

IOWA DEMOCRATS SELECT PORTER

Adopt Anti-Protection, Anti-Trust Platform, and Indorse Bryan.

THEIR LEADER'S WAR CRY

Chairman Says Unselfishness in Politics Is Needed—Sympathy With Gompers' Labor Political Movement.

WATERLOO, Ia., Aug. 7.—The ticket nominated by the Democratic state convention today follows: Governor, Claude R. Porter, Appanoose County. Lieutenant-Governor, John G. Denison Jr., Dubuque County. Secretary of State, J. S. McLean, Guthrie County. Auditor, C. E. Munroe, Mahaska County. Treasurer, L. F. Danforth, Calhoun County. Attorney-General, Fred A. Townsend, Monroe County. Superintendent Public Instruction, W. S. Wilson, Lyon County. Judges Supreme Court, L. M. Fisher, Scott County; E. M. Carr, Delaware County. Clerk of Supreme Court, T. W. Keenan, Page County. Reporter of Supreme Court, H. M. Parker, Muscatine County. Railroad Commissioner, W. L. Carpenter, Polk County, and E. K. Stoll, Henry County.

WATERLOO, Ia., Aug. 7.—The Democratic State Convention today nominated a full state ticket, headed by Claude R. Porter, of Appanoose County, for Governor, adopted a platform and adjourned sine die tonight. The platform favors a tariff for revenue only, election of United States Senators by direct vote of the people, and demands the enactment of such legislation as will effectively destroy all trusts. The platform expresses sympathy with the purposes of National Labor organizations as set forth in recent addresses by Samuel Gompers, John Mitchell and others, calling on labor to assert its political rights at the ballot-box. A resolution was adopted pledging to William J. Bryan the support of Iowa Democrats for time Presidency in 1908. Causes for the selection of members of the state committee disclosed the fact that the conservatives have control of the committee. There was but one caucus in which there was a contest, the Ninth District, where J. J. Hughes, of Council Bluffs, was elected after a fight had been made on him as not being a free silver man. This was the only evidence of factionalism in the caucus. The delegates went to work early, devoting themselves in the main to the fight over the nomination for Governor. The so-called conservatives rallied around ex-Senator Ball, while the men who three years ago covered the convention for Hearst rallied around John Denison. The conservatives turned to ex-Senator Porter as a compromise, and then an effort was made to have ex-Congressman Wade enter the race. He refused, and worked for Ball. Daniel Hamilton, of St. Clair, the temporary chairman, spoke in part as follows:

Unselfish Patriots Needed.

What is greatly desired at this time is American patriotism. Not the kind that can only be aroused by the noise of the cannon or by the strains of martial music, but that kind of patriotism that is willing to lay aside self, party and all else and determine what is best for the country. The principles of the welfare of the country first and self and political party as only secondary; that spirit of citizenship that cannot be swayed from its duty to man by any allegiance to the glitter of gold or the prospect of individual preference or power, and that is the spirit that dominates the Democratic party, which is reflected by its almost unanimous preference for the Presidency in 1908 of the man who above all others represents the American ideal of "the man before the dollar."

Drastic Measures of Reform.

We are at this time confronted with a condition of affairs unparalleled in the history of our Nation and when we consider what has taken place in this country in the last ten years, graft, fraud, bribery and corruption of every sort, the forming of great combinations into greater and unparalleled trusts, the brazen boldness on the part of the big money-makers of our national wealth and property where they had hitherto shown some secrecy and timidity—when we realize the magnitude of these things it becomes important for us to inquire what has produced these conditions and why all this graft, corruption and favoritism, and what is the remedy. The people at this time have a great work before them and one that calls for true American patriotism as well as for deliberation and determination to be just. Conditions that prevail in great municipalities, state and national governments demand drastic measures, only limited by a desire to be absolutely just and any measure to accomplish these ends cannot be called radical until it has placed the reins of the government in the hands of the people and released them from the influence of corporate greed and selfish interest.

People Must Regain Control.

The control of affairs of the Government has gotten away from the people and it is necessary for them to come forward and resume it. A false theory has arisen in this country, both dangerous and vicious to the true American ideal, and has led us away from the true principles of Democracy. When this Government was established it was for the purpose of securing freedom, independence, happiness and comfort for the whole people as well as for the principles of Democracy. No idea of wealth or power was considered, only as it might result from the industry, integrity and intelligence of the people; but it now seems that the time is past and spirit has crept into the affairs of the Nation that has made wealth and power its guiding star and the interests of the individual but secondary.

To become a world power and count its gold has been the idea that has possessed the mind of those who by manipulation of one war or another have succeeded in getting the ear of the powers that control the Government. From this position we must recede if we wish to return to the people the principles of Democracy as taught by Jefferson and Jackson and Republicanism as taught by Lincoln.

Greetings Sent to Bryan.

The chairman was instructed to send to William J. Bryan at Venice a message extending the greetings of Iowa Democrats and "best wishes for a safe journey home."

Vinton, was elected chairman. The credentials committee reported that there were no contests.

Platform of Many Planks.

The platform unanimously adopted demands legislation to destroy trusts, favors rate regulation in Iowa to give rates as low as interstate rates, favors a 2-cent passenger fare, a state primary law that will protect all parties, election of United States Senators by direct vote of the people; favors laws to punish corporations for contributing to political funds; expresses sympathy with the political programme of the National Labor leaders and favors assessment of railroads in Iowa by a nonpartisan commission. On the tariff question the platform says:

We believe in tariff for revenue only. There should be immediate relief granted to the people now being robbed by exorbitant prices exacted under shelter of the tariff. We believe the people who produce our wealth, who pay our taxes, who fight the battles of the republic, are entitled to purchase the goods manufactured in this country as cheaply as the people who reside abroad. We denounce the extortion imposed upon our people under the pretense of protection as an outrage upon the consumer and upon the poor and upon the laboring people who produce the wealth of the country. We believe the tariff should be removed from all trust-made goods and favor the removal of all duties from iron, steel, lumber and coal. We demand the enactment of such legislation as will effectively destroy all trusts and the strict enforcement of all laws conceived the same.

Peerless Leader Indorsed.

The following was added as an indorsement of Bryan:

We indorse the exalted character, the peerless statesmanship, the high-minded and pure personality of Democracy's conceded leader, William Jennings Bryan, and pledge him our unqualified support for the Presidency.

Crittenden a Bryan Man.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—Thomas T. Crittenden, of Kansas City, who was elected Governor of Missouri in 1890, and is the oldest living former Governor of that state, will be one of the Missouri delegates who will come to this city to welcome Mr. Bryan, nominated for and elected President. I was not in full accord with his views on silver, but I believed then as I believe now, that he would make the best President ever in that chair."

New Jersey Candidates for Congress.

NEWARK, N. J., Aug. 7.—Congressman William H. Wiley was renominated by the Republicans of the Eighth district last night. John S. Gibson was nominated for Congress by the Republicans of the Seventh district.

Bryan Visits Pompeii.

NAPLES, Aug. 7.—William J. Bryan today visited Pompeii. He will proceed from Naples to Rome.

SOP TO PEASANTS

Stolypin Will Hasten Division of Crown Land.

WIN THEM TO CZAR'S SIDE

Will Settle Agrarian Question and Seek Support of Nation in Election on That Issue—Two Officials Are Punished.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 7.—The real intention of the government when it dissolved the lower house of Parliament, as revealed by a member of the Cabinet to the Associated Press this afternoon, shows that Premier Stolypin at least intends to pursue and hold an affirmative policy amounting virtually to a determination on the part of the administration to settle the agrarian question according to its own lights and irrespective of Parliament and then go to the country upon this issue.

Win Peasants by Giving Land.

The government expects to rally not only the landed interests but the mass of the peasants to its side by actually giving the latter some relief instead of merely holding out hopes of a more advantageous settlement in the indefinite future. Politically this movement may prove very strong. The actual bestowal of land, even if in smaller quantities than expected, and the division of communal holdings will, it is believed, make the peasantry disinclined to vote for candidates to the lower house who might propose a totally different solution of the question.

Difficult to Raise Cash.

But above all, individual possession, the government calculates, will incite that very respect for property the lack of which, under the system of communal holdings, has made many peasants such easy converts to the theory of the nationalization of land. The crux of the question is its financial aspect. It will be a herculean operation to find the funds required to purchase the private holdings which the project of Minister of Agriculture Stolypin contemplates acquiring through the land banks.

Officials Are Discharged.

The government is holding to strict accountability the responsible officials of the government institutions which are affected by the strike. Director Suverov, of the large printing establishment attached to the Official Messenger, where the compositors struck Monday, has been discharged and the Minister of Railways has demanded the resignation of Superintendent Laurence of the Ironoff Railroad, for permitting strikers to interfere with traffic on his road.

STRIKE WILL BE CALLED OFF

Radicals Make Fizzel and Moderate Party Rejoices.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 7.—The Workmen's Council has decided to call off the strike in St. Petersburg. This action does not apply to the provinces, but there is little doubt that the workmen there will follow St. Petersburg's example.

Negro Hanged for Assault.

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., Aug. 7.—Edward Bateman, a negro, found guilty of assaulting a young woman at Aurora, last February, was hanged at Mount Vernon today. Bateman on the scaffold denied his guilt.

KILL FIVE JAPANESE

Americans Take Summary Action in Alaska.

WERE POACHING FISHERS

Cutter McCulloch Captures Survivors of Party Which Violated New Fishery Law—Regret Expressed to Japan.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—A special to the Tribune from Washington says:

A report of the killing of five Japanese fishermen and the capture of 12 Japanese prisoners on Attu Island, the westernmost of the Aleutian group, the prisoners having been taken by the revenue cutter McCulloch, commanded by Captain J. C. Cantwell, was made to the Department of Commerce and Labor today by Edwin W. Sims, Solicitor for the Department, who is in Alaska to enforce the law prohibiting all persons not citizens of the United States from fishing in Alaskan waters. The Japanese killed were shot by Americans on Attu Island before the McCulloch arrived.

Lawrence O. Mufsey, Acting Secretary of Commerce and Labor, promptly turned the cable dispatch over to Robert Bacon, Acting Secretary of State. Mr. Bacon will immediately communicate the information he has received to the Japanese Ambassador and will express regret that the Japanese poachers were so summarily dealt with.

Because of the encroachment of Japanese fishermen and sealers in Alaskan waters, Congress was obliged during the session just ended to enact two laws calculated to encourage the fishing industry of Alaska among Americans and to prohibit Japanese and other aliens from engaging in it.

The cable dispatch from Mr. Sims does not make entirely clear the character of the offense of which the Japanese were guilty, but it does show that the officers and crew of the McCulloch were in no way responsible for the killing of the fishermen, and that those who were captured were trespassers on American territory, having come ashore probably to salt and cure their catch.

There is no reason to expect international complications as a result of the incident, but there is no question that the situation in the Aleutian Islands, especially as it affects the Japanese, is a delicate one, and that numerous difficulties are certain to be encountered in enforcing the laws protecting American citizens and their rights.

Skilled Men Wanted on Canal.

CHICAGO, Aug. 7.—The Government wants 500 skilled mechanics for service on the Panama Canal. Henry A. Smith, emigrating agent of the Immigration and Customs Commission, arrived in Chicago today to recruit these men. The class of men wanted are mechanics, boiler-makers, blacksmiths, locomotive engineers, conductors and brakemen. They will be furnished transportation.

Thompson Says It's False Alarm.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Ambassador Thompson, at Mexico City, after communicating with the 32 American Consular officers in Mexico, has advised the State Department that the replies received by him indicate that there is no truth in reports of an uprising against foreigners said to have been arranged for September.

Sailors Will Tattoo No More.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—The enlisted men in the Navy have instituted a movement to do away with tattoo-marking, which was formerly so popular with sailors. Since the conviction of a Brooklyn man, through the efforts of officers of

the Humane Society, for mutilating the arms of a young boy by decorating them with India ink designs, tattooers have shown unwillingness to embellish the bodies of men who are not known to be of age, and, as few adults care to have their bodies decorated, the practice may soon become a thing of the past. Tattoo marks are a ready means of identification of deserters.

Indians Will Serve in Navy.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Among the recent recruits for the navy have been a number of young Indians, who were educated at the Carlisle Indian School in Pennsylvania.

Fremont Ordered to Europe.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Commander J. C. Fremont has been appointed naval attaché at the American Embassies in France and Russia.

Lord Kitchener was a quiet boy, good at books, but not brilliant at gymnastics or outdoor games. He was said to be a shy, self-contained lad who showed a distinct talent for figures.
