GROWERS BELIEVE PACKERS' REPORTS ARE UNFAIR.

J. E. Towle, of Salem, Says Conditions Have Been Misrepresented. Tendency to Bear Market.

SALEM, Oc., Aug. 16 .- (Special.) -- Prunegrowers in this vicinity think the packers have been given all the advantage in the pruns-crop reports published in this and other states, and declare that the conditions do not warrant the low prices that have been quoted for prunes. Rather, they say that the packers have taken an advantage, for the figures that have been published regarding the crop in this state have been given out by packers or buyers, and not by growers. Some of the growers think the situation has been mirrorresented.

of the growers think the situation has been misrepresented.

J. E. Towie, a successful prinegrower at Shaw, in this county, is one of these. He says the packers have been permitted to misrepresent crop conditions through the newspapers, and that the information they have given out has had a tendency to hear the market. The report that has become general regarding the crop situation is that the Northwest States will produce 40,000,000 pounds, which is in excess of the bumper crop of 1903. Mr. Towie does not undertake to give figures on the amount of the crop this year, but easys that his information, hased upon actual inspection of orchards, is that the actual inspection of orchards, is that the crop will not be more than two-thirds that of 1903. He says that, although the carly indications were that the crop would equal that of 1903, the long dry spell has made a great of 1963, the long dry spell has made a great change in the condition of the crop. There has been an unusually heavy drop, he says, and the prunes will not grow to as large a size as usual, with the result that the total weight of prunes produced will be much less than in 1968, when weather conditions were more favorable. Mr. Towle wants to record his estimate of the prune crop, and says that when the harvest is over the returns will show that the packers and buyers have overshow that the packers and buyers have over-estimated the yield for effect. Mr. Towie has already sold his prunes, and is therefore not interseted financially in the future of the market, except that he wants to see all prunemarket, except that he wants to see all prunegrowers get a fair price for their product.

S. P. Kimball, manager of the Salem CoOperative Cannery, who is an extensive grower
of prunes at Dalias, is another grower who
thinks the packers have reduced quotations to
a lower figure than conditions warrant. He
easy that he hears of no growers selling at
present quotations, and does not believe there
will be any. He is confident that there will
be a reaction, bringing prices up to a paying
basis, and he is not worrping over the stree.

Growers who have no dryers, but who de-pend upon selling their fruit green, are the ones that are likely to feel the depressed con-cilion of the prune market most. Owners of evaporators who buy prunes must regulate prices according to the present market. A bushel of prunes will dry out to about 18 pounds of cured fruit. In ordinary seasons bushed of prunes will dry out to about 18 pounds of cured fruit. In ordinary sensons a crop will average in the 49-50s size, but this year growers are counting on prunes going no better than 50-50 to the pound. On a 15-cent basis, which is now quoted, the 50-60 prunes would be worth 2½ cents a pound, or 44 cents for the dry product of a bushel of green prunes. It costs half a cent a pound to dry the fruit, or 9 cents for the 18 pounds a bushel will produce. This leaves 35 cents the owner of a dryer can expect to get for a bushel of prunes, and if he counts on making a profit to gover use of he counts on making a profit to cover use of dryer, chances of less by fire, trouble of re-selling, interest on money, etc., he must buy for about 30 cents.

In seasons when prunes were of a larger size and the market was more promising, 40 to 50 cents a bushel has been paid for fresh prunes, but owners of evaporators will not be able to pay that price this year.
