MONTAVILLA HAS BUILT RUN WATER.—Montavilla is now provided with Bull Run water. Connection was made a few days ago with the high service reservoir on the south side of Mount Tabor, and a two-inch pipe. While there is not sufficient water for irrigation, the people are enjoying it for domestic purposes. The intention is to extend a large main from the 24-inch pipe now being laid from the upper reservoir, either at the intersection of West avenue and the Base Line road or at the intersection of the Wilberg road and Villa avenue, to Montavilla, which will furnish water for all purposes, including irrigation and fire protection. Connection will probably be made at the Wilberg road and Villa avenue, so that Center Addition may also be supplied from this pipe line. This will be a great benefit for some time, and meanwhile the supply of water will continue to come through the small mains of the Mount Tabor Water Company.

SEEK LOCATIONS IN PORTLAND.—An unusually large number of inquiries from the people of the South have been received by the Chamber of Commerce within the last few days. Many of the communications are from the southern part of California, particularly in the vicinity of Los Angeles. These letters are in information about business locations, city residences, farms and homes in the country. Assistant Secretary Moss Mossonian is kept busy answering these inquiries regarding Portland and this section of the country, and in addition to writing each one a letter, a lot of printed matter is sent to each person desirous of seeking other locations.

WILL LAY WATER MAIN.—The Water Committee will put down an eight-inch main on East Burnside street, from East Third street to East Tenth, before the hard pavement is laid. H. H. Newhall, of the special committee, announces that Superintendent Dodge has agreed to see that the pipe is put down. East Burnside being an important street, a large main is needed. The old plank has been torn up as far as Union avenue, and the contracting firm is preparing to put down the pavement at once.

ARM BROKEN BY FALL.—Harry Warner, a young man employed as electrician in the O. R. & N. shops at Albina, yesterday fell from a height of 30 feet while at work on a trolley car. He was badly injured and is in the hospital.

Passengers on the steamer T. J. Potter from the beach Sunday report a crush on board the boat at the Ilwaco dock that injured several people. Fortunately the injuries were not serious, although the crush is said to have endangered many lives.

In the rush of passengers to get seats on the steamer that followed the arrival of the train from North Bend, two women and one boy fainted and the screams of others made the situation even more panicky. One woman who fainted was found to have had three ribs broken in the crush.

TROUBLE OVER LABORERS

Employment Agents Come to Blows in Strife for Men.

There was a miniature tempest at the Hanson employment agency on Second street yesterday afternoon when the manager, R. E. Hanson, attempted to hold the effects of 28 Greek laborers, who had broken their contract with him. Hanson signed the workmen on Sunday. Yesterday they met W. J. Morris, of a rock-quarry outfit, who was looking for men. Morris, it is said, offered them a job with free transportation to the quarry. They took him up and went for their effects, which had been lodged at the Hanson agency. Hanson objected, and a wordy war ensued with Morris. A riot call was sent to the police station, and half a dozen officers ran to the place to find the trouble had blown over. Later Morris got out a warrant charging Hanson with having struck him. Hanson put up \$10 bail for his appearance in Police Court today.

MAKE UNIVERSITY GIVE UP

Waggoner Accused of Preferring Catholic Institution to Others.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—Suits were instituted in the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia today to compel the Catholic University of America to relinquish securities aggregating \$87,185, said to have been given to the university by Thomas E. Waggoner, a short time before proceedings in bankruptcy were begun against him. The suit was begun by Thomas J. Stealy and others, H. Roddy Dulany, trustee in bankruptcy of the estate of Waggoner, is named as one of the defendants.

STRANGER IN LARGE OF EVERYDAY LIFE

Candy-Store Girl Recognized as Long-Lost Daughter of Californian.

PROVES TO BE ANOTHER

Her Features and Given Name and Many Circumstances of Her Life Correspond With Those of the Missing Girl.

SYNOPSIS.

CHAPTER I.—A beautiful 2-year-old girl baby whose mother had died only a short time before was left with a dark-complexioned woman in San Francisco while the father went East to settle up an estate belonging to his mother. Bradley, director of the Bush Temple Conservatory in Chicago. Professor Bradley will decide just what course Miss Ronald should take up and it is probable that in the near future she will enter the school at Chicago. A sister, Miss Clara L. Ronald, formerly a schoolteacher in this city. She now resides in Sacramento, the wife of Rolf Lowry.

Still possessing pictures of his lost baby, the father of being reunited with what he thought was the little daughter Albert Gants awaits in his home, clinging to the hope that some day he will find his child. That in reality Miss Ronald is his only child, missing so many years. 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portation interests of both rail and steamer. No wonder the trusts and corporations fought us, nor that wholesale houses, retailers, bartenders, renters of houses, must be driven to the wall by the movement. The one wonder is that we should have gained nearly 11,000 votes in six years, thus showing what impetus the movement had gained when all men understood that prohibition was not the issue.

The Oregonian is again right in saying: "If the question shall be submitted again (in the same manner) two years hence, the outcome, in all human probability, will be the same."

But it will not be submitted in the same manner two years hence. Business men are beginning to realize that sensible women are not seeking for prohibition, but for liberty. Men's proposed amendment to the existing local-option law was defeated because the "people"—that is, the "majority" of the voters—were so determined to prohibit equal suffrage that they prohibited their own amendment by mistake.

The Pacific Monthly well says that our present local-option law, so called, "with that distinctive every liberty-loving man and woman, if women are to be represented in it equally with men. Prohibition in any form is not liberty, and the very worst form of it exists in the prohibition of women's right to representation in a government that bases its claim to justice on the consent of the governed."
