Before the stone is placed in the northeast corner of the editios, a copper box, soldered and scaled by the grand master, will be placed inside. There are eight Masonic lodges in Portland with a membership of nearly 1500, and it is expected that a majority will join in the procession and take part in

the exercises.

After the ceremony the procession will form again and march back to the old temple on Aider street.

The new building, which will be one of the finest fraternal buildings in the West, will be 30 feet high and will contain four stories. There will be club, banquet and blue lodge rooms on the lower floors. The united floor will be set aside for the use upper floor will be set aside for the use of the Oregon Knights Templar. It will cost approximately \$15,000 subscribed by the members of the Masonic Building Association.



WORK PROGRESSING ON CONVENT FOR BENEDICTINE SISTERS

Work is progressing on a convent for the Benedictine Sisters, on Milwaukie and Caywood streets, in the parish of the Sacred Heart Church, of which Father Gregory is the paster.
