VOTE WAS VERY LIGHT

Henry McGowan, Democrat, Is Probably Elected State Senator From Pacific and Wahkiakum

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 8 .- (Special.) The Republican Congressional ticket swept Washington by a majority of approximately 36,000. Reports from every county in the state show that though knifing in the county tickets was general, 57 the Republican control of Washington the Republicans a majority of 13 on joint was maintained by proportionately the same majorities as those given two years

Roosevelt carried Washington by 72,802, but there were about 145,500 votes cast in that election. This year the number of votes cast is reduced nearly one-half and the Congressional pluralities of the three Republican candidates will be fully one-half of that received by President Roose-

velt two years ago. In 1994 the Congressional pluralities were 57,327, or 15,500 less than the Roosevelt margin. With a half vote cast a plurality of 25,000 would have shown the Republicans maintained their relative strength and the showing of 35,000 indicates a growth in the party vote for two

Reports of the election have been received from every county in the state. The tabulation of election figures in many of the countles is still incomplete and no official returns will be had until next The following is a close report on epublican majorities that will be increased if any changes are made:



The Japanese, according to the newspapers of Vadivostok, are continually pressing northward in Manchuria, with the apparent intention of establishing themselves in the hinterland of Viadivo-stok, where their presence would consti-tute a serious menace to the fortress in the event of the possibility of a resump-tion of hostilities.
