At the instigation of Mayor Lane requests for reports were sent out Anditor Devlin many months ago The response from most of the concerns affected was discouragingly tardy. Some of the corporations, in fact, have not nt in their reports up to the present

Heavy Penalty Provided.

The ordinance that is recommended for passage was introduced at the last meeting of the Council. If provides as a penalty a fine of from \$250 to \$500, or imprisonment of not more than six months, or both fine and imprisonment. Any franchise-holding corporation failing to keep full and correct books and to submit quarterly stafements to the Auditor is liable to the penalty.
