

EXCLUDE LAWYERS AND DRAFT BILL

Members of Council Committee Take Decided Stand and Prepare Wire Ordinance.

GROW WEARY OF WRANGLE

Provisions Are Selected From Rival Measures Presented by Electric Company and Union Linemen.

Weary of waiting for the linemen and the electric companies to agree on the proposed ordinance to regulate the stringing of overhead wires, members of the ways and means committee of the Council assembled last night and drafted a measure to suit themselves. Both the linemen and the companies had presented "model" ordinances, and the committee members looked over these drafts and selected what they deemed advisable to embody in their own ordinance. It is thought hardly possible that the conflicting interests will accept the committee's draft.

Reports Uter Disagreement.

As soon as the meeting convened, Dan J. Malarky, representing the Portland General Electric Company, presented an ordinance which he offered as a substitute for the one presented by the linemen. Mr. Malarky frankly stated that all efforts to agree had been signally unsuccessful, and went on to explain the merits of the measure he was presenting. "The substitute offered by Mr. Malarky doesn't seem to me to be a very good provision in that it shall be four-foot spacing on all poles," declared Frank F. Freeman on behalf of the linemen. "It can't be made any other way, and the Portland General Electric Company sending another ordinance up here, if our ordinance isn't passed, well, we'll try the initiative."

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Flings Insult at Army.

NAPLES, Nov. 19.—An anarchist made a demonstration against the army here today while the Duke of Anosta was distributing prizes to soldiers who distinguished themselves in the relief work during the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in April. The Duke, who is commander of this military district and cousin of King Victor Emmanuel, was standing, surrounded by the local military authorities and the troops of the garrison, at a short distance from the massed standards of the regiment, when a man named Nicol Floro, known to be a member of an anarchist organization, threw a package of anti-military newspapers at the regimental standards and at the same time shouted insults against the army in general. He was arrested.

BURGLAR ALARM IS RUNG

Proprietor of Cigar Store Seizes Lad, Who Confesses—Says He Is Son of Moro Bank Cashier.

The record of crimes committed by youths within the past three weeks is said to be the most startling in the history of Portland. The most daring depredations were as follows: Three women suffered the loss of their purses with cash contents at the hands of Homer Warner, aged 18, and Charles Greenstreet, aged 16. One of the victims was killed and her hip broken. Two young women of the Y. W. C. A. were held up and robbed of their money at revolver points on the street. Fred Stagerwald, aged 16, was arrested, but unidentified, he confessed to grand larceny; his boy "pal" escaped. While bound homeward, a woman was attacked by a youth, she said about 18 years of age, and sustained the loss of her watch, which he snatched from her wrist. Walter Stanley, aged 16, made an attempt to rob a telephone-slot box, was captured and confessed.
