacancies as they may occur in that service also. MERTON BELL UNDER ARREST

Clackamas County Man Admits That He Voted at Sellwood.

OREGON CITY, Or., June 23.—(Special.)—Merton Bell, one of the men indicted by the Multnomah County grand jury for alleged illegal voting in Sellwood precinct at the recent election, was arrested at his home at Gladstone last night by Sheriff H. W. Trembath, at the request of Sheriff Word of Multnomah County. Bell does not deny having voted in Sellwood precinct, but declares that he voted for but two men on the ticket—Chamberlain for Governor and Gearin for United States Senator.

When asked if he voted on any of the amendments or local questions, he declined to answer. Bell is one of the men who is charged with swearing in his vote as a resident and freholder of Clackamas County. He is charged with perjury in having made an untruthful affidavit as to his place of residence.

Where the roadway is 28 feet, the parking will be but eight feet in width.

It is planned to make the proposed ordinance apply only to streets where new and permanent improvements are made. As improvements are constantly being made, it is believed that within a few years, if the ordinance is enacted, practically all of the roadways in the city to the residence districts will be narrowed down. This would give the property-owners more parking.

Where the roadway is limited to 24 feet in width, the space between the lot line and the sidewalks will be two feet, the sidewalk six feet in width and the parking 11 feet. Where the roadway is 28 feet, the parking will be but eight feet in width.

It is planned to make the proposed ordinance apply only to streets where new and permanent improvements are made. As improvements are constantly being made, it is believed that within a few years, if the ordinance is enacted, practically all of the roadways in the city to the residence districts will be narrowed down. This would give the property-owners more parking.

File Incorporation Articles.
 Articles of Incorporation of the Columbia River Pulp & Paper Company were filed in the County Clerk's office yesterday by H. L. Pittcock, F. W. Leadbetter and W. F. Hawley; capital stock, \$250,000. The objects announced are to manufacture and sell paper of every kind and description, and materials needed for the manufacture of paper; to operate mills, conduct warehouses, etc.

Incorporation articles of the Santiam Electric Company were filed in the County Clerk's office by W. P. Hawley, H. L. Pittcock, Joseph M. Henly and F. W. Leadbetter; capital stock, \$50,000. The business of the corporation will be to furnish water for irrigation, agricultural and other purposes; to utilize the

water of the Santiam River for power purposes, including electric power for railroads, lighting, manufacturing, etc.
