HOPS ARE BEING BOUGHT UP FREEDY. Buying Sport Continues With the Opening of the Week.

The buying spurt that enlivened the hop parket in the latter part of last week coninued yesterday. Prices were not changed as farmers' offerings continued to be free nough to enable dealers to fill their orders t last week's figures.

The most important deal reported during the day was the sale by Gilbert & Pattercon of 284 bates from their Lincoln yard. purchaser was T. A. Livesley & Co., and the price paid was 13 cents. John Carmichael bought the Landers lot of 148 ales at Dayton at the same price. Lachmund & Pincus paid 14 cents for an Sl-bale ot at Mount Angel. There were rumors that a local dealer bought a 300-bale lot at better than 13 cents, but the particulars vere not learned. Another deal involving 534 bales on the East Side was under way, but did not go through. A good many sales of low-grade hops have been consummated te last few days. Lachmund & Pincus are reported to have bought 282 bales, the surplus over a contract, from Burton, of Independence, at 9 cents. Several small lots have been secured by local buyers at 7 and 8 cents and one dealer picked up a

Telegrams from Somoma and Russian River said that the finest quality, which could not be bought at 16 conts a few weeks ago, is now selling at 18 to 14 cents. A wire from Yakima also said that growers in that section were putting their goods upon the market.
