Induces Speculative Liquidation in Stock Market.

VOLUME OF DEALINGS LIGHT

Decline of Prices, Though Slow, Is Continued to the End of the Session-Call Rate

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.-Depression ruled on the Stock Exchange today. Not only was the market dull in the technical sense of small deallings and narrow ductuations, but the subject matter of discussion was trivial and the factors of influence on the trading

the subject matter of discussion was trivial and the factors of influence on the trading unimportant.

The volume of dealings was rather larger than yesterday and the increase in orders for execution by brokors were mostly for selling. Calling of loans induced some speculative liquidation. The call money rate siso ran up early in the day to \$½ per cent, giving warning of a growing scarcity of available funds. Trust companies as well as banks were among the callers of loans. Some of the scaling down of loans was admittedly to supply resources for paying for securities arriving from Europe, and which were closed out at hist week's stock market settlement in London for the account of New York holders. Preparations were in progress also for the payments due tomorrow for the usual November 1 settlements. Meantime, the banks continue to lose cash both to the interior and to the Sub-Treasury, today's statement of the Government institutions showing a withdrawal from the banks since the last bank statement of \$2.403,000.

The money situation accounted for most of the occasional spilling out of stocks, which carried prices lower. The failure to raise the Steel dividend rate seemed to shake confidence in the increase in the rennsylvania dividend at tomorrow's mesting of the directors, which has been the cause of some speculative buying this week. The decline in trices, although slow, was continued and the closing was easy and at net declines running from 1 to over 2 points for the active stocks.
