WILL REMOVAL. Church—Trustees of the Mississippi Avenue Congregational Church are considering plans for remodeling the church building. It has been small to accommodate the growing congregations and the Sunday schools. BATTERY FOR VANCOUVER.—The Twenty-seventh Battery of field artillery, which arrived from Fort Ethan Allen, Vermont, Thursday over the O. R. & N., was yesterday transferred to the new barracks, where it will be stationed. Included in the organization are 130 men and 150 animals. The men were allowed a day in Portland to rest from their tedious transcontinental journey. They were taken to Vancouver by the Harvest Queen and a barge, which were required to make two trips.

IMPROVE SHORT MILLS OF STREETS.—At the meeting of the Multnomah (Albina) Improvement Association last night, L. M. Davis presiding, it was voted that the streets embracing between Fremont and Skidmore and Maryland an Williams avenue should be improved as a whole and paved with macadam or crushed rock. Considerable discussion preceded this action, but it was finally decided to ask the Council to push the improvement of the entire district as rapidly as possible. Councilman Dan Kellisher was present and explained the proposed district improvement amendment to the charter. A special committee on water amendments to the charter condemned the water-meter system, but endorsed the plan of taxing the city \$5 for each fire hydrant. The report also said that if the city had paid the amount it was assessed by the Water Committee it was possible that the water rates might be lower. J. Silvestone was present and spoke briefly urging the importance of the people inflicting themselves with the several amendments so they could vote intelligently on them. The association received from Councilman Kellisher all the proposed amendments to the charter written out. In two weeks the association will make the proposed street improvement district amendment a subject of general consideration.

STOPERS REVIVE LODGE.—Stope No. 1, Stopers of the World, which was organized in this city four months ago, recently revived an enthusiastic meeting of its members at the Knights of Pythias hall last night. J. N. Brown and A. Donohue, both of this city, were elected president and secretary respectively. Reorganization will be completed at another meeting next Friday night. The Stopers of the World is an organization of mining men of the Pacific coast, to promote the interests of the mining industry of the West. Its membership includes the mineowner, the assayer and the laborer on the theory that the promoter of today is the mineowner tomorrow. The promoters of the organization expect to increase the membership to 50 when it is proposed to erect a building in this city where a permanent mineral exhibit can be placed. In the meantime, the Stopers will conduct their meetings in the Knights of Pythias hall.

IN CAUSE OF INDUSTRIAL PEACE.—Representative business men of this city were invited to attend a meeting to be held at the Chamber of Commerce rooms next Monday night to consider a plan to make Portland the headquarters of the National Industrial Peace Association and provide for issuing educational literature to further the aims and objects of this association. Invitations to meet were sent to the following associations: Manufacturers, Architects, Retail Grocers, Ministerial, City and County Medical Association, Board of Trade and Chamber of Commerce. At its last meeting the Portland Retail Grocers Association, on reaching the surface of the National Industrial Peace Association and pledged the movement its support.

NEW BUILDING RECORD MADE.—Only 12 days of the month have elapsed since the building permits for this month eclipse any previous record of any month in the history of Portland. Yesterday permits aggregating \$154,800 were issued, which total for this month to \$1,129,132. The best previous record was held by May, 1905, when the permits amounted to \$1,075,765. The largest permit granted yesterday was to Lamson & Holbrook for their new hotel which will cost \$140,000. The other permits were issued for dwellings ranging in cost from \$100 to \$1,000.
