LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 27.—Before the Pacific Athletic Club of this city, "Philadelphia" Jack O'Brien and Tommy Burns will meet tomorrow night in a 20-round contest for the championship of the world.

A purse of \$12,000 has been offered by the club. Of this amount, O'Brien receives \$1200 for signing the articles. The balance, \$10,800, is divided so that the winner receives \$8100 and the loser \$2700.

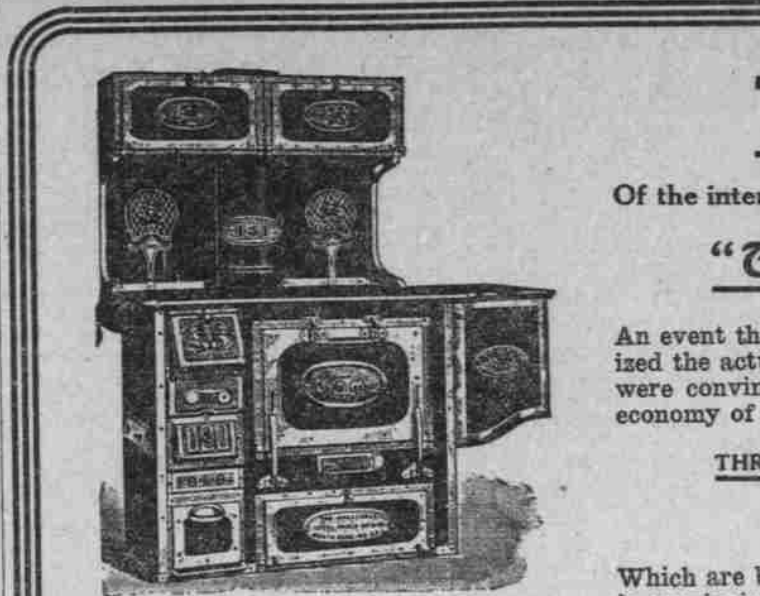
