

GEORGE HAZZARD IN INDIANA JAIL

Former Washington Politician
Is Accused of
Forgery.

COUNTY HISTORY AUTHOR

Indorsements of Work Alleged to
Have Been Changed, and Sub-
scribers Turn on Him,
When He Sues.

KNIGHTSTOWN, Ind., Aug. 24.—(Special.)—What appears to have been a huge fraud perpetrated on many people in Henry, Madison, Delaware and other counties has resulted in the arrest of George Hazzard at Newcastle early this morning on a warrant issued by the prosecutor, charging him with forgery. Hazzard came to this county four years ago from Tacoma, Wash. Prior to coming here he had been secretary of the Democratic state committee in that state. Shortly after coming here, he announced that he intended to publish a "History of Henry County" and soon began soliciting indorsements for the proposed work. He visited leading business and professional men in every town and city in the county and also the rural districts, and obtained hundreds of names to a paper which merely indorsed his ability to write a work of this character.

The history was published recently in two volumes, and these were distributed throughout the county to men whose names were on the indorsement. Hazzard's agents made deliveries, and in many cases the books were left at the homes during business hours, when the men were at work. In hundreds of instances the books were refused and payment denied on the ground that the books were not subscribed for. However, Hazzard says he has the names that appeared on the indorsement as subscribers for the books.

In other instances, well-known men whose pictures and biographies appeared in the books were made defendants to suits demanding all the way from \$50 to \$250 each, and in nearly every case payment had been refused on the ground that the work was not ordered. Several of these suits have been filed by John R. George, a Chicago bookbinder, to whom, it is said, Hazzard has turned over the subscriptions.

NOT OUT FOR CANNON

revise the tariff, confident that, if it does not, the time is surely coming when the Democrats will gain control and will then revise it in a way that will bring discontent, unrest and possibly disaster.

Cannon's friends admit that Roosevelt personally favors Taft for President and say that he still prefers Taft to any other man, but they explain his alleged turn to the Speaker on the ground that the President, after carefully studying the political horizon, has become convinced that Taft could probably not be elected, even if nominated. They point to the fact that the President places his love of party above his preference for any one candidate, and admit that it appears that he has finally turned to Cannon because he is the strongest man in the field and the one most likely to be elected. They do not claim that the President advocates Cannon from choice, but purely from the point of necessity, because he would have Republican control of the Government continued after he himself retires.

Taft and Cannon Compared.

But how is Cannon stronger than Taft? Cannon is a pronounced stand-patter and if he should be nominated the tariff would be the issue. Would Cannon, running on a stand-pat platform, get the full Republican vote in 1907? The unrest in Iowa and in Massachusetts would not indicate it. The conditions in these two states are only exaggerated of the movement that is under way in other states, and frequent talks with politicians from many sections has developed scores of Republicans who will not vote for any candidate for President who is absolutely committed to the present Dingley tariff. Taft, on the other hand, would not run on a stand-pat platform, yet the sort of tariff revision he would advocate would not drive from him men of the Cannon type, the most intense stand-patters. Taft is as good a Republican as any of them; he would stand for as sound government as anyone in their ranks, and, knowing it, the stand-patters would give him their votes, even though they differed with him on one important issue. One thing certain—Taft, nominated on a tariff revision platform, would not let any Republican vote slip over into the Democratic column. The stand-patters would have to vote for Taft, for his failure to do so would aid in the election of a Democrat, and under a Democratic administration, provided there was a Democratic Congress, there would be such a revision of the tariff as would alarm even the followers of Governor Cummins. So, as far as the tariff is concerned, Taft has Cannon beat in a walk.

Gompers Would Fight Cannon.

Then there is the labor question. Cannon has become involved in a wrangle with President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, and he is fighting Gompers on his own challenge and will win. Gompers will not be able to defeat Cannon for re-election to Congress. Gompers is comparatively harmless, yet he is head of union labor in this country and, if he works persistently for the next two years, he will be able to arouse a great deal of anti-Cannon sentiment throughout the country. In some of the strong labor states Gompers might be able to defeat Cannon, but personally Taft has no quarrel with Gompers and if Taft should be nominated, Gompers would have noth-

ing on which to base an onslaught on the Republican nominee. So on the labor question, as on the tariff, Taft has a distinct advantage over Cannon.

From present indications the tariff and the labor question will be to the front in 1908, and Cannon's record in the session of Congress just closed will have been all but forgotten. Taft will be on the popular side; Cannon will be at a disadvantage. Roosevelt has declared until he is tired that he will not accept another nomination, but the very fact that the qualifications would like to have him is indication enough that his recommendations will bear great weight with the next convention. Of course, if Cannon's friends speak truly and the President should let it be known beyond all question of doubt that he wanted to see Cannon nominated, the Cannon boom might materialize into something tangible. But if the President, on the other hand, should cling to his present known preference and should advise the nomination of Taft, the Cannon boom would collapse after the convention had done honor to the Speaker of the House.

Not Good Presidential Timber.

Cannon has been a faithful worker in the Republican cause. He has served 22 years in the House and was once defeated, in the year when McKinley and other prominent Republicans went down beneath the Democratic avalanche. Few men have rendered more faithful or more valuable service in Congress. But for all that, Cannon would be a poor President of the United States. He is not rated as a first-class Presidential timber. In the rating Taft overtops him, and, together with his advantages, he does not carry some of the drawbacks or handicaps that attach to Cannon.

This being the situation, well known in Washington and among all who have carefully studied the situation, it may be set down for a fact that the President was either joking when he told Cannon he would be the next President of the United States, or else the President never made the statement. No man in his senses can believe the President seriously expressed any such opinion, particularly at a time when the Cannon boom had not even been launched. The story is fishy.

GIVE HILL TWO FOR ONE

VAN HORNE WILL RETALIATE FOR INVASION OF CANADA.

Says Hill Takes Revenge for Canadian Pacific Line to Spokane and Disparages His Line.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—Representatives of the two great railway systems of the Northwest that are at daggers' points

about invasions of each other's territory are in the city. They are James J. Hill, president of the Great Northern, and Sir William C. Van Horne, chairman of the directors of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Sir William promptly threw down the gauntlet to Mr. Hill when asked for his opinion of the latter's plan to build a Canadian line from the Pacific Ocean to Winnipeg, Manitoba, in retaliation for the Canadian Pacific's encroachment on the Great Northern's preserves.

"I don't know what Mr. Hill's plans are," said Sir William. "Mr. Hill may be seriously planning the building of some line into Canadian Pacific territory, and while I am little more than an individual director in that company, I do not hesitate to say that two miles of line in the interest of Canadian Pacific will be built in his territory to every mile he builds in that of the Canadian Pacific." Sir William expressed belief that the real motive for Mr. Hill's project to build a Canadian line was the active competition of the Canadian Pacific in through business from Chicago to Spokane, Wash. "Mr. Hill," he said, "is foolish to attribute his attitude to any other motive. In carrying through business from Chicago to Spokane his company adds to its through rates the local rate from Spokane to the Coast and back. Mr. Hill has built a few spurs northward into Canada, but I don't see how he can make profitable a through line from Vancouver across the mountains to Winnipeg along the route he talks about. From the Fraser River Valley to that place he would have a heavy grade system, and he would have to parallel a branch line of the Canadian Pacific.

"If he has discovered easy passes through the mountains he has accomplished something that our engineers could not discover. Our engineers have gone over nearly every square foot of the territory, proceeding along the crests of the mountain ranges and making note of every available depression.

Mr. Hill, when informed of Sir William's observations, intimated that the Canadian Pacific's interests evidently did not have a clear vision of the situation. "That talk about the rates to Spokane is nonsense," he said, "but I am not going to talk back. The Canadian line is going to be built, and it will be built by Hill and his friends. I am not building any railroad as an individual. It is a Great Northern enterprise."
