

TALKS ON ELECTION

Dr. Brougier Urges All to Vote for Harry Lane.

RECOMMENDS OTHERS, TOO

"Get Together" Is Subject Taken by White Temple Pastor for Political Sermon—Speaks on Good Government.

Evidence of the intense interest in today's municipal election was shown at the White Temple last night. The pastor, Dr. J. Whitcomb Brougier, had announced that he would discuss the merits of some of the rival candidates and the result was that the large church auditorium was filled to overflowing before the hour for the service had arrived.

"Get Together" was the theme of Dr. Brougier's remarks. He urged all friends of good government to go to the polls and vote for Dr. Lane and he cited a number of reasons why the present Mayor should be retained for another term.

Today we can hardly find men to run for office who are unselfish enough to make the personal and business sacrifices required to fulfill faithfully the positions of responsibility and trust which stand in the church at Richmond, Va., where Patrick Henry delivered his speech on "Give Me Liberty or Give Me Death." I tried to recall the scenes of that occasion. As I stood at the place where he is said to have stood I breathed a prayer for my country, and asked God to give us a few men in public life today who would rather die than betray their trust when people elect them to office.

We are just entering upon an election tomorrow for various city officials. I wish that both parties had nominated men of unimpeachable character for every office to be filled, but this can hardly be expected where partisan politics control. Both the dominant parties have their good and bad elements. Whenever the good man believes in an open town gets into control they nominate men who are ready to favor their interests. It is a very difficult matter for a conscientious Christian man to know just what to do. If you haven't time to personally investigate every man running for office, get the Municipal Association ticket and vote that.

He may not have promised anything, but his lieutenants evidently have. The liquor dealers never support a man from whom they do not expect some return. They are not supporting Dr. Lane this time. He will owe them nothing when he is elected. If the decent element stands solidly for Dr. Lane, we will have a right to insist that certain things be done for the good of our city, and have every reason to believe that our wishes will be respected and carried out. If Mr. Devin is elected, the advice of the good people of this city will never be asked. The liquor interests selected Mr. Devin out of four nominees of the Republican party and worked tooth and nail for his nomination. They are now working hard and hide for his election. If he is elected, of course they will have more influence with him than the decent people of the city. Why shouldn't they?

Church Vote Should Unite.

If Mr. Lane is elected, it will be because every morally upright citizen who believes in a "square deal" gets in and votes for him. I believe that Dr. Lane will do more to carry out the wish of the morally upright citizen than Mr. Devin will. The trouble with church members is that they get bewildered by the multiplicity of conflicting ideas and then divide their vote between two candidates, while the liquor, crowd stands shoulder to shoulder with the man they expect to influence afterwards in behalf of their business. Church members are politically insane. You probably know that two idiots never think alike at the same time. Whenever one idiot thinks exactly like another idiot at the same time it is good evidence that he is becoming sane. It is a difficult matter to get the various church members of the various denominations to think exactly alike at the same time on political questions. We usually cheer the public of our folly at every election on this account. I am glad, however, that in this city we are becoming more sane. Let us prove our sanity tomorrow by voting solidly for Dr. Lane as Mayor, for Fred King as Councilman in the Fourth Ward and for all other men who represent the principles of good government.

Dr. Brougier closed with a short talk on his impressions of the Jamestown Exposition. He said the fair is still unfinished and would not advise any one to go there before September.

KILLS TO PROTECT MOTHER

Young Miner Slays Father Because of His Inhuman Conduct.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 2.—(Special).—C. W. Morris, a 26-year-old miner, at Franklin, a Pacific Coast Company mining camp in this county, shot his father at 2:30 o'clock this morning, to save his mother from continued abuse and assault. P. J. Morris, the father, who had been out most of the night returned home early this morning and began to abuse and attack his wife.

Young Morris, asleep upstairs, heard the noise and hurried to the room with a revolver. He forced his father to cease his attacks and started to leave the

room. As soon as young Morris' back was turned, the elder man is said to have renewed his attacks on his wife. The son turned from the doorway and fired at his father. Then he went out and gave himself up to a Deputy Sheriff.

Since Sunday closing in the mining camp was enforced the miners have been buying liquors on Saturday for a Saturday and Sunday debauch. The Pacific Coast Company claims a serious brawl has occurred each Sunday and has strongly urged allowing saloons to reopen.

Miscreant Kills Horses.

ALBANY, Or., June 2.—(Special).—M. J. Nye, of Sweet Home, is vainly endeavoring to secure some trace of the person who killed his horses out of spite. About two years ago two horses belonging to Nye were shot and killed while in a pasture on the very edge of the town of Sweet Home. Believing it was the deliberate work of enemies, Nye kept his horses in his barn after securing new ones, until a few days ago. Then he turned them out in the same pasture and the very next morning he found one of them with its leg shattered by a rifle bullet. Nye has suspicions but lacks proof.

Victim a Clatskanie Man.

ASTORIA, Or., June 2.—(Special).—The man who was killed while at work on the Astoria & Columbia Railroad Company's steam shovel a few days ago and who was supposed to have been Thomas Gallagher of Clatskanie. Albany Will Get Library.

ALBANY, Or., June 2.—(Special).—The establishment of Albany's free library is assured. Enough local citizens have taken paid memberships in the library to insure its launching on a permanent basis. A hall will soon be rented and books purchased. The library will be incorporated under the state law, will be entitled to the benefits arising from the State Library Commission. Under this arrangement Mayor Wallace will name a board of nine directors, to serve three years. A committee of those who have taken memberships in the library has been named to confer with Mayor Wallace in regard to the matter.

Fire Has Reached Green Timber.

ON EVE OF ELECTION

Estacada Will Choose Officials Tomorrow.

CONTEST FOR MAYOR CLOSE

Dr. W. K. Haviland and J. W. Reed Wage Warm Battle and Indulge in Charges and Counter-Charges.

The town of Estacada is in the throes of a municipal campaign, which will be settled at the election tomorrow. Following are the two opposing tickets: Mayor, J. W. Reed; Councilmen, W. J. Jones, First Ward; C. F. Howe, Second Ward; L. C. Fosson, Third Ward; E. A. Miller, Fourth Ward; W. F. Carey, Fifth Ward. Opposition ticket—Mayor, Dr. W. K. Haviland; Councilmen, A. Morrow, First Ward; Edward Malory, Second Ward; William Dale, Third Ward; E. F. Surface, Fourth Ward; J. F. Lovelace, Fifth Ward; Recorder, A. N. Johnson; Treasurer, H. Cooper.

The chief contest seems to be over the Mayorship, although both sides hope to capture a majority of the Council. J. W. Reed has been elected Mayor of Estacada since it was made a city two years ago, and the opposition declares the affairs of the city have not been managed in the interests of the people, and have selected Dr. W. K. Haviland, a prominent physician, to head the opposition ticket. A strong effort is being made to secure his election on the ground that a radical reform is needed in the administration of city affairs.

The opposition further asserts that Mr. Reed cannot take the office, as he has been elected because of his connection with the alleged Sellwood election frauds, and that in case he is elected, proceedings will be taken to prevent his taking office.

It is alleged that the purchase of the present water plant was a deal in which the city was worsted. The city paid about \$800 for the plant, and it is said that the water plant is not worth more than \$2500. It is pointed out that when it was proposed to purchase the plant, a committee of citizens made a thorough investigation and estimated the value of the plant at \$4000, and so reported to a mass meeting of citizens, which was nevertheless dominated by the friends of Mayor Reed and the Council. The meeting voted that the plant be purchased, and recommended any price. The Council then bought the plant for the sum of \$8000, and issued bonds to the amount of \$10,000 to pay for the plant and make improvements. The supporters of the ticket of which Dr. Haviland is the head say the interests of the city were not safeguarded in this deal, and allege that the water plant is wholly inadequate and the Council has failed to improve the plant. At times declare the opposition, there is no water, and it is said the next day after the deal was closed the new motor that had been used to pump water was removed and an inferior one put in its place. Dr. Haviland declared yesterday that the water plant is nearly worthless in its present condition.

Row Over Street Paving.

The biggest row was over a street contract for paving several of the streets with asphalt rock. Al Lindsey, who made the contract, the whole amounting to \$11,200, and an average of \$75 and \$86 per lot. T. J. Wirtz and Jack Cassidy are protesting against Lindsey's work on one of the streets, and it is alleged an attempt was made to bribe them to withdraw the remonstrance. Wirtz and Cassidy are assessed \$400 for their part of the street improvement, and they charge that J. W. Reed, E. L. Fraley, W. R. Carey and R. A. Stratton offered them \$100 to withdraw their remonstrance. In any event, the matter is being taken to court. Lindsey afterwards sold out his property on the street to Mayor Reed. But the opposition to the improvement took him into court with the result that Contractor Lindsey was enjoined from proceeding with the work, and the final hearing is yet to be had. The work for which the contract was let for \$11,200 can be done for \$5000 or \$6000. The opposition to the present administration is taking him that for the past two years the accounts of the city have been loosely kept, that no financial statement has ever been made by the present Mayor, and that Quick's pocketbook, containing the finances of the city. It is also said that the City Treasurer never saw the \$11,200 for which the bonds of the city were sold, and he has to show for it a receipt. These are the main items for which the opposition arraigns Mayor Reed and his administration. They even say that his election means a heavy blow to the town.

Defends Mayor Reed.

E. L. Fraley, cashier of the Estacada State Bank, of which Mayor Reed is manager, makes a very vigorous defense of the Mayor, and characterizes his detractors as kickers and enemies to the progressive and good name of Estacada.

"Mayor Reed," said Mr. Fraley, "has been made the object of all these attacks, but none of these men who have been so busy attacking him have done so in the open and over their own names. If they did, Mayor Reed would know how to reach them. They do not dare to make direct charges against the Mayor or anybody connected with the city government. Every transaction concerning the municipal government of Estacada is being sold straight and fair and will bear the closest scrutiny. Mayor Reed defies any one to prove in a single instance where he has been guilty of a dishonest act in connection with the city government."

"Again, the charge that we made an attempt to bribe some of the property owners to withdraw their remonstrance is absurd and false. Nothing of the sort was done. A city must make improvements. It must improve its streets, or it cannot go ahead. When it was found that the paving of the streets was liable to be obstructed, rather than see the improvement fall through, we did offer to assist Wirtz and Cassidy to pay their assessments. I believe that we offered to assist these men to the amount of \$100. There is not a thing in any of these charges."

Estacada is being badly injured by the statements that have been made by the opposition and we feel it already. Mayor Reed's experience at Sellwood was unfortunate, but if the truth was known as it will be some time, it will be seen that he received very unfair treatment."

Mayor Reed Talks.

Mayor Reed supplemented the statement of Mr. Fraley to some extent, but what he said was practically the same. He said:

"My whole object has been and is now to build up and improve Estacada. I have been charged with everything on earth, and none making the charges come out in the open over their signatures. If they did that they would be called on to prove what they charge."

The vote tomorrow is expected to be close, and if the Mayor is elected, Dr. Haviland have been identified with the growth of Estacada since it became the terminus of the O. W. P. Railway. Mr. Reed is a trustee of the Methodist

Church recently built, and he contributed largely toward it. Dr. Haviland is a clean-cut man, who evidently believes that the town should be reformed, and he is a man of ideas, which he is able to express. Many of the charges made on either side are of such a nature that they border closely on the libelous, but all the bitterness will likely be forgotten in a week after the election, no matter which way it goes.

ANOTHER ALBANY INDUSTRY

New Iron Works and Foundry Will Be Installed.

ALBANY, Or., June 2.—(Special).—An iron works, equipped with a complete plant for the manufacture of all kinds of machinery and general foundry work, will be installed in Albany this Summer. It will be the second industry of the kind in this city.

The new industry will be established by Frank W. Watson, who now operates a machine shop in this city, and his brothers, Sidney and Calvin Watson, of Tacoma. Work on the plant will begin as soon as the land is chosen. The works will be built somewhere on Water street, on the Southern Pacific branch.

All of the Watson brothers have had extensive experience in this line of work. Frank Watson, who has lived here a number of years, worked for some time in the Albany Iron Works, which is one of the biggest plants of the kind in the state, and a few months ago established a machine shop here.

The other brothers have worked in big manufacturing establishments in Seattle and Tacoma.

It is the purpose of the new plant to make a specialty of building engines, but all kinds of machinery will be handled.

Accepts New School Building.

CENTRALIA, Wash., June 2.—(Special).—The building committee of the Board of Education has formally accepted the new school building, just completed. It will be known as the Washington School. The new school building is the finest building of its kind in the county, and cost in the neighborhood of \$25,000. Centralia has now three large school buildings with a total enrollment of about 16,000 pupils.

FILE BRIEF ON REFERENDUM

APPROPRIATION BILL PETITIONERS ANSWER CRAWFORD

Council Holds That Request for Referring This Matter Is Not Defective and Is in Legal Form.

SALEM, June 2.—(Special).—Timmon Ford, attorney for the petitioners who demanded the referendum upon the university appropriation bill, has answered the Attorney-General's brief discussing the sufficiency of the petition and urging that the Attorney-General should advise the Secretary of State to file the petitions. It is remembered that several days ago Attorney-General Crawford had prepared an opinion in which he advised the Secretary that the petitions were defective because of deficiency in the title of the act was not complete. Before the opinion had been transmitted, Mr. Ford appeared and asked time to file a brief, and Mr. Crawford, admitting that there was ground for argument, granted the request.

In his brief, Mr. Ford shows that the act governing the exercise of the referendum power does not require that the title of a law be set forth, though there is a space left in the referendum act for the title. He says that the petitioners have complied with the law in this respect, and that the title of the act is sufficient, for that would be a substantial compliance with the form prescribed. The law makes an exception in the case of a petition and the omission being merely a part of the title, he argues that this omission should at least be held to be an immaterial defect.

Mr. Ford argues that the petition would be sufficient if all the title had been omitted and merely the copy of the act given, but if it is necessary to include the title, he argues that since the petitioners have complied with the law in this respect, the title has been given it is sufficient, for that would be a substantial compliance with the form prescribed. BIG MONTH IN LAND OFFICE

Receipts for May Reach Total of \$100,707.01.

SALEM, Or., June 2.—(Special).—Receipts of the State Land Office for the month of May amounted to \$100,707.01, which is the largest sum for any one month for several years. The reason for the large collections during the past month is that many holders of state land certificates which had been under investigation were permitted to pay the balances due and take deeds. Presumably there will be large payments from the school fund in the near future, when some of the holders of fraudulently procured certificates surrender the paper and take back the partial payments they have made. Under the act of the legislature the State Land Board has the power, in its discretion, to pay back the purchase price when the certificates are cancelled, but if the truth was known as it will be some time, it will be seen that he received very unfair treatment."
