

Approves Suppression of Disorder.

The troubles growing out of the strikes in Colorado mining regions three years ago are attributed to Socialistic and anarchistic sentiment, "fostered and en-couraged by leaders of the Democratic party in this state for the purpose of in-fluencing the labor vote," and the Re-publican party is given credit for bringing about the "restoration of law and order."
