

WIND, RAIN AND SNOW OVER STATE

Storm So Severe at Albany That It Practically Stops Business.

TERRIFIC GALE ON COAST

Willamette River and Its Tributaries Rising Rapidly and Grave Fears Are Expressed for Another Heavy Flood.

RAPID RISE IN RIVER.

OREGON CITY, Or., Jan. 3.—(Special.)—The lower Willamette River is rising rapidly. It came up one foot this afternoon and is expected to rise five feet during the night. The upper river is rising slowly.

ALBANY, Or., Jan. 3.—(Special.)—A violent storm in Albany today and last night practically stopped business. The wind blew a gale, and rain fell in torrents.

YACHTING, while there is scarcely any wind, a steady downpour of warm rain promises high water.

This is the worst storm of the winter for Albany. Basements are running in water, yards and streets are transformed into lakes, furnaces are put out of commission, and in a number of places, lateral sewers are flooded, as to be unable to carry away sewage.

The public schools were closed this afternoon, because of the furnaces being out.

From Yaquina Bay comes the news that a terrific storm is sweeping the Coast. The Corvallis & Eastern train from the Bay arrived in Albany today, and experienced great difficulty traveling around the harbor.

Snow fell in the mountains, east of Albany, last night, but the warm rain will melt it and high water will result.

EUGENE EXPECTS BIG FLOOD

Willamette River Has Reached Highest Point This Year.

EUGENE, Or., Jan. 3.—(Special.)—The highest water of the year is here. All last night, and throughout the day the rain came down in sheets, whipped by the wind and driven underneath doors and into windows that are ordinarily water-tight.

The river at dark this evening was eight feet higher than it has been during the last 12 months and the water was rising a foot and a half each hour.

This has been the roughest day Eugene has experienced for many a day, and with the storm still raging, several observers predict the greatest flood for many years.

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ALL N. P. TRAINS ARE LATE

Heavy Snow in Cascade Mountains. Tacoma Fears a Flood.

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 3.—(Special.)—An unusually heavy snowfall in the Green River Canyon. The fall last night exceeded two feet and the Northern Pacific reports today say that the fall during the day has been about three inches on both sides.

All trains from the East are delayed and if the storm continues for any length of time a blockade is feared.

THE DALLES, Or., Jan. 3.—(Special.)—Tracy Wilson, a testifier in the murder case of Peter Godfrey, a farmer living five miles east of this city, was found dead in the county road this morning about a quarter of a mile from the Godfrey place.

The records were made at the station at North Head, Wash. The figures follow:

Mean of normal temperature, 44 degrees. The warmest month was that of 1905, with an average of 45 degrees; coldest, 1904, 42 degrees.

The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 2.18 inches on January 3 and 2, 1905.

The greatest amount of snowfall recorded in the month of 1905 only was 1.4 inches, on January 18, 1905.

The average number of clear days, 4; partly cloudy days, 4; cloudy days, 23.

The prevailing winds are from the south.

The average hourly velocity of the wind is 13.2 miles.

The highest velocity of the wind was 84 miles from the southeast on January 23, 1905.

Average precipitation for the month, 7.54 inches.

The greatest monthly precipitation was 8.74 inches in 1903; least, 6.91 inches in 1905.
