MONTAVILLA BOARD OF TRADE MEETS.
 Montavilla is getting ready to assume
 some of the prerogatives as a part of
 the city by the establishment of street
 preparatory to grading streets for water
 mains. At the meeting of the local Board
 of Trade Tuesday evening a special com-
 mittee was appointed to take action to
 get the grades of all the streets estab-
 lished. It was announced that Bull Run
 water will be delivered to the people of
 that suburb as soon as the connection can
 be made. Work has been started on the
 connecting pipe line, so that water will
 come from the upper Mount Hood reser-
 voir, and in a few days Bull Run water
 will be flowing through the mains in
 Montavilla. The committee on banquet
 reported that all was ready for the event
 to take place this evening. There will be
 an open meeting in front of the school-
 house, where a number of addresses will
 be delivered, after which the banquet will
 take place at Captain Schneider's garden,
 on the Base line road. City officials have
 been invited.

TELEGRAM TO PRESIDENT ANSWERED.
 The St. Johns Postoffice is still in the
 hands of the bandmen of Mrs. A. S.
 Clark, ex-postmistress, and she has re-
 turned to the office to look after the de-
 tails. When Mrs. Clark received the in-
 formation that another had been appointed
 in her place, she turned the office over
 to her bandmen, but she has returned and
 is conducting affairs under supervision
 of her bandmen. Mayor Valentine
 was appointed postmaster, but has not
 entered on the duties, as his commission
 has not yet been received. The commit-
 tee from the mass meeting of July 3 has
 received an answer from the telegram
 it sent the President, but the answer has
 not been given to the public. The com-
 mittee believes that an investigation has
 been ordered as to the methods adopted
 for the removal of Mrs. Clark and the
 appointment of Mr. Valentine. The band-
 men say they have been unable for some
 reason to turn over the office to a post-
 office inspector and have to run it on
 their own hook.

SELECTION OF PLAN DEFERRED.—The
 building committee of the Commercial
 Club met yesterday afternoon. In the
 absence of the chairman, T. B. Wilcox, for
 the consideration of the architectural
 plans which have been submitted, in com-
 petition, for the handsome eight-story
 building which is to be erected by the
 organization. It was thought that a de-
 cision might be reached, but as several
 members of the committee were not
 present, the plans were not opened and
 adjournment was taken until next
 Wednesday, when it is expected there
 will be a full attendance. A subcommittee
 consisting of T. B. Wilcox, F. W. Lead-
 better and E. L. Thompson has attended
 to many of the preliminaries of the com-
 petition, but the entire committee will
 meet to discuss the plans when the final
 choice is made. Other members are J.
 C. Alnsworth, Hugh McDuff, Julius
 Meier, W. P. Olds, Adolph Wolfe, Ed-
 ward Ehrman and C. W. Hodson.

MINORS ENTER SALOON.—Frank King
 and Edward Simms, both minors, were
 brought before Recorder Thorndyke, of
 St. Johns, yesterday, on a charge of
 entering a saloon and calling for drinks.
 The former, under the name of John
 A. Alnsworth, had gone on parole for
 about 18. They were questioned as to
 their ages by the bartender, and both
 claimed to be of age, but when the bar-
 tender stopped them, they were caught by the
 policeman. Both pleaded guilty. Recorder
 Thorndyke ordered them to go on parole
 did not appear to be a bad boy, on con-
 dition that he report to the court. He

 ing on the subway, proceedings for the
 improvement of East Stark street will
 again be taken up.

OFFICES WILL BE MERGED

TRACTION AND POWER COMPANIES TO MOVE.
 Will Be Located at First and Alder
 streets Until New Office Build-
 ing Can Be Erected.

Offices of the traction, light and power
 companies making up the Portland Rail-
 way, Light & Power Company, will be
 moved within the next three weeks into
 the building at the northeast corner of
 First and Alder streets now occupied by
 the Oregon Water Power & Railway Com-
 pany. The entire three floors will be
 used by the corporations, and the two up-
 per floors of the building adjoining and
 fronting on Front street have also been
 leased.
 The interior of the two buildings will be
 rearranged at once and an elevator put
 in. The ground floor will be used as a
 waiting-room and place for the payment
 of light and power bills to the Portland
 General Electric Company.
 Offices of President H. W. Goode and
 Secretary E. N. Higgins will be on the
 second floor. The operating department,
 with offices of Vice-President F. L. Fisher
 and W. H. Hurlbut, managers of the
 railway department of the corporation, to-
 gether with the headquarters of Manager
 Skyles, of the light and power depart-
 ment, will be on the third floor. Doors
 will be cut through the partition between
 the two buildings, giving plenty of room
 for the necessary equipment.
 The offices of the Portland Railway Com-
 pany in the Mohawk building will be
 given up. The present office building of
 the Portland General on Seventh street
 near Alder, will be retained as a supply
 department, and the present supply ware-
 room in the Mohawk building on Alder
 street will be abandoned.
 The centralization of offices of the dif-
 ferent corporations lately merged is neces-
 sary for convenience, but the new ar-
 rangement will be only temporary. It is
 the intention of the Portland Railway,
 Light & Power Company to build an of-
 fice building of its own, which material-
 ly be done within the next two years.
 Until the building is completed, the quar-
 ters at First and Alder streets will be re-
 tained in three weeks or a month.

BRIDE IS TIRED OF LIVING

**For Third Time in Two Weeks Mrs.
 Stanton Threatens Suicide.**

Fourteen days of connubial bliss soured
 Mrs. N. P. Stanton, of Oregon City, ag-
 ainst life and her husband. Last night
 she broke away from her young
 spouse and ran toward the Willamette,
 where she said she would drown herself.
 Whether she carried out her plan or not
 has not been learned. The young woman
 could not be found last night.
 Stanton was married on July 4 and
 since then his wife's life and his has
 been one of misery. Three times she has
 threatened to commit suicide, but her
 husband dissuaded her. Last night as
 Stanton was making his way to police
 headquarters to tell his troubles, his wife
 broke from his grasp, saying that she
 had decided to drown herself. Her hus-
 band permitted her to go, and then no-
 tified the police.

The artful joker and reward dodger
 who has been making the lives of Port-
 land ministers a howling comedy of
 trouble, and caused their ministerial
 heads to bow in unnecessary prayer, could
 probably work the trusting theologians
 out of \$100 reward as easily as he caused
 the illness of Rev. Clarence T. Wilson.
 Like the well-known "detectives" of the
 city criminal "apartment," the preachers
 are unable to follow a clue. By bringing
 to say girl or mingling with the well-
 known joke-festers on Oak street, they
 would probably obtain a "hunch" which
 would divert this large and untainted
 amount of money to the fund for lost
 heathen in the tropics.

Where the practical arrow of the artful
 joker will next fall it would be hard to
 say, but as pride goes before a fall, and
 the trio of ministers have become "wised"
 to his operations, the joker is expected
 to devise some new dodge to throw the
 reward-givers off the scent.
 Dr. Wilson, however, was compelled to
 bite again at the bait of the joker Tues-
 day night. He was informed over the
 telephone that Chief Grimmer had ob-
 tained information which would lead to
 the apprehension of the criminal. Dr.
 Wilson visited the Chief shortly after
 breakfast yesterday, but discovered that
 it was all a hoax, and that he had been
 fooled again. The minister says that the
 reward for the capture and conviction of
 the joker will still owe, and he is waiting
 for someone to come into the pot.

 his scalp. The joker is known to several,
 but the crime rests upon his own shoul-

HEPPNER PIONEER DEAD

**James Neville, Eastern Oregon
 Stockman Passes Away.**

James Neville, a pioneer of Oregon and
 a well-known stockman, died suddenly at
 his home, 535 Flinders street, Sunday
 night of last week. He was born in
 Ireland in 1829 and came to the United
 States when 14 years old.

In 1851 he resided in California, where
 he engaged in mining and other enter-

 team from The Dalles. For more than
 35 years Mr. Neville was engaged in
 stock-raising near Heppner, and only re-
 turned from business last month. He
 moved from Heppner to Portland, where
 he has made his home with his family.
 He is survived by a widow, three daugh-
 ters, and two sons. Funeral services
 were held Tuesday.
