SPOKANE, Nov. 29 .- (Special.)-Victor Hagland, a bachelor, 54 years of age, was shot and fatally wounded near Newport, Wash., 40 miles from Spokane, yesterday afternoon, by A. E. Davidson, an ex-Spokane Councilman. Hagland was brought to St. Luke's Hospital, but died of his injuries this

The shooting was the outgrowth of the trouble over wages between Hag-land and Miss Robertson, a school-teacher, formerly of Spokane. Miss Robertson, in addition to teaching the country school, had taken up a ranch, and Hagland was employed to work on

Davidson, who was a School Trustee, took the part of the young woman. Haghand is alleged to have remarked that he would shoot Davidson on sight. Davidson armed himself with a sixshooter. The two men met near a sawmill and a duel ensued. Davidson sa Hagland fired first. He was unhurt.


