

OREGON TREATED WITH LIBERALITY

Rivers and Harbors Bill Provides for Completion of Columbia Jetty.

CELILLO CANAL \$600,000

Upper and Lower Columbia and Snake Well Remembered—Sum for Gray's Harbor.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Jan. 22.—Oregon and Washington never fared better in any river and harbor bill than in that which was completed today and which will be introduced in the House tomorrow or Thursday, in most instances the House committee appropriated the full amount recommended by the Chief of Engineers. The mouth of the Columbia River gets every cent that is recommended, and with this money the jetty will be completed. While only \$752,244 is appropriated in cash, the engineers are authorized to make contracts to the aggregate amount of \$2,452,244, and the balance of that money will be carried in the sundry civil bill of next session, long before the contracts have been fulfilled. The Department recommended an appropriation of \$400,000 for continuing the channel improvement between Portland and the mouth of the Columbia. This item was reduced to \$200,000, because the committee looks to the City of Portland and adjacent country to bear a large share of the cost of this improvement, assurance having been given the committee by representative citizens that the city district had been formed to raise money for this purpose.

Liberal With Celilo Canal.
The committee was more liberal with the Dalles-Celilo canal than was at first supposed. The \$300,000 cash that is appropriated is ample to meet needs, and when the expenditure is completed, an additional \$500,000, which is only \$200,000 less than was asked for by the War Department. The full amount would have been appropriated but for the fact that the engineers very recently recommended a large appropriation for improving the Columbia River above Celilo. The committee appropriated \$200,000 for that part of the Celilo canal which is between Celilo and the mouth of Snake River and \$200,000 for the stretch of river farther up between Wenatchee and Bridgeport. These two items more than offset what was cut out of the canal project. However, the canal appropriation is satisfactory to the Oregon and Washington delegations, for it absolutely commits the Government to do the work, and the next river and harbor bill will probably make this a continuing contract and provide for its completion as fast as practicable.

Oregon Coast Harbors.
The Upper Columbia and Snake river project got \$30,000, all that was asked for. The local engineers recommended an appropriation of \$50,000 for the Coquille River, but the War Department cut this down to \$40,000. The committee finally consented to give the larger amount, as that will complete the existing project. The Upper Columbia and Snake river project got \$30,000, all that was asked for. No appropriations were recommended for Coos Bay, the Siuslaw River or Yaquina Bay, hence no appropriations were made and none could be made under the rule of the committee.

Improvement of the Columbia between Vancouver and Astoria, which has been asked for, does not need further money and none was asked or given.

In addition to the appropriations, the committee authorized surveys with a view to formulating new projects for deeper channels at the entrance to Coos Bay and Tillamook Bay, and for further improvement of the Coquille River.

Gray's Harbor Jetty.
The largest appropriation authorized in Washington was for Gray's Harbor, \$600,000, for constructing the north jetty. Half is in cash and half on continuing contract. Inner Gray's Harbor, for improving the channel to Aberdeen, gets \$177,000, with \$100,000 for maintenance, and Gray's River \$200,000.

Dredging in the tributaries of Puget Sound will be conducted under appropriations of \$75,000.

Willapa River gets \$25,000 under a new project, the Cowlitz and Lewis Rivers \$50,000 and the Okanogan and Pend d'Oreille \$30,000.

An appropriation of \$250,000 is made for constructing a ship canal from St. Michael to the mouth of the Yukon, in Alaska, to facilitate the transfer of cargoes from seagoing vessels to river steamers.

These Washington projects for which no appropriation is made are those for which no appropriations were recommended.

Result of United Effort.
The liberal appropriations made in the rivers and harbors bill for Columbia River projects and for other projects in Oregon and Washington are the result of the joint efforts of Senator Fulton and Representative Jones. Mr. Fulton has had innumerable conferences with Chairman Burton and with Mr. Jones, the Northwest's representative on the committee, and Mr. Jones in turn has gone out of his way to aid in securing liberal appropriations for projects that belong in part or entirely to Oregon. Several times Senator-elect Bourne has talked with Mr. Burton and Mr. Jones about Oregon appropriations, and has lent every possible assistance to Mr. Fulton in this work. Representative Hermann was also active in urging liberal treatment of Oregon projects.

Hermann's Trial Postponed.
OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Jan. 22.—Owing to the illness of District Attorney Baker, the trial of Representative Blinger Hermann, in this city, which was set for February 4, has been postponed until February 15. He was injured in the railroad wreck at Terra Ceila on December 30 last, and has been unable to attend court. The trial of the Hyde-Benson case was also postponed until March 4.

Rural Route at Hillsdale.

State Has Jurisdiction.
LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 22.—In the case

of the state against the Nebraska Lumber-Dealers' Association, Referee Post today ruled that the state courts have jurisdiction and can proceed against the lumber-dealers for violation of the state anti-trust laws. The association complained that the action could be brought only in the Federal Court.

SETTLING LOSSES ON FIRE
San Francisco Committee Compromises on Fights in Europe.

BERLIN, Jan. 22.—The members of the San Francisco committee that came to the continent to secure peace with insurance on losses sustained in the San Francisco earthquake, having in the main accomplished their purpose, are about to leave for England. The most difficult accomplishment of the committee was compromising with the Austrian insurance company, the Phoenix Vienna and the Trans-Atlantic Fire Insurance Company of Hamburg. It is understood that the Phoenix Vienna agreed to settle its San Francisco policies at not far from their face value and that the Trans-Atlantic company has also agreed to a basis. After the Hamburg Court on January 11 decided a test case against the North German Fire Insurance Company, the committee offered to compromise at higher terms than this company was willing, and as a result further litigation will be necessary.

START ROUGH HOUSE
Soldiers Demolish Windows in Stores, Saloons and Resorts.

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 22.—A number of soldiers from the United States recruiting station last night raided what is known as the "rough house" district, smashing windows through the windows of stores, saloons and resorts. Major Glenn, commanding officer, sent out a detail and placed 30 of the marauders in the guard-house. The affair was the result of a recent cutting affray in a resort in which a soldier was wounded by a negro. Last night the soldiers, with a "word" at their backs, would not be deterred by the fact that the negro they started the trouble. Major Glenn today said that he would thoroughly investigate the trouble and that the soldiers would be punished. James Sterns, one of the latter, has confessed and given the names of the recruits, who are now in the guard-house. Captain Burdick, adjutant at the barracks, said today: "The trouble-makers will be summarily dealt with and no mercy shown. They will be tried by court-martial. Army regulations provide that soldiers may be dishonorably discharged and sentenced to prison for from two to five years."

FARMERS TO CO-OPERATE
National Union to Aid Woolgrowers in Erecting Mills.

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 22.—Several hundred members of the National Woolgrowers' Association met today for the annual meeting of the National Woolgrowers' Union. The union is said to have a membership of more than a million. Resolutions were adopted providing co-operation with the National Woolgrowers' Association in erecting one more woolen mills; to which the wool-growers will sell their products.

United States in Miss Nora Stanton Blatch, grand-daughter of Elizabeth Cady Stanton. "Nobody who works wants other people coming in to look at them in their old clothes and asking them personal questions. But she begged so hard that we finally decided to let her go through.
