ONLY ONE PRICE FOR BUTTER. You Must Pay 3714 Cents Now or Go With-

out It.

The advance in butter prices vesterday was general. Not only did every city cream. ery quote 37% cents, but this price prevailed everywhere on Front street where any butter was for sale. The rise did not check the demand in the slightest degree. The main thing was to get butter and the price was a second consideration. It is likely that the higher price will bring in some outside butter, which will relieve the local scarcity, but no great quantity from the East or California is expected. The continuance of the present quotations will depend largely upon weather conditions.

Eggs were very firm, notwithstanding some increase in receipts. The generally quoted price was 20 cents.

There was a moderate inquiry for chickens and the old prices prevalled.


