OPPOSED BY ARCHITECTS. Limiting of Height of Buildings Is Strongly Objected To.

Portland architects by no means favor the proposed ordinance limiting the height of all structures except those of a certain class.

"From an aesthetic standpoint," said E. Kroner last evening, "the skyscraper is not the thing; but such buildings as those which are erected or contemplated do not menace the public in any way.

"Such buildings as have been erected in this city have given no cause for interference with the health of structures and those who are agitating the matter are exciting themselves unnecessarily.

"I am most emphatically of the opinion that it is not the business of a man's business unless he menaces the public good, and he is certainly not doing so when he erects a skyscraper."
