

COMMITTEE GOES AGAINST BRISTOL

Senate Sub-Committee's Report Approved by Majority.

DECIDES SENATE'S ACTION

Further Proceedings Deferred Till Full Meeting Is Held—New Recommendation by Fulton and Bourne Likely to Follow.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—The Senate sub-committee today unanimously reported against the confirmation of the nomination of Bristol, and recommended that his nomination be rejected. The committee also recommended that the report of the sub-committee be referred to the Senate. A majority of the committee believed that Bristol should be rejected. This makes certain an unfavorable report when the full committee acts, and foreshadows his rejection if the case comes to a vote in the Senate. The committee meets next Monday.

The sub-committee consists of Senators Kittredge, Foraker and Culberson.

Majority Is Against Bristol.

Seven of the 12 members of the Judiciary Committee were present at today's meeting and in favor of indorsing the report of the sub-committee and adversely reporting Bristol's nomination to the Senate. While a quorum of the committee was present this morning, and while their views were identical and there were enough votes to make an adverse report, it is the policy of this committee to act on important nominations only when there is a full attendance. Such action strengthens the recommendations of the committee. It is known that some members of the committee who were absent this morning are ready to indorse the report of the sub-committee. The attitude of the others is unknown.

Will Approve Committee Report.

It is apparent, therefore, that when the full committee acts it will recommend that Bristol's nomination be rejected. The President will not hold him in office within the next ten days, and it is believed that he has no further interest in the case, at least not to the extent of engaging in a fight in Bristol's behalf.

It is significant that Senator Knox, who last season made a fight for Bristol's confirmation, was present today, and is now among those who will indorse the report of the sub-committee. A year ago Knox took issue with Senator Fulton because the President was anxious to have Bristol confirmed.

May Call for New Man.

If the committee reports adversely and the Senate rejects Bristol, the President will not hold him in office longer, but is likely to ask Senator Fulton to recommend another man. WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—If Senator Fulton secures the passage of his bill creating the office of appraiser of Customs for Puget Sound, at a salary of \$4000, it is understood he will recommend Tom Payne, his private secretary, for the appointment.

The President today nominated Alvin C. Robinson, of Seattle, to the office of Yakima Land Office. The Washington Senators recommended ex-Postmaster Cameron, of Ellensburg, for this place, but the Postoffice Department reported some irregularity during his administration in connection with stamp sales, and he was turned down.

GIVES HOMESTEADERS TIME

Senate Grants Relief to Northwest Account Car Shortage.

Washington, Jan. 21.—The Senate today passed a joint resolution providing that all persons who have made homestead entries to North and South Dakota, Minnesota, Montana, Idaho and Wyoming, where the six months period required to establish residence expired or expires after December 31, 1906, shall be granted until May 15, 1907, within which to make actual settlement. The Senate also passed a resolution providing that the homestead entries made in the Northwest shall be treated as if they were made on land so entered. The concession thus granted is on account of obstacles to settlement caused by the car shortage and the famine in the West. The Northwest Idaho was included in Heyburn's motion.

River and Harbor Bill Thursday.

THANKS FOR DAVIS' HELP

and private officials, at the action of Governor Swettenham in demanding the withdrawal by Admiral Davis of relief forces in spreading and intensifying. The Governor's response to Admiral Davis' letter is bitterly denounced, and it is generally declared that the only possible reparation is for the government to apologize and recall Governor Swettenham. Governor Swettenham's contention in his letter to Admiral Davis that the local police protection was ample in contrast with the fact that on Friday night, after sending the letter, the Governor personally visited the barracks occupied by the police and several companies of the West India regiment and bitterly censured the officers, saying that nothing was prevalent throughout the city.

At the same time the Governor declared he would not permit the presence of any armed Americans.

The conditions in Kingston are improving slowly. All passes to the burned sections, where there is nothing to lose, were revoked today, and this step has caused much inconvenience to Americans and others who desire to reach ships in the harbor. Many bodies are still being recovered and cremated, and it is believed the fatalities will reach a total of 700. There is no pressing demand for an increase in the food supply. Rain is imminent, and is dreaded, the doctors predicting that it will cause an epidemic among the unsheltered sufferers, which will result in a death list far exceeding that brought about by the earthquake and fire.

The United States refrigerator ship Celtic arrived here this morning. She received orders not to delay her departure and sailed at 1 o'clock this afternoon. The steamer Orléans has come in from San Diego and will remain in the harbor with many refugees. Few Americans remain here.

There are still frequent tremors of the earth.

DAVIS WON BRITAIN'S HEART

Turned Scale in Her Favor in North Sea Arbitration.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—The Colonial Office is still without communication from Sir Alexander Swettenham, the Governor of Jamaica, of the situation which led to the withdrawal of Governor Swettenham from his post in Kingston on Saturday.

It is supposed that if Governor Swettenham had any reasonable justification for his extraordinary letter to Admiral Davis, he would not delay in placing his government in possession of the facts and therefore his silence is regarded as evidence of his weakness of his case, or an evidence of compunction at having taken an inadvisable course.

By a singular coincidence, Admiral Davis is an officer to whom England heretofore has felt the deepest gratitude, as his course while the American member of the International Arbitration Court at Paris, upon the sinking of the British fishing vessel in the North Sea by the Russian fleet, was one of the noblest of statesmanship.

It is known that Admiral Davis' staunch support of the British contention turned the scales at the decisive moment.

One phase not generally known is that King Edward, on the conclusion of the court, communicated an invitation, through the British Ambassador at Paris, to Admiral Davis to come to Buckingham palace, where marked honors would be shown him. But the desire to avoid anything which might be construed as wounding Russia, led Admiral Davis not to accept the King's invitation.

THANKS FROM SWETTENHAM

Grateful for American Aid, but Needs No More.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—Replying to a telegram from the British Charge d'Affaires at Washington, reporting that the British Government had inquired whether Great Britain desired or was willing to accept further assistance in money or other forms of aid for the Kingston earthquake sufferers, the Foreign Office today cabled as follows:

"The offer of the American Government to give further aid is gratefully appreciated by His Majesty's Government. The Governor of Jamaica has not yet reported of his requirements fully, but now that the first few days are over, it appears likely that there will be no justification for further calls on the generosity of the United States.

"In the meantime, His Majesty's Government has been requested by Sir Alexander Swettenham to convey to the Government of the United States cordial thanks for the prompt and powerful assistance which the United States Navy, under Rear-Admiral Davis, rendered to the inhabitants of Kingston in their suffering."

Rebel Prince Evades Japanese.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 21.—It was announced today in a dispatch received from Seoul, Corea, that under orders from the authorities at Tokyo, the Japanese at the Korean capital recently tried to arrest Prince Ming, brother of the late Queen of Corea, on charge of complicity in the insurrection in the southern part of the country.

The Prince escaped, but his lodgings were occupied by the police and his papers were seized.

Alarmed Over Threatened Revolt.

HAVANA, Jan. 21.—The authorities here today received a dispatch from Santiago de las Vegas, this province, announcing that great alarm prevails there, owing to a threatened uprising.

IS A PUNCHING BAG

Swettenham Is Swatted in Two Continents.

LONDON PAPERS FURIOUS

Only Excuse They Can Find Is Nervous Breakdown Under Strain.

Bernard Shaw Classes Him With Snobocracy.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—All the morning papers again print the story of the Kingston incident. Expressions of the deepest gratitude for the help rendered by the American navy continue to be used, while full allowance continues to be made for the exceptional circumstances which may have accounted for Governor Swettenham's ruffled feelings, the newspapers are unanimous in censuring the tone of his letter to Admiral Davis as absolutely wrong and uncalled for, and this in spite of the fact that the papers recognize Rear-Admiral Davis also may have been somewhat blundering.

The morning papers make two rather interesting points out of the affair. The first is that Governor Swettenham is a "kicker."

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—Rear Admiral Charles H. Davis, whose offer of assistance for the earthquake sufferers was refused by Governor Swettenham, of Jamaica, is the man who received the surrender of the port of Ponce when he was in command of the Dixie. His record in the American Navy is one of the most successful of a diplomat. He is second in command of the North Atlantic Squadron. His title as "Grand Commander of the Order of Isabella" was conferred by Spain in recognition of his services as personal conductor, as a representative of the Government, of the Infanta Dularia when she visited this country in 1882 as Spain's representative to the Columbian celebration.

Admiral Davis is a brother-in-law of Senator Lodge and a friend of the President, who formed his acquaintance while Roosevelt was a member of the Civil Service Commission and living in Washington.

Admiral Davis was selected as the American member of the International Commission, which met in Paris two years ago to investigate the conflict between the British and the American navies in the North Atlantic.

He served as superintendent of the naval observatory at Washington for five years and has been on many ships of the Navy through his various grades.

Sir James Alexander Swettenham, K. C. M. G., captain-general and governor-in-chief of Jamaica, has been in the service of Great Britain for 40 years. He is 61 years old, the son of J. O. Swettenham, of Belper Lodge, Derby. After graduating at Cambridge he entered the Indian Civil Service in 1866 and remained in various grades of Ceylon service for 15 years. He was auditor-general for the island of Ceylon from 1884 to 1891, and then became a member of the Ceylon Legislative Council. He was made colonial secretary at Singapore and from 1899 to 1900 was acting governor of the state settlement. Then he went to Jamaica as governor, and a commandant-in-chief, where he was kept until 1904.

Sir Alexander Swettenham got his decoration and his knighthood for colonial service, and that of him to Jamaica, where he arrived in the fall of 1904.

Neither the State nor the Navy Department has any official advice as to the reason for the abrupt departure from Kingston of Admiral Davis and his relief squadron, which returned to Guantanamo yesterday.

The supply ship Celtic, which sailed from Havana for Kingston, arrived at that place yesterday. It is thought that Admiral Davis' return to Kingston was the result of the Celtic's arrival.

Whether she has been ordered to return to Guantanamo is not known here.

NO ATTEMPT TO DO BUSINESS

But Banks Open and Streetcars Resume.
