

LABOR LEADERS BITTER IN ATTACK

Assails Roosevelt as Man Behind Throne in the Moyer-Haywood Prosecution.

MAKES FRENZIED SPEECH

J. Edward Morgan, Member Western Federation of Miners, Addresses Central Labor Body in Chicago—President Denounced.

CHICAGO, April 21.—(Special.)—Theodore Roosevelt, President of the United States, was today pictured in the meeting of the Chicago Federation of Labor as the power behind the Moyer and Haywood prosecutions. The speaker, J. Edward Morgan, a member of the Western Federation of Miners, declared that he was seeking the blood of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone.

To Their Prey Like Vultures.

"God forbid that it is true," said Morgan, "but it almost seems to be true that behind the millions of Rockefeller and the Standard Oil Company; behind the millions of mine owners, stands the strong arm of the chief executive of the Nation, saying: 'Go to it! Fall upon your prey like vultures, and I will sit by and grin while you gorge in their blood.'"

Morgan came to this city from Denver to collect funds for the defense of the accused labor officials.

"For 17 years," he said, "the Western Federation of Miners with their blood blazed the way for organized labor in the West. The organization fought a purse-proud class, frenzied with power, to disgorge a larger and still larger share of their wealth. Now the mine owners, backed by the state authorities, are thirsting for revenge."

"I can see William D. Haywood, the man who refused to be bought, who refused to bend his knee in supplication, explaining on the gallows for his loyalty to the men he represented. I have seen the galling guns of the military trained upon defenseless men and women. I have seen union miners deported and left on a desert without food or shelter. I have seen the wives and daughters of those miners outraged by a brutal soldiery and now they want to crown their infamy by the most damnable conspiracy ever conceived in the brain of man."

MINERS SIGN AN AGREEMENT

Goldfield Men Hold Mass Meeting and Decide to Go Back to Work.

GOLDFIELD, Nev., April 21.—An agreement was signed today by the executive committee of the mine owners and the officers of the Miners' Union No. 220, Goldfield district, which terminates the general lockout and labor struggle of the past seven weeks. The final act of the peace negotiations occurred at 6 o'clock this evening, when a joint announcement was signed declaring the miners would resume operations at 3 P. M. Monday, and calling on all miners to go to work. The terms of the settlement are as follows:

First—The wage scale in effect in the district March 1, 1907, shall remain in force and eight hours shall constitute a day's work for all men under the jurisdiction of the Miners' Union.

Second—The Miners' Union shall have jurisdiction over men regularly employed in and around the mines, mills and smelters, including timbermen, timber framers, engineers, blacksmiths and mechanics and excepting superintendents and managers.

Third—No strike or boycott shall be officially declared by the Miners' Union unless by a two-thirds vote of the organization in favor thereof and no lockout shall be enforced by the mine owners and operators unless by a like vote.

Fourth—No town controversy shall interfere with the operation of the mines or the employment of miners.

Fifth—These terms shall remain in force for a period of two years from date.

The outcome of the controversy is a distinct victory of the mine owners, for every one of the demands made by the miners' body, as members of the Miners' Union, and of the Industrial Workers of the World have been agreed to. The miners have separated themselves from the Industrial Workers of the World, and will let no town labor trouble interfere with the working of the mines. Under the old regime the miners could be called to help in any local strike or boycott against any local concern that might be objectionable to the Industrial Workers of the World. The same hours and wages as maintained before remain in effect, as promised by the mine owners at the outset of the struggle, and the miners sign up the agreement for two years, which was another demand of the mine owners.

There is great rejoicing in Goldfield tonight over the final settlement. Mine owners and miners alike are celebrating and the utmost good feeling exists. The two committees wound up their labors last night with an elaborate midnight dinner, and the utmost cordiality characterized the final action, which put the camp in full action again.

Saturday the active committees of both mine owners and miners' organizations were in session all evening and late into the night. The terms of the settlement were finally drawn up and signed by both committees, to be submitted to a meeting of miners for ratification. This morning a notice was posted on the bulletin board in front of the Miners' Union Hall announcing a mass meeting of miners at the baseball park at 3 P. M. today.

At that hour, fully 1500 miners assembled. The Industrial Workers of the World were excluded. The tentative agreement was read to the crowd. Each member of the miners' committee examined its provisions. A score of miners spoke in favor of adopting the terms, and the utmost good feeling existed. A division was called for. Those favoring the terms of the settlement went to one side and those opposing to the other side. Fully three-fourths of the vast assembly moved to the side favoring settlement, and the result was greeted with great applause and demonstrations of joy.

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PUT IN CLAIM FOR BACK PAY

Dock Builders' Union in New York Wants Overtime.

NEW YORK, April 21.—The Dockbuilders' Union is about to make an attempt to collect from the city a sum approximately \$300,000, which, it is said, is due to about 300 of its members. The men, it is claimed, were compelled to work ten hours a day during a period of about five years, when the law of the state provides for an eight-hour day. The sum which the union will attempt to collect is pay for the extra two hours daily.

ASK ROOSEVELT TO RETRACT

Central Federated Union Sends Delegation to Washington.

NEW YORK, April 21.—The Central Federated Union today appointed a committee to visit Washington and, if possible, secure an interview with President Roosevelt. The committee was instructed to request the President to make a public withdrawal of his reported reference to Moyer and Haywood in connection with the recent Harriman letter incident.

TELEGRAPHERS MAY STRIKE

Eight-Hour Law in Texas Likely to Bring on Complications.

EL PASO, Tex., April 21.—The new Texas law which provides that a railway telegraph operator shall not be employed more than eight hours out of 24 may, according to the statement of an official of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers here, cause a strike which will involve every road in the state. The preparation for a strike of the men, according to the officials interviewed, are influenced by the reported intention of the railroads to reduce the pay of operators to meet the extra expense caused by the enforced employment of more men.

GAMBLING CASES IN EL PASO

Four Prominent Young Men Arrested and Placed in Jail.

EL PASO, Tex., April 21.—Four prominent young men of this city were arrested this morning for gambling. This is the first arrest here under the new drastic anti-gambling law, which makes gambling a felony, punishable by fine and imprisonment in the penitentiary for from two to four years. Under the new law the accused is not allowed bail until after a verdict by the grand jury. The result is they will remain in prison for some time.

THREE LOSE THEIR LIVES

FATAL FIRE BREAKS OUT IN COAL MINING TOWN.

Details of Holocaust at Cumberland, Wash., Are Meager—Bodies of Victims Burned to Crisp.

EAGLE GORGE, Wash., April 21.—(Special.)—News has just reached here of three persons losing their lives in a fire which totally destroyed the residence of Tom Powell, of Cumberland, Wash., a small coal mining town on the Buckley line of the Northern Pacific Railway.

On account of the remoteness of the place details are meager, but it is supposed that the people went to bed, leaving a lamp burning, and that the lamp exploded during the night, setting the house on fire. The names of the dead are: Thomas Powell and wife and Thomas McDonald. All are reported to have been burned to a crisp.

Powell and his wife were pioneers, having lived at Cumberland about 25 years. McDonald has a family living in Seattle and a brother who was once Sheriff of King County.

The bodies were not found until this morning. Powell and McDonald were miners, employed by P. J. Gibson, who owns a small mine at Cumberland.

CROWDS OUT TO HEAR AKED

Fifth Avenue Baptist Church Is Filled to Overflowing.

NEW YORK, April 21.—Rev. Charles P. Aked, for 16 years pastor of the second-largest Protestant church in England, today formally assumed the pastorate of the Fifth-Avenue Baptist Church of this city. Dr. Aked's labors at Liverpool, where he was pastor of Pembroke Chapel, drew the attention, not only of all England, but even of continental Europe because of his extraordinary ability as a preacher and his aggressive leadership.

Dr. Aked first preached at the Fifth Avenue Church early last winter and left a deep impression upon the members. Subsequently a call went out to him to serve as pastor of this influential New York church—a call which received the earnest support of John D. Rockefeller, who is one of the pillars of the congregation.

Hundreds were unable to gain admittance to the church today. Prominent among those present was John D. Rockefeller, Jr., director of the church's Bible class.

FIND OLD TRENCH IN ROME

Important Discovery Made on Anniversary of Founding of City.

ROME, April 21.—While celebrating the 2660th anniversary of Rome, the founding of which is supposed to have taken place April 21, in the year 753 B. C., a most important discovery was made today on Palatine Hill. While trying to determine the entrance to the Palatine acropolis, and also to explore the acropolis, a circular ditch was found, evidently a pit or tomb.

It is similar to those discovered in the Roman forum, and it is believed to be connected with the earliest habitation, and to have been constructed by the founder of the palatine stronghold, as it is known the acropolis was reserved for the leaders in Palatine, and that the tomba surrounding it within the second range of fortified walls were only for the burial of patrician families.

Minister of Instruction Rava visited the spot today and ordered a continuation of the excavations.

Mrs. Gilman Out on Bond

DAYTON, O., April 21.—Mrs. Leah C. Gilman, her son and two daughters, charged with procuring the death of Dona Gilman, in November last, have been released on bond to await the action of the next grand jury, which meets in September.

Congressmen and Their Wives Who Leave San Francisco April 30.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—The Congressional party to visit Hawaii on the invitation of the Territorial Legislature will assemble at Chicago on April 25. The members will go to San Francisco in a special sleeper attached to the Overland Limited and will sail on the transport Buford April 30.

CAN'T TELL WHY HE STOLE

Trust Company Loan Clerk Jailed for Taking \$50,000 in Bonds.

NEW YORK, April 21.—W. O. Douglas, loan clerk of the Trust Company of America, was arraigned in Police Court today and remanded without bail on the charge of taking from the company \$50,000 in bonds. He was arrested on a complaint of Oakleigh Thorne, president of the company, who discovered the loss of the bonds. Mr. Thorne says Douglas ad-

mits taking the bonds and told where they could be found. He had made no attempt to dispose of them and said he did not know why he had taken them.

Boston Firm Given Contract.

GUADALAJARA, Mex., April 21.—The Atlantic Construction Company, of Boston, has been given the contract for construction of the Tampico short line of the Mexican Central. The Tampico short line will reduce the distance by rail between Mexico City and Tampico from 71 to 20 miles.

Members of Crew in Irons.

DUNKIRK, France, April 21.—The three-masted Italian ship Venice put in here today after a voyage from Talait, Chile. The mixed crews of Germans, Italians and Scotchmen, shipped in Amer-

ica, terrorized the captain and forced him to keep an unpopular Italian named Vincenzo in irons for two months. The ship is now in the hands of the dock police.

Labor Societies Condemn Crimes.

LODZ, April 21.—In order to end conflicts between Socialists and Nationalists, which during the last three days alone have resulted in 12 men being shot dead and 16 wounded, the local labor organizations have issued proclamations condemning murder and appealing for a cessation of fighting.
