BOMB TAKES TEN LIVES

LODZ TERRORISTS THROW WITH MOST DEADLY AIM.

Capture Government Funds and Kill or Mortally Wound Whole Military Escort and Escape.

LODZ, Russian Poland, April 22.—Thirty armed terrorists held up a carriage this evening in which a portion of the funds derived from the government sale of spirituous liquor was being transported to the bank. The carriage was escorted by soldiers. The terrorists threw a bomb, which destroyed the vehicle, killed three of the accompanying soldiers outright and mortally wounded five more, as well as the coachman and a government officer, who had the money in charge. They secured \$2000 and escaped.

With Czar Will Save Duma.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 22.—The discussion in the lower house of Parliament of a motion disapproving of terrorism, which was expected to result in a stormy debate, has been postponed in the belief that the personal interview between M. Golovin, president of the House, and Emperor Nicholas, which will take place tomorrow, will throw some light on the Emperor's attitude toward the Duma.

Sailors' Strike Paralyzes Industry.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 22.—Russian industry is being placed in a critical situation owing to the continued strike of sailors belonging to the naphtha flotilla on the Caspian Sea. The oil residue, known as mazout, the principal fuel used in the factories in Central Russia, the stocks of which ordinarily replenished during the Spring floods when the Volga branches are navigable for big steamers into the remote interior of Russia is now exhausted.

Russia to Build Parliament House.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 22.—The first steps toward the erection of a new building for Parliament to take the place of the Tauride palace, where the sessions are now held, were taken today. The House adopted a motion to appoint a committee to report on the matter and to set aside funds for construction of the new building in the 1907 budget.

Shoots Head of Seminary

TAMBOV, Russia, April 22.—Father Simmon, rector of the Ecclesiastical Seminary here, was shot and seriously wounded today. The seminary was closed recently as the result of political disorders, and it is thought that the would-be assassin is an ex-student.

Lynch Law Rules Lodz.

LODZ, Russian Poland, April 22.—Lynch law has been inaugurated by the Nationalists to end the Socialist outrages here. Having captured one of the three So-

cialists who murdered a 15-year-old girl, the Nationalists took him to the outskirts of this city, tried him, sentenced him to death by hanging and carried out the sentence. Last week's victims of Nationalist and Socialist fights totaled 23 killed and 37 wounded. The majority of the casualties were among the Socialists.

Determined to Kill Nepuleff.

SEBASTOPOL, April 22.—The petitions for the transfer of General Nepuleff, Commander of the Fortress here, to some other command have resulted in his appointment to command Kovno Fortress but the revolutionary committee declares that the General will never leave Sebastopol alive.

Will Prosecute Owner of Ferry.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 22.—It was definitely established today that 39 persons lost their lives through the foundering of the ferry steamer Archangelok on the Neva Saturday night. The owner of the line will be prosecuted on the charge of gross negligence.

Car Will Receive Golovin.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 22.—President Golovin, president of the lower house, has been notified by Baron Fredericks, Minister of the Imperial House, that he will be received in audience by the Emperor.

Japan Offers New Rules of War.

TOKIO, April 22.—According to the Japan Mail, the Japanese delegates at The Hague Conference, will present a series of independent propositions, among them being the conclusions of conventions for the conduct of battles on land and at sea, the use of mines in commercial routes, the use of wireless telegraphy between besieged fortresses, and points in neutral territory, the use of neutral ports for belligerent purposes, methods for declaring the opening of hostilities and the limitation of armaments.

BANK CLERKS CATCH THIEF

ABSCONDING LOAN CLERK IS PROMPTLY OVERHAULED.

Robs Trust Company of \$50,000 in Bonds Which Are Recovered in New York City.

NEW YORK, April 22.—On Saturday W. O. Douglas, assistant loan clerk of the Trust Company of America, disappeared and it was speedily discovered that bonds valued at \$50,000 were also missing. In addition to private detectives and police the office force of the trust company, under command of Oakleigh Thorne, president of the company, went on a search for the absconder.

Two of the clerks followed Douglas' wife from a subway station to the Hotel Portland, where they succeeded in locating their man and he was put under arrest.

Douglas confessed the theft and explained that his downfall was caused by speculation and that the missing bonds had been placed in the hands of brokers through whom he made deals.

A portion of the bonds was recovered today in an apartment at the Manhattan Club, according to President Thorne. The club officials refuse to either affirm or deny the story, the detectives were very secretive about the matter and at the time of the arrest, whose name has been mentioned in the case, said they had nothing to say about the affair. It was stated today that Mrs. Douglas had disappeared and her friends became excited over her absence. She was found tonight at the home of her parents in Brooklyn. There were rumors of possible additional arrests tonight, but the detective bureau denied any action had been taken. Douglas will be arraigned tomorrow.

President Thorne said today he had found the man who had stolen the bonds.

BLACK HAND GANG ON TRIAL

Score of Italians Accused of Black-mailing Plot.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., April 22.—More than a score of foreigners accused as members of the "Black Hand" and responsible for a large number of crimes in this vicinity were placed on trial here today. Thirteen cases of shooting with attempt to kill, 13 of conspiracy, six of dynamiting and two of robbery by threats and menaces are charged against the men who are alleged to be the leaders. Hundreds of foreign families in this section have for years lived in a state bordering on terror as a result of this mysterious gang's threats, which in many cases have been followed up with murder. The men who exposed the society are Charles Salvatore and John Rits, of Brownstown. The persecution of these men began last year, when a letter was placed under their door demanding \$500 unless the entire family desired to be annihilated.

The principal witnesses in the case have been placed under guard to appear, and families that were driven away by the society's persecution have been brought from many cities as witnesses.

Taking of testimony was begun today. Several witnesses swore they received threatening letters demanding money and threatening that if it was not paid their homes would be burned.

Cairo Has Riotous Car Strike.

CAIRO, Egypt, April 22.—Serious disorders have occurred here as a result of a

strike of the cabdrivers and tramway employees of the city. Mobs attacked trams which attempted to run, and much damage followed. British troops will patrol the chief thoroughfares today to preserve order.
