

## TYRANT ADMIRAL IS FATALLY SHOT

Chouknin, Suppressor of Black  
Sea Mutiny, Wounded  
by Sailor.

## IN REVENGE FOR SCHMIDT

Russian Terrorists Finally Execute  
Sentence—Tambov Mutineers  
Surrender—Elaborate Plans  
to Defeat Insurrection.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 11.—An attempt was made at 1 o'clock this afternoon at Sevastopol to assassinate Admiral Chouknin, commander of the Black Sea fleet. The Admiral was wounded and taken to a hospital.

The would-be assassin is a sailor, who hid in the bushes and shot at the Admiral as he was walking in the garden of his villa. The culprit has not been apprehended.

Admiral Chouknin's condition is extremely serious. The bullet lodged in his lungs, making breathing difficult. The doctors hold out no hope of his recovery.

Hated by All Sailors.

The Admiral's assailant is thought to be one of the sailors of the battleship Otkhodoff and his act was supposed to be in revenge for the execution of Lieutenant Schmidt, the revolutionary leader. Admiral Chouknin was universally hated by his sailors because of his part in the execution of Schmidt, the revolutionary leader, who was condemned to death, 100 of their number pledging themselves to carry out the sentence.

This is the second attempt since Schmidt's execution on March 19 of this year. The first attempt was made by a woman, and the second by a sailor. Admiral Chouknin ordered her to be killed on the spot, and his order was carried out. For this the Admiral was again condemned to death by the revolutionists. His name was never mentioned among the sailors unless it was accompanied by curses on account of his overbearing and severe manner.

Vice-Admiral Chouknin has been blamed for his severity and it was to his treatment of the crews of ships under his command that the mutiny on board the battleship Krius Potemkin in June and July last year was attributed. The Admiral displayed considerable activity in attempting to capture the mutineers at that time and in suppressing the sailors' mutiny at Sevastopol in November last.

Woman's Attempt to Kill.

An attempt was made on the life of the Admiral February 8 last. A woman appeared at his official residence during the afternoon of that day and sent in her card saying she was a daughter of a Rear-Admiral at St. Petersburg who was an old acquaintance of Chouknin's. On entering the Admiral's office, the woman drew a pistol and fired four shots at him, each bullet reaching the mark. As she tried to escape the woman was killed by the orderly on duty at Chouknin's door. The crime beyond doubt was political.

When the sentences imposed upon the sailors of the Krius Potemkin mutineers were before the Admiral for review, formal notices were served on him that if he approved the sentences he would share the same fate. Chouknin, however, approved the sentences and several intimations afterward reached him to the effect that the Terrorists were merely waiting for a favorable opportunity to kill him.

Sometime elapsed before the police were able to establish the identity of the woman who made the attempt on Chouknin's life, but it finally became known that she was a Hebrew named Cecilia Shabad, 25 years old and a former member of the Hebrew Bund of Minsk, where her father was a well-to-do merchant.

## PLANS TO SUPPRESS REVOLT

Revolutionary Paper Tells How Riga Is to Be Defended.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 12, 1:40 A. M.—The preparations which the War Office has been making for the defense of Riga to meet an armed revolutionary movement, have been very elaborate. The plans for the defense of Riga have fallen into the hands of the revolutionary paper, Misha, which this morning publishes the entire plans of defense.

The city is divided into three divisions of defense. The first division, half a company of Cossacks and two machine guns each, to prevent the invasion of the city from three open sides, namely, the canal, the dam and the River Duna. Two battalions of Infantry, 200 Cossacks and four machine guns constitute the reserve. The commander, in framing the plan of defense, even designated his own power as the event of himself being killed or incapacitated.

Similar plans, it is understood, have been drawn up by every commander of a garrison or city. In addition special troops, trains equipped with machine guns are in constant readiness at St. Petersburg, Moscow, Kiev, Warsaw and other strategic points.

## TAMBOV MUTINEERS GIVE UP

Surrender and Apologize for Resistance to Authority.

TAMBOV, July 11.—Both squadrons of the Seventh Cavalry, which mutinied July 7, surrendered their arms today and expressed contrition for their conduct.

The mutiny at Tambov was regarded by the Russian authorities as probably the most serious of the kind since the Sevastopol mutiny, as much from the fact that it was the first outbreak of insubordination in the cavalry arm of the service as because of the bold defiance of authority on the part of the soldiers. After killing an infantry officer and a dragoon, who were among the loyal troops who had opposed them, the mutinous cavalrymen barricaded themselves in their barracks, where, until their surrender, they defied the authorities.

## PANIC AMONG WARSAW JEWS

Rumors of Massacre Cause Exodus and Strong Precautions.

WARSAW, July 11.—Sensational rumors current today, that an anti-Jewish outbreak might be expected tomorrow have resulted in a panic and thousands of Jews have fled the town. Similar scenes have occurred at Lodz.

The authorities have adopted far-reaching measures, which were all the more necessary, as the soldiers and po-

lice are incensed by the numerous attempted murders of their comrades.

## Official Robbed by Bandits.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 11.—An assistant cashier of the Admiralty was leaving the office of the Paymaster of the Admiralty this afternoon, accompanied by a clerk and porter, the latter carrying a bag containing \$10,000. They were attacked by several armed men who discharged revolvers at them. Gasperevich was wounded in the head, and a bullet passed through the jaw of the porter, who dropped the bag of money. The robbers seized the bag and fled with it.

## HARTJE LETTERS ENLARGED

Effort to Prove Forgeries in Pittsburg Divorce Suit.

PITTSBURG, July 11.—The handwriting experts, David N. Carvalho, of New York, and Marshall D. Elwell, of Chicago, were closeted for several hours today with Mrs. Hartje, defendant in the divorce case of Mrs. Hartje and the coachman co-defendant, examining the 40 letters alleged to have been written to Madine by Mrs. Hartje. Madine said he would not make an information against Detective Craig, who, it is alleged, broke open his trunk and carried off letters and papers. "I have left everything," said he, "in the hands of the attorneys (referring to counsel for Mrs. Hartje) and it rests with them."

Not to be outdone by the defense, the attorneys for Hartje have had the famous letters photographed, and have prepared charts three feet in height. Both cases have been prepared and enlarged copies of the letters, and they will be taken into court when the trial of the case is resumed tomorrow.

An effort will be made, it is said, to prove that Mrs. Hartje was deceived as to her own writing by the cleverness of the alleged forger. It is asserted that it is proved that the court has been imposed upon. Friends of Hartje's attorneys say that if this is true, the lawyers have imposed upon also, and are innocent of knowledge of the alleged forgeries.

During the day a number of depositions from witnesses for Mrs. Hartje were taken in the office of Attorney Freeman, one of her counsel. All sorts of rumors concerning these depositions were current, and they are said to be of the highest importance. This move on the part of counsel for the respondent has caused much speculation, and is believed to be the last of the evidence which will be used to contradict that of the witnesses for the libellant in the case.

The greatest caution was observed when these depositions were being taken. Detectives and guards stood about the entrance to the office, and all but those summoned as witnesses were warned away.

An effort to establish the accuracy of the now famous 40 letters, counsel for Mrs. Hartje late today summoned to their office three bank cashiers to obtain their knowledge of handwriting in their business. None of the men accounted with Mrs. Hartje's handwriting and the 40 letters were thrown upon the table before them. They were asked to select those letters that from their experience should appear to be written in a natural hand.

Among the 40 letters were seven that Mrs. Hartje had acknowledged writing. These were letters of a social nature to personal friends and they were selected by the bank men, as to their mind the letters were written by Mrs. Hartje, while the remaining were declared to be forgeries. It could not be learned to-night whether this would be used as evidence in the case or was for the purpose of the counsel in their arguments.

## OUT OF POLITICAL GAME

John L. Wilson Makes Announcement at Tacoma Banquet.

TACOMA, Wash., July 11.—(Special.)—At a banquet tonight by the Tacoma Chamber of Commerce, at which were present Rear-Admiral Goodrich, Rear-Admiral Bronson, Governor Mead, ex-United States Senator Wilson, ex-Governor McGowan and others of state and national prominence, a resolution was adopted amid great enthusiasm, commending the works of President Roosevelt and endorsing him, or some man with his honesty, courage and ability, as his successor.

John L. Wilson made an address on "The Old and the New," in the course of which he said he was out of politics, speaking as follows:

"I desire to state here and now, in view of the fact that from time to time it is reported by the public press and individuals that I am a candidate for this or that office, have been greatly honored by the people of this state, as the first member of Congress elected by the people, twice being nominated by acclamation and then promoted to the United States Senate in 1895. I have had many honors in this state and I deeply and keenly appreciate them, but I am not now a candidate to succeed Senator Anthony. I am not a candidate for the Governorship of this state. I am not a candidate for any office, elective or appointive."

"I hope in the years to come, in time of life may be vouchsafed for me. To do everything in my power as a citizen of this commonwealth to aid and assist in upbuilding the same. I hope to take a continuous interest in the political affairs of my commonwealth, but I never expect to be a candidate again for any office, elective or appointive. I am under many obligations to all the people. I propose whenever and wherever I can to assist those friends who have aided me in the years that have come and gone."

"As for my enemies, politically speaking—well, they can take care of themselves."

## GRAIN CLASSIFIED WRONG

German Importers Complain of Fraud by American Shippers.

COLOGNE, July 11.—The Association of Rhinish and Westphalian grain importers has sent a circular to the various German and foreign chambers of commerce and consulates regarding the alleged incorrect classification of American grain. The circular says the grain trade of Europe has complained for years about the improper certifying of American wheat, corn and oats, which has involved losses of millions of dollars for importers.

Thousands of cases of such alleged improper certification, the circular asserts, are vouchered for by sealed samples of grain and the original certificates which have been exchanged for the original certificates of the old harvest was certificated as new, and where mixed corn certificated as A. 1 grade at the port of destination was totally ruined after a ten days' voyage.

It is further charged that for some months American oats certificated as white clipped has contained a mixture of 30 per cent barley.

The circular goes on to state that, notwithstanding the fact that the German Congress of Chambers of Commerce has tried for years to secure a proper grading of American grains, the efforts have been without success. The association says the entire international trade is interested in removing the evils complained of, and asks suggestions for a line of common action, promising to collate the material furnished by the shippers, and, if deemed best, to call an international conference to protect the trade against further losses.

## CRIME ALL HIS OWN

Curtis Jett Denies Hargis Was Party to Murder.

## SUDDEN CHANGE OF HEART

Marcum's Assassin Repudiates Part of Confession Which Implicated Hargis—White Refuses to Testify Against Friend.

BEATTYVILLE, Ky., July 11.—Curtis Jett, at the afternoon session of the trial of Judge Hargis for murder, took the witness stand, admitted the assassination of Marcum and told the manner in which the crime was committed. "Mr. Marcum had prosecuted me in several cases and was my bitter enemy and I am the man who killed him," said Jett. He then told of the assassination, telling with the description given by J. J. Ewan.

Jett said he had not conferred with White in regard to the killing. The pistol he used, he said, was his own and had been owned by him several months. He told the attorneys this morning that Sheriff Callahan had given it to him. The defendants helped to defend him in his previous trial. He did not know, but thought, they had paid his attorney's fees.

He suddenly lost his memory at the most crucial moment and could tell nothing of his or White's action preceding or following the murder. Jett did not remember seeing White in the courtroom at all and, as far as he is concerned, White is perfectly innocent. That Jett had had some marvelous change of heart is apparent, but the reason may be found in the statement of Commonwealth's Attorney Adams, who said Jett had been drinking and that another attempt will be made tomorrow to get him to repeat his confession.

Tom White followed Jett on the stand

and asked Attorney Byrd to excuse him, as he did not want to answer any questions. He was asked if he was in Jackson the day Marcum was killed, but declined to answer. White even refused to answer after being told to by the court. Judge Dorsey ordered the witness to jail.

W. B. Johnson said Tom White told him just a few weeks since Marcum was killed that Hargis wanted him to do the fighting for him. This testimony was excluded yesterday, but was admitted today.

It was so apparent that Jett had experienced a change of heart since he confessed that Hargis and Callahan hired him to assassinate Marcum that the prosecution turned him over for cross-examination without asking who induced him to fire the shots.

Attorney Young for the defense said that Jett had sent for him and stated he would swear that his recent confession was a fake if the defendants would give him \$500. On the other hand, Jett stated to the attorneys for the state that every influence had been brought to bear on him since making his confession to retract it and swear that it was secured by fraud.

The court began the investigation when it became apparent that Jett, who had been brought from the penitentiary under guard, was drunk. Sam Grimes admitted having given Jett whiskey.

## STEAMER A WRECK

Runs Ashore on Upper Mississippi and Burns.

## PASSENGERS ARE RESCUED

In Darkness the Quincy Strikes a Bank—Only One Life Known to Be Lost—Passengers Reach the Shore in Boats.

LA CROSSE, Wis., July 12.—The steamer Quincy, of the Diamond Jo line, struck a bank in the darkness near Trempealeau, Wis., at 10:30 last night, turned half over and then caught fire. It is believed that the majority of the 200 passengers on board were saved and only one drowning is definitely known, that of an infant which was washed from its mother's arms.

At 1:30 o'clock this morning a belated train brought 60 passengers who were on the boat to this city. Accounts given by them of the disaster do not include positive statements as to the drownings, but it is believed comparatively few met death. All communication with the village of Trempealeau is cut off, and information relative to the accident is obtainable only through the stories told by passengers and meager reports received at the railroad offices.

At about 10:30 o'clock the steamer, plying up river, struck a bank. At this time, it is said, the boat carried no searchlight. One passenger says he saw a babe washed overboard from its mother's arms. The boat was sinking, though not in deep water.

The palatial steamer caught fire immediately after the collision with the bank. The lifeboats were gotten out and the passengers were taken off before the flames gained any considerable headway. Rescue work was effectively done by the colored rowboats of the craft.
