It ran off abruptly after the publication of the plan to 181%. The issue of convertible bonds had been foreseen, but a rate of interest at 4% per cent had been foreiold in place of the 4 per cent announced. The placing of the price of convertible bonds to stockholders at notice of the bonds to stockholders at 18 a higher figure than had been anticipated and the offer of the bonds to stockholders at 18 appointments. The new preferred stock offered to Southern Pacific stockholders at par also caused mixed sentiments by reason of the priority of the claims of the common stock. The large body of new securities thus to be brought on the market had its part also in reviving active apprehensions of the large absorption of capital by railroad corporations in an already singmated condition of capital supply. The effect on the whole market was immediate Stocks came out in all directions and swept the list to a materially lewer level throughout.
