These reports were without confirmation upon inquiry in official quarters.

The earliest show of pronounced weakness was in Hill stocks, with the Harriman stocks in company. The rapid downward course of these stocks gave rise to talk of liquidation of Harriman holdings of the Hill stocks, of reprisals for grievances believed to grow out of the Harriman investigation or of some of the information furnished for the purposes of that investigation. Another source of weakness was the alleged need of various corporations for new capital and the high rates they would be obliged to pay for it.
