

TWO CANDIDATES AGAINST BOSSES

Hearst and Jerome Both Profess to Desire Purified Democracy.

BOTH DETEST TAMMANY

Hearst Candidate of Independence League and Does Not Expect Tammany's Support—Jerome Wants to Kill Corruption.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—William Randolph Hearst said today, when asked whether he would accept the nomination for Governor from the Democratic convention:

"I will be a candidate of the Independence League, if I run, but I certainly shall not object to the Democrats or others voting for me."

"What do you think of the candidacy of Mr. Jerome for the office of Governor of New York?" he was asked.

"I think Jerome is doing what he is told to do by the representatives of the interests which contributed to his last campaign fund and to which he is under obligation," was the reply.

Aim to Obscure Issue.

"The object of the men who control Jerome is to create a diversion so that there will not be a crystallization of public sentiment as to the real issue. The real issue is the politics without boss control through corrupt forces. The question is whether the people shall control politics independent of the domination of corporations coming through criminal bosses."

"It seems to me that Mr. Jerome's course shows plainly that he is more anxious to satisfy the bosses than he is to serve the people. I think his candidacy is insincere, as well as somewhat foolish."

"Do you think it possible that Mr. Jerome will be nominated for Governor by the Democrats?"

"Mr. Messers. Ryan and Belmont control the convention. I consider it not only possible but probable that Mr. Jerome will be the Democratic nominee."

Scorns Tammany Support.

Mr. Hearst was then asked concerning the statements of C. F. Murphy, leader of Tammany Hall, to the effect that Mr. Murphy was supporting him.

"I do not believe Murphy is supporting me now," said Mr. Hearst, "nor do I believe that he would support me at any critical point. It has amused me greatly when such men as Murphy, McCann and Sullivan have come out as my supporters. They have not meant what they said. There have been many stories as to my alleged alliance with Murphy, but I have denied them publicly."

"The object of these bosses in saying that they were supporting me has been, I believe, to affect primary voting and to confuse men who are really on my side. The primary principle of the Independence League, of which I am a member, has been the destruction of bosses and corruption, and I cannot see how such men as Murphy can really be out for my support. It is also true that when a man goes after the scalp of another he does not often get the support of the pursued."

No Coolness With Bryan.

"Is there any truth in the report, Mr. Hearst, that there is a coolness between you and Mr. Bryan, because of the fact that you may be a Presidential candidate in 1908?"

Mr. Hearst laughed. "Not the slightest truth," he said. "The secret of my attitude toward the Bryan campaign has been explained very simply," continued Mr. Hearst. "I am a member of the Independence League, which represents both Democrats and Republicans. I feel that officially I should take no part in this Bryan matter. I feel that it might not be proper to take official action which would ally the league with the Bryan movement."

"I will say, however, that I intend to pay a visit to Mr. Bryan in my private capacity, and also to attend the meeting, I will go on the ground that I am an American, who can do as he pleases."

"As to the story that there is a coolness between myself and Mr. Bryan, I will say there is none, unless Mr. Bryan has changed his mind since he left for Europe. I will go further and say that he sent me a letter of congratulation on my run for the Mayoralty and, if there is a coolness it has begun since the date of that letter."

All Depends on Tammany.

John H. Stanchfield, who was the Democratic candidate for Governor in 1904, declared today that Hearst would be nominated by the Bryan convention if the New York delegation should be for him. "New York County will hold the balance of power in the state convention," he said. "If New York County, Hearst, the convention will undoubtedly nominate him. But if New York is against him, it is equally certain, in my opinion, that the convention will choose another candidate."

DOES NOT UNDERSTAND HEARST

Jerome Wants Democratic Nomination to Drive Out Corruption.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—In reply to the remarks of W. R. Hearst, District Attorney William Travers Jerome tonight gave out a statement in which he said in part: "The situation shows the need of a fight, because the mechanism of the party has fallen into the hands of men that nobody can trust and that a decent man cannot deal with on common ground."

Referring to a statement attributed to Mr. Hearst that he would run only as the nominee of the Independence League, Mr. Jerome said:

"I don't understand exactly what Mr. Hearst means by that. He doesn't tell us whether the Independence League aims to become a state party or whether it is only a movement in the Democratic party to purify that party. It can hardly be the latter, when Hearst says that he can't go to see Bryan, the candidate of the league, because the league is composed of Democrats and Republicans, and that he could only see Mr. Bryan in his personal capacity. The logic of that, to my mind, is that the league aims to become an independent state party. If this be true, how can the Democratic delegates who are pledged to vote for Mr. Hearst at the Buffalo convention cast their votes for the candidate of that other party?"

Governor Without Strings.

Asked if he were going to make any fight for control at the coming primaries, Mr. Jerome replied:

"No, I will not. I am opposed to the Democratic organization in the City of New York. In fact, I have always been fighting it, as I believe it was organized for corrupt purposes. I did not seek to

get in this fight, only there were principles involved and no one else would stand for them. The success of my fight would mean that I would not be a Democratic Governor, but simply Governor, and I would not use the powers of that office to build up the Democratic organization or to depress the Republicans."

What He Told Hill.

"I told Governor Hill in 1904 that, if I were ever Governor, I would use the prestige such a victory would give me—I say victory not simply as the candidate of a party, but a victory without strings to it—so that we could look for a great strong militant Democracy in this state, held together by principles, not by peanut patronage or petty doles."

"Wouldn't it be possible, as you desire to be as valuable without the regular party stamp on him?" Mr. Jerome was asked.

"No, I don't think so, for I don't believe I can make it. It would be possible to work our system of politics without parties. There is a relation of state parties to National parties which I think would not make this possible, even if desirable. The important thing is the driving out of the party of those who have got control of the organization. We of the Democratic party have not had significant time a Democrat who was the real choice of the party."

TILLMAN'S ENEMY WINS

ANSEL FOR GOVERNOR, BUT DISPENSARY IS AHEAD.

Senator Finds Divided Success in Struggle for Control of South Carolina Democracy.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Aug. 28.—The state primary election held today attracted unusual attention and the vote was large. The dispensary was the issue in most of the counties, there being two sets of candidates, one favoring and the other opposed to the dispensary. Incomplete returns indicate that a majority of the dispensary advocates have been chosen.

Interest in the election centered in the race for Governor and the contest for Attorney-General. Senator Tillman made about 20 speeches in favor of the dispensary. He supported Richard L. Manning for Governor and was opposed to M. E. Ansel, who stands on a local option platform. He also opposed J. P. Lyon for Attorney-General. Lyon is against the dispensary and as a member of the executive investigating committee announced that he was investigating early transactions of Mr. Tillman when Governor.

Incomplete returns from nearly every county give Ansel a considerable lead over Manning.

TYSON TO BE CHIEF JUSTICE

Come's Majority for Governor of Alabama Will Reach 2000.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Aug. 28.—Returns from yesterday's Democratic primary indicated that John H. Tyson, of Montgomery, has carried enough counties to insure his nomination for Chief Justice. G. Come's majority for Governor will reach 200. Gray leads for Lieutenant-Governor. W. W. Brantley has been nominated for State Auditor. Walter Deed for Treasurer and Frank N. Julian for Secretary of State.

For alternate United States Senators, Congressman Bankhead leads, with the second place close between Johnston and Knox.

W. B. Craig is nominated for Congress in the Fourth District; Congressman J. L. Burnett in the Seventh and U. O. Underwood in the Ninth Districts, were unopposed.

Hughes Denies He Is Candidate.

LEAMINGTON, Eng., Aug. 28.—Charles E. Hughes, of New York, who was the attorney for the Armstrong insurance investigation committee has been spending several days in the vicinity of this watering place and last night was sufficiently interested in the news of the New York political situation to ask all about the various gubernatorial candidates.

"Everybody knows that I am not a candidate," said Mr. Hughes, "and I have had no communication with anybody in New York on any political subject since I left home. No, I have sent no message of any sort to Benjamin Odell, Governor Higgins or anybody else."

When pressed to say whether he would be a candidate for nomination against Higgins or would run against Jerome Mr. Hughes replied: "I am not going to set up any hypothesis and discuss it." Mr. Hughes will sail for home today on the steamship Carmania.

DIES OF HEART FAILURE

Passenger on Steamer Roanoke Succumbs as Vessel Leaves Astoria.

As the steamer Roanoke was pulling out of Astoria about midnight Monday on her way to this city, William J. Fisher, a hotel man of San Francisco, dropped dead on deck from heart failure. He was accompanied by his wife and three daughters, and was on his way to this city, after an absence of several years. He had gone ashore at Astoria and walked up town, and arrived back at the steamer apparently in good health and had gone to his cabin, but when the voyage up the river was commenced he desired to view the scenery by moonlight, and had just stepped on deck with his family when stricken with the fatal attack. He died instantly, and the body was taken in charge by Coroner Finley on the arrival of the vessel. No inquest will be held, as the death was plainly due to heart failure. The funeral will be held today or tomorrow, although the exact date had not been set last evening, owing to the desire to notify several relatives and friends in this city. The Roanoke brought a full cargo of passengers and freight, most of the latter being discharged yesterday, and the work of loading her for the return trip will be commenced today. She is scheduled to sail on the return trip tomorrow evening.

Miner Kills Fellow in Duel.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Aug. 28.—George Melich and M. Yukamanovich, Montenegrin miners, spent Saturday drinking and quarreling. Friends frequently separated them during the day. Toward night, by agreement, they met near town, both armed. Melich shot five times without effect. Yukamanovich fired once, mortally wounding his adversary, and is now in hiding.

Troops Start to Batabano.

HAVANA, Aug. 28.—Three hundred veterans, infantry and cavalry, accompanied by General Francisco Peraza, started for Batabano this afternoon to cover that district. General Bernabe Roza, commanding 100 prominent veterans, most of whom served on the staff of the famous Maximo Gomez, started this evening for Pinar del Rio by special train. Gunboats took to Batabano 300 cases of ammunition. Mosquito gunboats are watching for filibusters.

How Government Inspectors Will Mark What Is Wholesome.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—(Special.)—Owing to the new meat inspection law, the number of inspectors' labels used will be more than doubled. Already the Agricultural Department has contracted to supply 10,000 for the month of September and after the law becomes effective this number will be increased to 15,000.

The tag is about one and one-quarter inches square. It is a thin sheet of galvanized iron with a few threads running on it. There is printed in blue letter a legend like this:

"United States. Inspected—passed 207." The number at the bottom is that of the abattoir inspector, who simply slaps the little tag on a piece of meat and the heat and moisture of the freshly-killed meat makes it stick. In a short time, the gelatine dissolves, the lines threads rub off and there is left nothing but the print of those blue letters in the meat. It cannot be removed, except by cutting. It is absolutely harmless.
