PAN-AMERICANS' EYE ON BARRETT

May Be Appointed Director of the Pan-American Bureau.

ROOSEVELT FAVORS HIM

Fortland Man May Be Chosen to Bind Ties of Three Americas Instead of Becoming Ambusandog to Brasil.

OREGONIAN NEWS, BUREAU Washington, Oct. 24 .- While Secretary Root is considering John Barrett as a possible Ambassador to Brazil, the diplomats of Central and South America are debating among themselves whether or not to elect Mr. Barrett director of the Bureau of American

Republics. At the recent conference at Rio Janeiro, attended by Mr. Root, a gen-eral desire was shown by delegates from the Republics south of us to es-tablish closer relations with the United States and the plan was heartily ap-proved by Mr. Root. It was then con-orded that the best means of bring-ing about more intimate relations was through the Bureau of American Re-publics, but it was illewise conceded that before any effective work could be accomplished the bureau would have to be reorganized.

American to Head Bureau.

American to Head Bureau. The United States, being the great-est Republic interested, is in reality entitled to the principal office in the bureau, but Mr. Root did not feel dis-posed to urge the claim of this Govern-ment for fear of offending the smaller Republics. It is beginning to be under-stood, however, that an American must necessarily be at the head and Mr. Bar-rett is mentioned by many diplomats because of his familiarity with condi-tions in Central and South America and because of his wide acquaintance among the leading citizens of these among the leading citizens of these Republics Mr Barrett has championed their cause since his return to the United States and his recent magazine article has brought forth still further commendation.

While he is making no campaign for election as director of the bureau, Mr. Barrett would probably accept if it came to him unsolicited.

Barrett Fittest Man.

The State Department believes Mr. Barrett admirably fitted for this posi-tion and officials declare that, if elected, he will restore the bureauto its former dignity and usefulness and make it instrumental in arousing mu-tual interest among various countries represented. One is that the members of the congress will try to cure the majority of the meat they use themselves, and also will cure meats for the market. The other plan is to have an agent in each county who will handle all the stock of the members and ship to another agent at the market, who will sell direct to the packing-house. There is no intention to build a co-operative packing-house. The farmers have a grievance also against the fruit commission dealers, and an effort will be made to organize the union in fruitgrowing sections.


