MAY ENTER DIPLOMATIC SERVICE.

Through several changes that are contemplated soon in the American diplomatic service abroad it is possible that a Portland citizen may be appointed to a post in one of the European countries. The name of M. J. MacMahon, a local attorney, is now under consideration at Washington for appointment as Minister to one of the embassies on the continent, probably Switzerland. Mr. MacMahon has been honored for such an appointment by several United States Senators and a number of educators throughout the country. Among others who have recommended him are Senators Cullom, of Illinois, Spooner, of Wisconsin and Fulton and Bourne, of Oregon. The matter is now in the hands of President Roosevelt. Mr. MacMahon is well known in Portland. He has occupied many educational positions and is the author of several works. He is a graduate of Yale and was for several years a student in Paris.

BULLETIN ON TUBERCULOSIS.—The latest bulletin issued by the Department of Health deals with tuberculosis and is from the pen of Dr. E. A. Pierce, of Portland. The subject is dealt with in comprehensive style and the information contained is valuable to all having to deal with the "White Plague." The bulletin sets forth that nearly one-third of the persons who die in Oregon are from tuberculosis and 45 years of age succumb to consumption. Simple rules for avoiding contagion and how best to cope with the dread disease when once it fastens upon one, are given in the bulletin in a readable way.

DEATH OF L. D. BROOKS.—Leander D. Brooks, an old resident, died yesterday at his home on East Twenty-eighth street at the age of 85 years. He had lived in that neighborhood for 27 years. The funeral will be held from the residence tomorrow at 11 A. M. and interment will be in Lone Fir Cemetery. Mr. Brooks was one of the best-known residents on the East Side. He leaves his wife and a daughter, Mrs. C. S. Sutherland.

STREET CAR MANGLES BOY

FAYE HANWAY CRUSHED TO DEATH IN CROSSING STREET.

Catastrophe Too Sudden to Avert, Declares Motorman, and Fender Fails to Work.

Faye Hanway, a lad 17 years of age, was run over and instantly killed by car No. 327 of the Waverly-Woodstock division of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company at Central avenue and Belmont street yesterday afternoon. Mr. and Mrs. Nels Liverson, both old Oregonians, were struck and hurled to the ground by car No. 327. Both were badly injured and shocked, and Mrs. Liverson's condition is serious. The aged couple are inmates of a sanitarium at Mount Tabor, and were taking their usual afternoon stroll. As they approached the streetcar track they did not notice the danger, and were struck before they could jump from the track. They were assisted to the sanitarium by Mounted Policemen Gustafson and attendants of the institution and are under care of a physician. Their extreme age makes their condition more serious.

AGED VICTIM MAY DIE

Joseph McVittie Held for Brutally Beating Hamilton Knott.

Hamilton Knott, 60 years of age, is dying at his home, 314 East Seventh street, from a clot of blood on the brain, the result of a fracture of the skull, and Joseph McVittie, aged 21 years, occupies a City Jail cell, charged with assault and battery on the old man. In the event of the latter's death it is probable that a manslaughter charge will be filed. It is the belief of the police that the prisoner inflicted the wounds at the barns of the Olson Transfer Company in a fight on the morning of May 23.

Both men were employed in the Olson barn. According to information obtained by Acting Detective Price, McVittie flew into a rage because Knott told him how to harness a horse. McVittie is said to have applied a vile epithet to Knott, who resented it, and the fight followed.

Knott sustained a fracture of the skull and a blood clot later formed on his brain. McVittie declares he merely slapped the old man's face with the open hand, and denies beating him. Dr. Arthur H. Johnson has been attending Knott. Last night he gave it as his opinion that Knott could not live long. Deputy District Attorney Adams was notified and hurried to police headquarters, where he held a consultation with McVittie. In the meantime Policeman Knott was sent to ascertain Knott's condition. It was found he was so low at 10 o'clock that he could not talk, and no statement was obtained from him.

McVittie was locked up at first with bail fixed at \$200, but when it became apparent that Knott could not live no bail was allowed. The prisoner is held pending the action of the District Attorney.

AUCTION SYSTEM TESTED

J. Whyte Evans Sells Real Estate Under Hammer.

Portland's first public auction sale of real estate was held in the main corridor of the Chamber of Commerce yesterday. At the morning sale there was a good-sized crowd in attendance, but J. Whyte Evans, who held the sale, said he made a mistake in adjourning for lunch as the afternoon attendance fell off considerably.

For the first effort the total sales, amounting to \$89,000, were considered satisfactory by the promoter of this innovation. No. 1 of the catalogue, the Washington apartment-house at 639-635 Northrup street, was knocked down at \$29,000, though the catalogue stated that the property was built upon last October at a cost of \$45,000 and that the lot is worth \$7000. A misunderstanding between Evans and the purchaser as to the amount of cash down required, resulted in having the sale held up, but it was said after the sale that in all probability that matter could be adjusted amicably. Several pieces were withdrawn on account of the low offers made.
