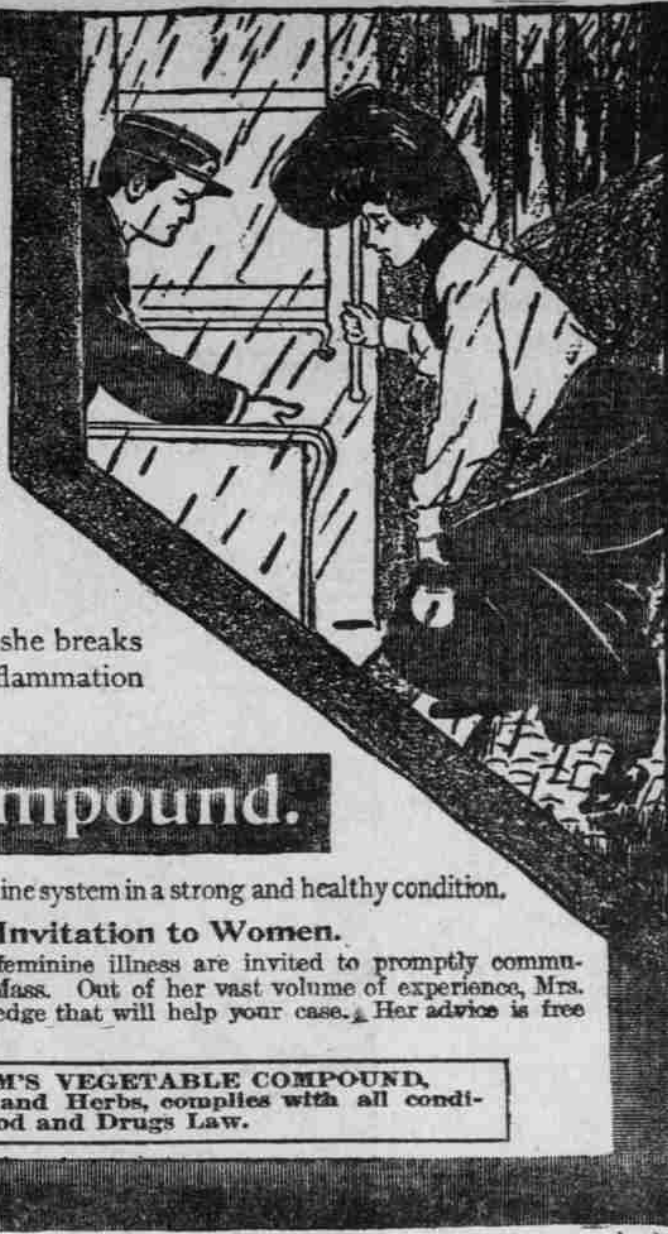

MEMORIAL DAY PLANS COMPLETE

G. A. R. Veterans Announce Programme of Exercises for May 30.

MORNING FOR EAST SIDE

Posts West of River Will Parade in Afternoon and Hold Services on the Plaza Block—Lectures in the Schools.

The Memorial Day committee has completed its arrangements for the programme of May 30. The G. A. R. Veterans of East Portland will hold their parade and services in the morning, while the West Side veterans will follow their example in the afternoon. Homer Sutcliffe, Department Commander of the G. A. R. of Oregon, will be grand marshal of the day.

On May 20 at 8 A. M. courades from Summer Post, and all who wish to join them, will assemble at Summer Post, corner Grand avenue and East Pine street, and will march from there to Lone Fir Cemetery to decorate the graves of departed comrades. The members of Ben Butler Post and of the various Relief Corps will join in this tribute of affection, decorating with flowers the graves in this and other East Side cemeteries. At the same hour the G. A. R. men on the West Side and the Womens Relief Corps will go informally to West Side cemeteries for the same purpose. They extend to all interested an invitation to join them.

The exercises of the day will begin at 10:30 A. M. sharp, and will be held in the morning at the monument in Lone Fir Cemetery; and at 2 o'clock in the afternoon at the South Plaza on Fourth street. The programme for the morning is as follows:

Comrades from George Wright, Lincoln, Garfield and other G. A. R. posts with all veterans wishing to participate, will assemble at the McKinley building, corner Second and Morrison streets, for parade. Other organizations wishing to take part will assemble in the vicinity under the direction of Comrade H. Sutcliffe, commander and grand marshal, and T. B. McDevitt, officer of the day. The Third Regiment O. N. G. and Spanish War Veterans will march as escort and parade will move as follows: Up Morrison street to Seventh, north on Seventh to Washington, east on Washington to Third, north on Third to Burnside, west on Burnside to Sixth, south on Sixth to Yamhill, east on Yamhill to Fourth, and east on Fourth to South Plaza.

Advocates Water Bonds

The first pole for the new independent telephone company, which was granted a franchise several months ago, was put in place today. This company comes as a competitor of the Sunset people. They claim they will give the public a system equal to any in the country. The Sunset franchise expires next year.

At University Park last night a mass meeting was held under the auspices of the University Park Improvement Club and the Ladies' Civic Improvement Association. W. J. Peddicord presiding. A literary and musical programme was rendered. Councilman Vaughn delivered an address on the charter amendments and questions coming up at the June election. He strongly advocated the \$3,000,000 water bonds, declaring them important. Mr. Vaughn favored improvement of streets in districts and spoke for the new Madison-street bridge, but declared against the proposition to vote bonds for a new fireboat, as he considered the boat unnecessary.

"City Beautiful" was the subject of W. Wynn Johnson's talk. He advocated parks in general and municipal art decorations. He also advocated the appointment of an inspector of weights and measures.

One result of Mr. Johnson's talk, F. J. McKenna introduced the following resolution, which was adopted:
Resolved, That it is the sense of this meeting that the City of Portland should have an inspector of weights and measures.

MEN WHO CANNOT VOTE

Those Not Having Lived in Their Wards 30 Days, Says Thomas.

PORTLAND, May 21.—(To the Editor).—Our statutes regulating elections will bar out many men who are now expecting to vote on June 2.

It is not sufficient to have lived in Oregon for six months; but one must have resided in Portland six months and in a ward 30 days. Therefore an elector who has changed his residence from one ward to another since May 4, 1907 (even though such elector may have registered his new address while the registration books were open recently), is not legally entitled to vote on June 2. Neither will the affidavit of six freeholders be of value, unless the intending voter has lived for 30 days in the ward within which he offers to vote (see section 27 of the city charter).

Men knowing themselves disqualified as above will save themselves trouble and the judges of election a disagreeable duty by remaining away from the polls on June 2. Or is there a remedy? Is a remedy wanted?

Section 27 of the Portland charter is as follows: "No person is qualified to vote at an election held under this act who has not been a resident of the city for six months and of the ward or precinct in which he offers to vote for 30 days next preceding such election, and who does not possess the qualifications of a legal voter of the State of Oregon."
Section 274 of the Beilinger and Cotton code of Oregon prescribes the mode of qualification to be administered to every elector who may be challenged at the polls, as follows:
"You do solemnly swear (or affirm) that you are a citizen of the United States, or have declared your intention to become such, one year next preceding this election; that you are of the age of 21 years; that you have been a resident of this state for six months next preceding this election; that you have not voted at this election; and that your true name is as you represent it to be."
