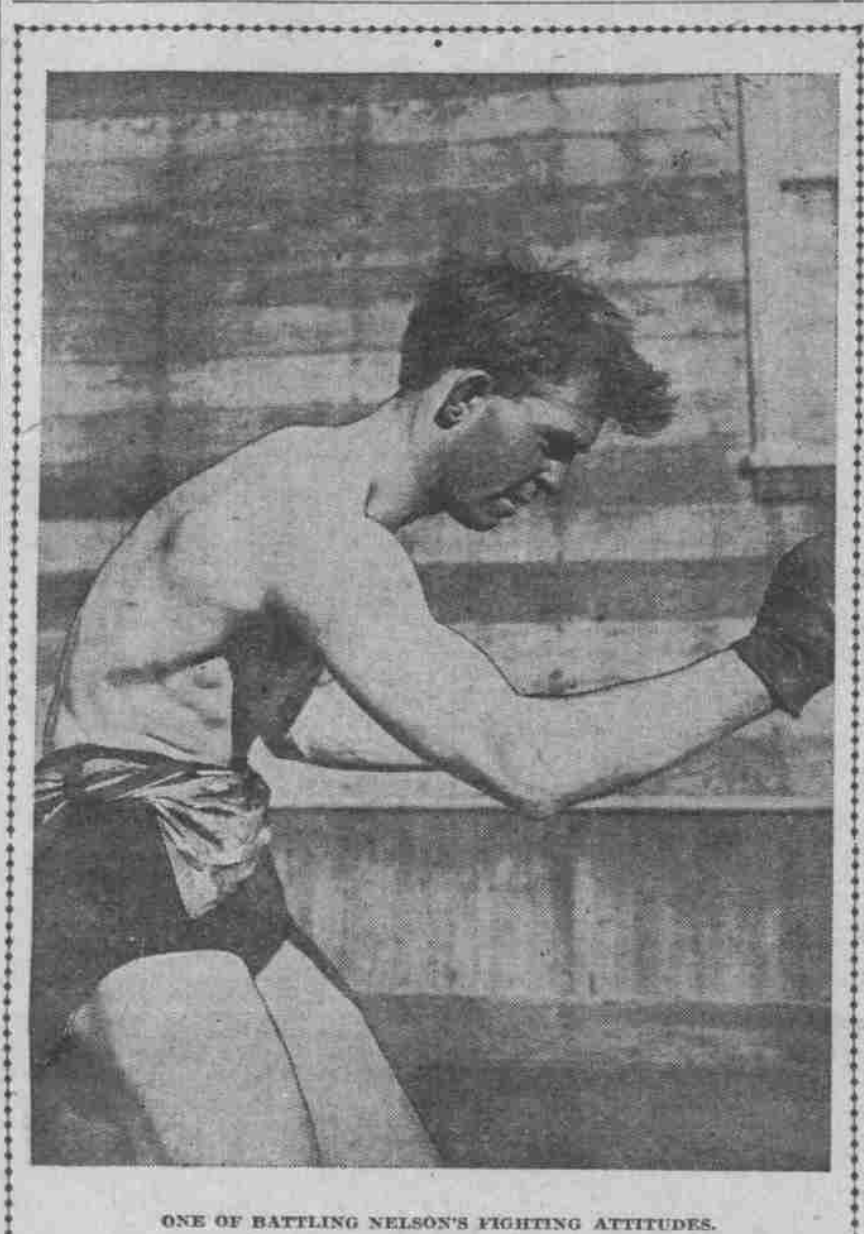

EXPERT BILLIARD MATCH

H. A. WRIGHT, OF SAN FRANCISCO,
CO, DEFEATS A. CLARK.

High-Class Amateur Has Average of
20 Points, Making 400 in 20
Innings of Play.

The greatest exhibition game of billiards ever played by an amateur in Portland was seen by a large audience last night at Corby's billiard parlors, when H. A. Wright, the high-class amateur of San Francisco, defeated A. Clark, of Portland, 400 to 124, at 14-inch ballgame. The visitor's average was exactly 20, his 400 points being made in 20 innings. The game was 400 to 300.

The exhibition of billiards by Mr. Wright was little short of marvelous for an amateur, considering the fact that he has played little since the San Francisco disaster, and hence was not in the best of practice. His runs were not specially large for him, but his play was steady and accurate. By a beautiful combination of draws, follows, and masses, in the fourth inning he clicked off 63, in the ninth 48, in the 12th 61, in the 16th 59, and in the 19th 61, falling down through carelessness on an easy shot for his last inning, which he made in the next

Clark played well, but was, of course, outclassed. His average of 6-15 is excellent for a class B player, especially when his high runs are only 21. Following is the detailed score:
