NEW YORK, April 12.—(Special)—Many estimates of the cost of the Thaw trial have been published, but most of them were greatly exaggerated.

Expert testimony probably cost the Thaws \$45,000. It is stated that Dr. Evans alone received \$10,000 for the testimony which added "brain storm" to the vocabulary of the alienists.

Attorney fees are estimated at \$140,000. Opinions regarding the stipend of D. M. Delmas range all the way from \$50,000 to \$100,000.

RAISE OREGON LUD

Ballinger Will Push Action on Land Patents.

GREAT INJUSTICE DONE

Assures Bourne No More Claims Will Be Held Up on Suspicion—Issue Many Patents During the Coming Summer.
