STENSLAND IN EAST

Seen by Old Friend on Train in Pittsburg.

ALMOST MAD WITH WORRY

Begs Man Who Recognizes Him Not to Give Him Away—Came From Buffalo, and Believed to Be in East.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 15.—Paul O. Stensland, the defaulting president of the Milwaukee-Avenue State Bank of Chicago, was in Pittsburg today and at present is thought to be in the East. Stensland was seen aboard a Pennsylvania Railroad train at the Union Station by Oscar Holmer, a mechanical engineer, who used to be a close friend of Stensland but who had not seen him for two years. Holmer had gone to the station to meet a friend that was on his way East and, while they were talking in the Pullman car, his attention was attracted to a man seated near. In telling of the incident, Holmer said today: "I walked up to him and said, 'Hello, Stensland, what are you doing here?' " "For God's sake," he said, "is it you? Don't give me away."

"I told him he and his affairs were none of my business and that he started to talk. He said he supposed I knew all about his trouble and declared he was almost out of his mind with worry. He told me he was going East and said he had plenty of money."

"My friend, who came from Rochester via Buffalo, told me the man whom I

recognized had been on the train from that city and they had talked together."

The train left here at 8 A. M.

CASHER BACKED BOOKIES.

Hering Represented Himself as a

Wealthy Man Seeking "Suckers."

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—(Special.)—Absolute proof that Henry Hering, cashier of the wrecked Milwaukee-Avenue State Bank, was financial backer of a book-making syndicate which laid odds on horse races, was brought to light today, when Inspector Shippy found a check made payable to Harry M. Smith, who for years ran the Buffet at 56 South State street, and whose place was closed this Spring, because of running a hand-book, that handbook being none other than that run by the syndicate headed by Hering, but whose name never appeared as connected with it until today. Other men in the syndicate were Charles Francis, Thomas Rowe, Walter Frantzen, Harry Thorpe and Henry Troy.

All these men were interviewed by the inspector and all admitted that they were connected with the book, but denied that they knew that Hering was connected with any bank, and said that he represented that he was a wealthy man, and that he wanted to increase his wealth by separating "a few suckers from their loose change."

HAD SOUGHT OUT SAFE REFUGE

Stensland Left Notes Telling Where

Law Cannot Pursue.

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—It was announced by the police today that a value taken by President Stensland, of the Milwaukee-Avenue State Bank, when he left home, had been found in a Wisconsin village, the name of which is kept secret. It was a note book giving routes to countries where extradition treaties are such that it would be difficult to secure the return of a fugitive from justice. The countries mentioned are Honduras, India and Canada.

The directors of the Milwaukee-Avenue State Bank today repudiated the Chicago Title Trust Company as receiver. The directors were unanimously in favor of supporting Receiver Fetzner.

IN TOTTERING FILES

Veterans of Civil War March in Thinned Array.

HEAT PROSTRATES MANY

Minneapolis Enjoys Grand Army Spectacle and Cheers Old Soldiers—Oldest and Youngest in Line—One Dies.

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 15.—For the 40th time since its work was finished and its glory won, the Grand Army was in line today. There have been many parades more gorgeous, spectacles more dazzling and bewildering, but never has there been in this country one more appealing and impressive than that which passed through the streets of Minneapolis during the greater part of this morning.

The parade was a notable affair, as such things go, well handled, quick moving and inspiring to look upon. It was a day of pride for the old soldiers in themselves and for the multitude in the soldiers. Over the heads of the veterans, as they marched along, countless flags snapped in the breeze, and their lines passed for miles between buildings gorgeously decorated in their honor. The day was ideal. Several sharp showers during the night dispelled the oppressiveness of the season and a cool breeze swept the streets.

Cheers for Female Drill Corps.

With the head of the column, which moved promptly at 10 o'clock, was a mounted platoon of police. Directly behind the police and at the head of the

parade proper came the magnificent Cook Drum Corps and Band, of Denver, its drum major, General Fred B. Wood, chief of staff, General Fred B. Wood, Adjutant-General of Minnesota, who was followed by officers composing the regimental and staff officers of the Minnesota National Guard. Then, marching in splendid, even ranks, with their formations superbly kept throughout the entire parade, came the first of the old soldiers—Columbia Post, of Chicago—acting as the principal escort of the commander-in-chief. Behind this post came Commander-in-Chief, Tanner, mounted, and attended by his personal staff. Following the officers of the organization came the men who were the life guard of the Nation—the heroes of the Civil War. The states marched in order of their admission to the Grand Army, Illinois having the right of the line, followed by Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Ohio and New York in the order named. Twenty other states followed these.

In the band which preceded the Rock Island, Ill., veterans were represented the extremes of enlistment in the Civil War—the one being Anson M. Hubbard, of Moline, Ill., who, although 90 years old, marched in as springy a manner and blew his life as shrilly as he did during the war. The other extreme was seen in the person of Lyndon D. Howe, of Streator, Ill., who was the youngest man to enlist during the war.

After the men from New York came the scarlet banner of Massachusetts, then New Jersey and Maine, after which came the first of the far Western states, California and Nevada being marched together. Their men were few in number. New England came to the front once more with the men from Rhode Island, New Hampshire and Vermont. The latter state was especially well represented, many members of the famous old "Vermont Brigade" being in line.

Maryland had a small detachment and then came long ranks of the Western soldiers of the armies of the Cumberland and of the Tennessee, marching under the banners of Michigan, Indiana,

Iowa, Missouri and Kentucky. The last of the line was Minneapolis. Its soldiers received hearty greetings as they closed the long line. The column was about three hours in passing a given point. The line of march was two miles. The relief corps was busy during the day collecting the men and women who became prostrated by heat and fatigue and carrying them to the hospitals. In addition to these prostrations there were many cases of exhaustion, none of which is serious.

A. Martin, senior vice-commander of the Department of the Potomac and a clerk in the Treasury Department at Washington, became ill while marching and died as he was being taken to the hospital.

George Penney, of Logan, Ia., stepped in front of an automobile and was run over and seriously injured.

NO ROOM FOR JAPANESE

Berkeley Grammar Schools Declared to Be Too Crowded.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 15.—(Special.)—City Superintendent of Schools Waterman, of Berkeley, has refused the applications of at least a dozen Japanese students for the grammar grades, alleging that there is insufficient room at that account. However, in every case Japanese applications have been refused.

Consul Uyeno has begun an inquiry and will report to Washington. When San Francisco made an effort to segregate the Japanese from other school children a year ago, Consul Uyeno made such a protest that the plan was immediately abandoned.

Court-Martial of Executive Officer.

MARE ISLAND, Cal., Aug. 15.—A court-martial convened today to try Edward H. Dunn, executive officer of the receiving ship Independence, on the charge of conduct unbecoming an officer and gentleman. The court-martial is composed of Admiral Miller, president; Captain Perkins, Phelps and McCracken, Medical Inspector and Commander A. W. Dodd, Paymaster Potter, Captain Robert Cutts,

Judge-Advocate, Second Lieutenant White is assisted by Attorney J. T. Riden for the defense.

The defense challenged Admiral Miller and Commander Dodd as members of the court, on the ground of implied bias in cases where liquor acted as a means to irresponsibility or insanity. The challenge of the defense was overruled. Miller and Dodd stated that they would give the defendant an impartial trial.

UNWRITTEN LAW SUPREME

New Orleans Judge Discharges Slayer of Unfaithful Wife.

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 15.—(Special.)—The belief of the people of the South in the unwritten law was evidenced here today, when Peter Manale's acquittal of the charge of murder of his faithless wife and the serious shooting of her paramour was greeted with such applause that the court officials had difficulty in restraining order. As the acquittal was announced, tears were streaming down the face of the Judge, and immediately after the trial he hastened to shake hands with the man who had just been acquitted.

Never before in the history of the court has there been a more dramatic climax to a case than was in the discharge of this young man, whose home had been ruined. Throughout the case Judge Austin paid the closest attention to the nature of the testimony given by some of the witnesses, and when Manale was placed on the stand it was with the most sympathetic look that the magistrate swore him. Manale gave all his testimony, and his attorney, Thomas J. Ford, said the defense would rest there.

"Let the accused go," said the Judge. As the decision was announced by the clerk, many of the spectators clapped their hands and beat the floor with their feet. The state made no effort to produce witnesses for the prosecution.

WILL GIVE RECEIPT

Solution for the Coney Island Street-Car War.

LEAVE COURTS TO DECIDE

Extra Fare to Be Repaid if Company Loses—Three High Officials of Rapid Transit Arrested for Causing Riots.

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—The troubles of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company with those of its patrons since Sunday have acted under an opinion by Supreme Court Justice Gaynor and refused to pay two 5-cent fares to Coney Island seemed tonight to be nearing an amicable adjustment. The company this afternoon adopted a plan suggested by Acting Mayor McGowan to give a rebate receipt to every person paying a 10-cent fare, 5 cents to be returned to the holder if the Court of Appeals upholds the decision of Justice Gaynor that 5 cents is the legal fare to Coney Island. If the court should decide that the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company is acting within its rights in charging double fare, however, the receipt is to be null and void.

Police Magistrate Higginbotham late tonight personally caused the arrest of Vice-President John E. Calderwood, General Traffic Manager Dow Smith and District Superintendent W. S. Newberry of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, on charges of inciting to riot and committing acts productive of public disorders.
