Nonpartisan Ticket Wins Brisk Contest at Vancouver.

NO CHANGE IN LICENSE

Defeated Party Planned to Raise Saloon Tax to \$800 a Year, Shut Out Women From Drinking Places and Improve Streets.

The hottest contest over city officers held in this city for years ended today by the election of the Non-Partisan ticket over the Civic Improvement or anti-saloon ticket, by a majority of 166 votes.

SALMON PACK—MUCH LESS WASHINGTON FISH COMMISSIONER GIVES THE FIGURES.

Total Output of the Year in the State Is Valued at Even Million Dollars.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Dec. 4.—(Special.)—Ten thousand, three hundred and sixty-four persons were employed in the fishing industry of this state, earning for labor \$2,924,795, and the aggregate output was valued at \$7,044,099.50, according to the report of State Fish Commissioner J. L. Riseland for the year ending November 30, 1906, which has just been filed with Governor Mead.

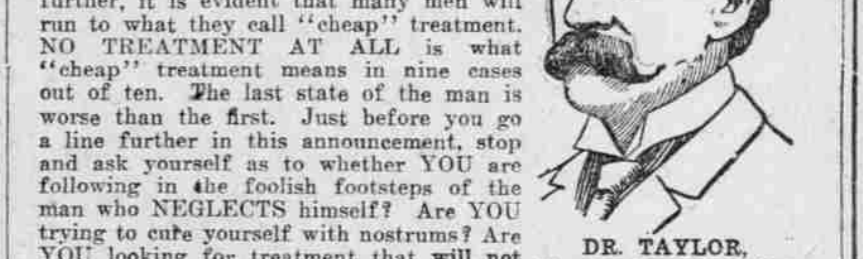
