

SEALSKIN SACKS WILL BE HIGHER

Pelagic Sealing Is to Cease on Agreement With Great Britain.

FLEETS TO BE BOUGHT

United States to Indemnify Victoria and Hakodate Owners, and Killing on Preblyoff Rookeries Is to Cease for Year.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 15.—According to advices received here, negotiations being carried on at Washington for the cessation of pelagic sealing, on the basis of the purchase of the Victoria and Hakodate sealing fleets and indemnification of the pelagic sealers for the loss of their industry, have been almost concluded. Sir Henry Durand, British Ambassador, and the United States Secretary of State, reached an agreement, it is reported, and a commission will be appointed, with one representative each from Great Britain, Canada and the United States, to work out the details of the agreement for the preservation of the seal herds.

When a treaty has been drawn up, negotiations will be commenced on the pelagic sealing in this agreement. Several years ago a report was sent from Japan to Washington, and a similar arrangement was then discussed, and the Japanese representative agreed to it, provided that Great Britain would also prohibit pelagic sealing.

The cessation of seal-killing on the rookeries of Beale Sea, even for one season, together with the prohibition of pelagic sealing following the purchase of the sealers, would cause considerable loss in the price of sealskins, which are already quoted at higher prices than they have brought in the history of pelagic sealing. The United States representative in the negotiations, it is understood, contended for the complete cessation of pelagic sealing, and to this end the sealing vessels and outfits will be purchased and the owners indemnified for loss of business. The British Ambassador, Sir Henry Durand, is said to have contended for the cessation of killing on the rookeries for a period, and it is stated acquiescence to this condition was absolutely necessary to prevent the failure of the conference, as it was put forward practically as an ultimatum.

H. M. S. Shearwater left today for Bering Sea to engage in sealing patrol duties during the pelagic sealing season, which commences on August 1.

MOTOR WRECK IN JUTLAND

Two Women in American Millionaire's Party May Die.

LONDON, July 15.—The Daily Mail's Copenhagen correspondent says that a motor car conveying an American millionaire named Angela, his wife, and a party of friends, collided with a two-horse vehicle at Skorby Hill, near Aarhus, Jutland, last night. The passengers were seriously injured, the horses were killed and the motor was wrecked. Two of the women of the party, the correspondent adds, are not expected to recover.

FATAL FIGHT AT PICNIC.

Officers Shoot Man in Dance Hall and Are Mobbed.

OAKLAND, July 15.—William B. Oslin, a teamster residing in San Francisco, was shot and instantly killed this evening during a fight with two special officers of a butchers' picnic at Shellmound Park. W. J. Oslin, brother of the dead man, was wounded during the fight. As a result of the shooting, L. H. Baldwin of San Francisco, and George Starr of Oakland, two special officers, who died the shooting,

are in the County Jail charged with murder. The shooting took place in the dance hall, but no one seems to know how the fight started. The two officers heard a row on the dance floor and rushed into the thick of the trouble. Starr drew a club and began to beat down the rioters. A crowd of 20 or 30 fought back, using chairs, beer cans and bottles. Starr drew his pistol and fired in the air. Then he shot low, the bullet hitting W. J. Oslin in the chest. The enraged brother, however, went for the officers. Baldwin began firing, and the first shot went through William Oslin's heart.

DUELIST MAY RECOVER.

Doctors Say Period of Danger to M. Sarraut Is Passed.

PARIS, July 15.—The surgeons in attendance on M. Sarraut, who was wounded in a duel with M. Mugliet-Conti, issued a bulletin today saying that their patient's condition was considerably improved. The dangerous period, they say, has been passed, but complete repose has been ordered. A further examination of M. Sarraut will be made tomorrow, in order to decide the gravity of the injury to the lungs. M. Mugliet-Conti and others of the Cabinet Ministers, and M. Brisson, President of the Chamber of Deputies, visited M. Sarraut today.

Fares Paid by Americans. LONDON, July 15.—The Daily Express estimates that the steamship fares paid by Americans landing in England last week amounted to \$900.

DRIVEN OUT OF PARISH.

Blacks From Lake Charles Tender-join Put on Train by Regulators.

NEW ORLEANS, July 15.—The work of a remarkable city house-cleaning party which last night placed 350 negro men and women on board a passenger train at Lake Charles, La., and shipped them out of the town and parish, is told tonight in dispatches to the Ployune. They were placed on the same train with the body of a negro who last week shot and killed the City Marshal of Jennings, La., and who subsequently died in jail at Lake Charles from wounds received while attempting to avoid arrest.

Soon before midnight the negro tender-join, known as the "Hole-in-the-Wall," was invaded by several hundred white men, including some members of the state militia, on their way to the United States encampment. The dispatch says:

"House after house was visited and the inmates, not even being given time to dress, were taken out and turned over to a guard. The motley group was marched under guard of pistols to a water tank about a mile from town. A passenger train was stopped and the negroes put aboard and their fares paid as far as the parish line, members of the guard riding the train. The negroes were shipped away in their night-dresses."

RUNS TO THE MOUNTAINS

John McPherson Escapes After Killing a Knoxville Merchant.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., July 15.—John McPherson is a fugitive from justice, charged with the murder of Grant Smith, a former merchant of this city, and the fatal wounding of Deputy Sheriff William Walker, who attempted to arrest him. Two possees are in pursuit of him. McPherson shot and killed Smith in the house of Nettie Hall, apparently without provocation. McPherson was accompanied by his father, Dr. Buck McPherson, and the two fled in a buggy toward the mountains. Deputy Sheriff Walker pursued them and demanded the surrender of young McPherson, who shot him through the lung. Walker died.

Young McPherson continued into the mountains, while his father returned here and surrendered and is now in jail.

Baptist Young People's Union.

OMAHA, Neb., July 15.—The 15th annual convention of the Baptist Young People's Union of America closed tonight with a consecration service, conducted by W. H. Getchell of Chicago. This preceded an address by S. A. K. DeBois, LL. D., of Chicago, on "Our Response to God's Gift of Power." The auditorium was crowded during the service.

This forenoon visiting clergymen filled the pulpits of the local churches and this afternoon the convention sermon was delivered by E. Y. Mullins, D. D., of Louisville, Ky.

Looking for Right of Way.

MEXICO CITY, July 15.—Vice-President and General Manager Neelan, of the Pan-American Railway, being built from the Tehuacan to the Gulf of Mexico, is in Guatemala City to confer with President Cabrera about the prolongation of the line through that republic. The railways here have been greatly taxed to handle their immense freights which have accumulated at important points.

Both Sides Make Concessions. COLUMBUS, O., July 15.—The operating managers of the two rival lines in conference here for two days endeavoring to settle differences that have arisen over the scale recently signed for this route, and as a result of which the miners in the Hooking Valley suspended work, tonight reached a basis of agreement. Concessions were made by both sides.

Fifth Fire at Cotton Dock. NEW YORK, July 15.—The fifth fire within a few weeks in the American Cotton Dock & Trust Company's plant at Tompkinsville, broke out today from an unknown cause, and destroyed the remaining storehouse with its contents of about 5000 bales of cotton. The loss is \$90,000.

Operated on Pacific Coast. SALT LAKE CITY, July 15.—A. M. Potter was arrested here today at the request of the Detroit, Mich., authorities, who charge him with cashing a forged check for \$3000 on the Dime Savings Bank. Potter is said to be the son of a Colorado banker. The detectives say he has operated on the Pacific Coast as Richard L. Adams and A. B. Baker.

General Koslov the Victim of an Assassin's Revolver.

HIT BY THREE BULLETS

Assailant Gazed Closely at a Photograph Before Firing Fatal Shots at Member of Headquarters Staff.

LONDON, July 15.—A dispatch to a news agency from St. Petersburg says that General Koslov, of the headquarters staff, was murdered in the park at Peterhof Saturday. His assailant used a revolver. The three shots fired were all effective. The murderer was a well-dressed man. He has been arrested, but not identified.

OFFICERS PREACH REVOLUTION

Address Members of Guards Regiments Near St. Petersburg.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 15.—At a meeting held today at Gatchina, 30 miles from St. Petersburg, attended by three of the guard regiments, an officer addressed the men on the subject of the soldiers' union, which is being organized. He pointed out that the league was democratic and was being organized for the purpose of guarding the constitution and establishing constitutional institutions and to prepare the army to come over to the people when they were ready and armed for resistance.

WOUNDED HACKED WITH AXES

Horrible Brutality in Taking of Catholic Church.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 15.—The Russian Catholic strike has again been resumed, owing to the action of the court in returning to its owners the Catholic church recently captured by the Mariavits in the village of Gremkov. After the return of this church to the Catholics it was again attacked and re-captured by the Mariavits.

THOUSANDS WITHOUT HOMES

Fire at Nizhni Novgorod Destroys Many Homes.

NIZHNI, Novgorod, July 15.—A fire which broke out here today raged for six hours before it was checked. When it was finally extinguished 25 houses had been destroyed and more than 3000 families had been rendered homeless. The loss is placed at \$400,000.

LOWER HOUSE IS JUBILANT.

Famine Relief Appropriation Looked Upon as Blow to Ministry.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 14.—The Council of the Empire accepted without amendment on Saturday Parliament's bill appropriating \$7,500,000 for famine relief. The acceptance came as a surprise, but has occasioned the greatest jubilation in the camp of the lower house, as it is regarded as a vote of lack of confidence in the Gorenkin Ministry on the part of the upper chamber.

While many speakers in the Council of the Empire really favored the adoption of the Cabinet's recommendations, they recognized that it would be a fatal mistake for the Council to antagonize the lower house in the present crisis. Moreover, those on the inside who were aware that the negotiations between the government and the Constitutional Democrats were entering the final stage, were naturally influenced by coming events.

According to tonight's reports, all the questions of principle involved in a change of the Ministry have been resolved and now it is more a matter of personalities. The Emperor is still objecting to certain names proposed by the Constitutional Democrats.

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
