In new construction there shall be four-foot spacing on all the poles and this provision will undoubtedly displease

The new measure provides that the high voltage wires shall be placed on the upper cross arms when they are not four feet spart. A wire carrying 750 volts or more is designated as a high voltage car-rier. Cross arms bearing high voltage wires must be marked so that the line-men will have no difficulty in knowing then
