Roosevelt's Remarks to Riviero

Gratify Havana People.

HAVANA, Oct. 9.-President Roose-velt's statement at Washington yester-day to Nicholas M. Riviero, the Havana editor, that "the means taken by the United States to prevent disorder in Cuba must always be determined by the existing conditions and with reference to our solemn obligations to the people of Our solemn congrations to the people of Cuba," is causing considerable gratifica-tion here. This, it is pointed out, is not because the words attributed to the President indicate any definite change in his intentions, but because he did not say anything about the early restoration of the soversignty of the Republic of Cuba. The opinion is now absolutely universal in Havana that the early restoration of Cuba's sovereignty is utterly impracticable.
