THIEVES ARE PERSISTENT

EAST SIDE TAILOR HAS BEEN
ROBBED FIVE TIMES.

Burglars Make Repeated Raids on
His Store, Choosing Only the
Most Expensive Goods.

Five times has T. Schulze, the merchant tailor at 323 East Burnside street, been robbed, and the last robbery happened yesterday morning about 2 o'clock. Twice this week his place of business has been broken into. Tuesday morning when he came to his store Mr. Schulze discovered that \$50 worth of suitings had been stolen and one of the front windows smashed. Again yesterday morning he made the same unpleasant discovery. Another large pane of glass in the front door was broken, and several bolts of cloth were missing, making his losses this week nearly \$100.

A man coming on the third story of the building across the street heard a noise in front of the store early Friday morning and on looking out saw two men at work there. He did nothing, but went to sleep.

Mr. Schulze thinks that he is a marked man for robbery. "They are trying to put me out of business," he said. "All my profits have been eaten up by these repeated burglaries."

When he had his place of business on Union avenue he was robbed by wholesale, one-half of his stock having been hauled away in one night. His loss then ran up to \$800. Since he has been in business on East Burnside street his losses have amounted to between \$400 and \$500 in goods taken by burglars. Since including the first robbery he has lost over \$1000.

There is probably no case in the history of Portland that parallels this one, where a business has been marked for robbery, as evidently has Mr. Schulze. The goods taken were invariably selected with care. The suitings were kept on tables in bundles. From these the selections

were made, and always the best and most expensive goods were taken, as if the burglars were skilled in picking out first-class cloth. The bundles on the tables were disarranged as search was made for high-class goods, for the burglars wanted none but the best.

NIGHT SCHOOL SOON OPENS

Board of Education Will Elect
Teachers This Week.

A special meeting of the Board of Education will probably be called for some day early next week to elect teachers and make other arrangements for the opening of the night school which meets in the High School building. The directors have not yet formally set the time of opening for the night school, but it will probably be Monday, October 22.

During the past few years there has been a continuous increase in the attendance at the night school by young people who are employed during the regular school hours, but who still desire to secure an elementary education. Last year there were 684 pupils—277 female and 407 male—registered in the night classes. It is expected that the attendance will be much increased this year. The board has received many applications from those who desire to teach in the night school.

WITNESSES INTIMIDATED

RUSSIANS FEAR TO TESTIFY
AGAINST Nihilist.

Suspected Bombthrower Released,
but Officers Continue Search for
Writer of Threatening Letter.

Russian Nihilists so thoroughly terrorized seven witnesses for the state by threats of death that it was utterly impossible to adduce one particle of evidence tending to incriminate John Lewandowski, bomb-thrower and alleged murderer, and he was released in the Municipal Court yesterday morning by Judge Cameron. The latter's life had been threatened by the prisoner's friends. Lewandowski, alleged to be a Russian who threw a bomb and killed an official in his native country, is being kept under surveillance by United States Secret Service agents, and, if sufficient evidence can be gathered to show he is a murderer, he will be deported. He is said to have been at first sentenced to death for his alleged crime, but was later commuted to a term in prison, from where he escaped to America.

Lewandowski was recently arrested here by Detective Sergeant Batey, charged with a statutory offense. At the time of his arrest Russians who knew him talked freely with District Attorney Manning and Deputy District Attorney Hanes, declaring he lived with a woman and his wife. They gave testimony unhesitatingly then, but when placed on the witness stand in the Municipal Court yesterday morning they denied ever making any statements before the District Attorney, and Mr. Hanes, who was conducting the prosecution, was obliged to ask for a dismissal of the case.

"I could not get a bit of testimony from any one of the seven witnesses called for the prosecution, because they had been threatened with death if they gave evi-

dence against Lewandowski," said Deputy District Attorney Hanes. "I honestly believe that they were so terrified they dared not say a word against him. They went back on statements previously made, and I had to ask for a dismissal."

Municipal Judge Cameron, whose life was threatened in a letter mailed to him by a member of the Albina Nihilist band, stated after the case was dismissed that he had not at any time feared trouble, but it is known that the police took precautions to protect him, especially as he was entering and leaving the Municipal Courtroom the past few days.

United States Secret Service agents will continue to watch Lewandowski and his Nihilist friends, as they desire to break up the band of Russians now infesting Albina, and to deport Lewandowski, if possible.

The police are also endeavoring to locate the writer of the threatening letter.

VETERAN DIES SUDDENLY

Robert Little Called Away While
Conversing With Friends.

While seated in his home, Tenth and Skidmore streets, talking with friends at 10:30 o'clock last night, Robert Little, a Civil War veteran, aged 74 years, suffered an attack of heart failure and died before medical aid could reach him. When the aged man collapsed in his chair and sank to the floor his friends were horrified. They summoned Dr. C. Billington, who soon reached the house, but death had claimed its victim. Little was a bachelor. He had no relatives living in Portland. Deputy Coroner Arthur L. Finley was called to the death, but Dr. Billington had long attended the deceased it is said no inquest will be necessary.

DROWNED IN SANDY RIVER

MORRIS MILSTEAD DISAPPEARS
WHILE FISHING.

Prominent Farmer of Gresham
Country Separates From Companion
and Does Not Return Home.

GRESHAM, Or., Oct. 12.—(Special.)—Morris Milstead, a well-to-do farmer living about five miles east of here, was probably drowned in the Sandy River yesterday afternoon. He had gone fishing near the mouth of Gordon Creek, in company with G. H. Robertson, and the two became separated. Late in the evening Mr. Robertson returned home, supposing his companion had done likewise. About 9 o'clock Mr. Milstead became alarmed at his husband's absence and roused the neighborhood, when a searching party went to the Sandy River, but up to a late hour today had found no trace of the missing man.

It is supposed Milstead tried to wade across the river on one of the shallow riffles, but was thrown off his feet and carried into deep water. He leaves a wife and five small children. He was a son-in-law of H. F. Wehler, a prominent sawmill owner, and was well known throughout this entire section.

NO GRAND JURY THIS YEAR

In Absence of Judge, Further Investigation Will Be Delayed.

District Attorney Bristol has as yet made no announcement as to when an annual Federal grand jury will be assembled to pursue the investigations in the land frauds. As no judge is available to accept the reports of such a body, it is not unlikely that further proceedings will be held over until next year. However, it is understood that Mr. Bristol has sev-

eral charges which he desires to bring up as soon as possible and will assemble a jury as soon as a judge can be assigned here.

Judge Wolverson left last night for San Francisco to sit in the Circuit Court of Appeals, and it is probable that an application will be made to Judge Gilbert to assign a judge to the land fraud investigations.

Mr. Bristol left last night for Seattle to take testimony in the Hyde-Benson case, but expects to return to Portland Monday.

Street Will Now Be Improved.

A remonstrance against the proposed fill on East Stark street from East Water to East Seventh, was yesterday overruled by the street committee of the Council. This is one of the most important improvements now in prospect on the East Side, but progress upon it has been delayed repeatedly since it was first taken up by the Council. The defeat of the re-

monstrance will probably end the delay, and the improvement will now be taken up and the contract let.

A resolution was passed granting the Portland Railway Company permission to lay tracks temporarily upon York street, from Twenty-second to Twenty-fourth. The tracks will be used only a few weeks, as they are simply wanted to use in removing wood from a property which has recently been sold by the railway company.

Men Wanted for Firemen.

Resignations from the Fire Department have been frequent of late, due to the high price of labor prevailing, and it is with difficulty that the Civil Service Commission is keeping up the quota of men in the different companies. At present there are 35 vacancies in the department, and to secure candidates for the positions examinations will be held on October 25.
