FACTS ABOUT CHILD LABOR

Census Bureau Sums Up Results of Its Inquiry.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 34.- The extent to which child labor is employed in the inited States is set forth in a bulletin sued by the Census Bureau today. The statistics presented are for 1900 and relate to the employment of children as bread-winners, of whom 1,750,000 in round num-bers between the ages of 10 and 15 were so employed

By far the most important occupation children is that of agricultural labor-the number of children 10 to 15 years so employed being 1.084.446. Next in portance comes domestic service or the occupations of servants and waiters, or

waitresses, in which 138,055 children were About one-third of the children em-ployed in gainful occupations were lo years old, and more than one-half were 14 or 15 years old. The number under 14 was 790,623.

Of the total number of children breadwinners 72.2 per cent were boys and 27.8

per cent girls.

Almost invariably the percentage of breadwinners is much greater among foreign-born children than among native-born children. The percentage of bread-

higher than among white children. In 1900 the number of cotton mill atives 10 to 15 years old was 44.427. Of the 71.622 messengers and errand and

office boys in the United States, 62 per cent were district and telegraph messen-gers and crrand boys, 23.3 per cent were office boys, and 14.7 per cent were bundle and cash boys or girls.

The occupation of the textile worker or the needle trades furnished employment to 35,070 children, of whom 5315 were boys

and 29,824 girls. The total number of chil-dren engaged in the tobacco and cigar factories was 11,482.

Of the 23,657 children for whom statistics

Of the 23,657 children for whom statistics were specifically compiled, the fatherless or not living with fathers were 4943. The percentage of school children in the total population 5 to 9 years of age was 53.5, which is only a little higher than the percentage, 50.5, shown for the selected families included in this study. Of the number of children 19 to 14 years old in these families, only 31.9 per cent were at school, while the corresponding percentage for the total number of children of that age in the United States was 73.8. But after these children result the age at But after these children reach the age at which the opportunity for employment as wage-earners begins, their school attendance suffers.

Of the total number of children 10 to 14 years of age in the United States, 7.1 were illiterate, as compared with 18.8 per cent for the child bread-winners of the same age included in this tabulation.
