

OUTRAGED JUDGES PUNISH AFFIANT

Justices of Federal Court Are
Charged With Collusion by
Oil Company Secretary.

SENTENCED THREE MONTHS

Fishing Excursion Given by Attorney
for Santa Fe Made Basis for Sen-
sational Affidavit by Com-
petitor of the Standard.

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., June 5.—Judge W. C. Hook, of the United States Circuit Court, today sentenced H. H. Tucker, Jr., the indicted secretary of the Uncle Sam Oil Company, to serve three months in the Leavenworth County jail for contempt of court, the contempt being a sensational affidavit filed by Tucker alleging conspiracy between Federal Judges Pollock, McPherson and Phillips, and the Standard Oil Company, to drive the Uncle Sam Oil Company out of business.

Gives Affidavit—Severe Arraignment.
Judge Hook delivered a terrific arraignment of Attorney Albert L. Wilson, of Kansas City, who prepared the affidavit. He said the only purpose of filing the affidavit was to create a sensation in the papers and influence public sentiment. Hook declared there was no precedent for such an affidavit, and the Clerk of the Court was criticized for placing it on file. It was arraigned from the files by order of Judge Hook.

Tucker commenced serving his sentence tonight. The bankruptcy proceedings were postponed until a Judge can be found who can sit on the case. Judge Pollock will not preside.

Make Trip in Private Car.
The affidavit alleged that Judges Pollock, Phillips and McPherson went on a fishing trip to Tampico, Mexico, on January 26, 1906, in the private car of Gardner Lathrop, head of the legal department of the Santa Fe, and strongly intimated that during the trip a conspiracy was entered into between the judges and the Standard Oil Company, the claim being made that the Standard and the Santa Fe road were controlled by the same persons. The affidavit further alleged that Pollock made a statement against Tucker and the Uncle Sam Company out of court.

Tucker was on the stand two hours and was subjected to a grueling examination by N. H. Leavelle, attorney for the Union Pacific, named by the court to conduct the examination. Tucker attempted to corroborate the charges in the affidavit, but became badly mixed and admitted the affidavit was prepared on hearsay.

Want Bankrupt Case Dismissed.
The attorneys for the Uncle Sam Oil Company asked the court to dismiss the bankruptcy proceedings, stating that Tucker was a party to the proceedings and that the case was a mere sham. Judge Hook refused to dismiss the suit. Tucker will be taken from jail to testify. The present term of court will be continued until a Judge can be secured. Judge Hook returned to St. Paul tonight.

BLOWN UP WITH ALL CREW

TURKISH SMUGGLER CAPTAIN'S
DESPERATE DEED.

Seeing Capture Inevitable, He De-
stroys Ship and Sends 80 As-
sailants to Eternity.

TUNIS, June 5.—A Turkish sailing vessel laden with contraband ammunition, which was bound for Tripoli, has been blown up in the vicinity of Port Zaria. Her entire crew as well as 80 fishermen, who were alongside at the time, were drowned.

The vessel had on board a number of rifles and 500 barrels of powder. The local authorities learned that she was about to take advantage of the absence of the guardships to try to destroy her cargo on the beach. They thereupon ordered a body of armed boats belonging to sponge-fishers to prevent the sailing.

Twenty-four of these boats went out and surrounded the vessel, and the men from them were just about to swarm aboard when a terrific explosion occurred. It is believed the captain anchored his vessel to avoid capture. Many sponge boats went down with the vessel.

The explosion was heard for a distance of 60 miles. Zaria is in Tunis near the frontier of Tripoli.

COREANS FLOCK TO SIBERIA

Flee From Japanese Rule to Shelter-
ing Arm of Russia.

VLADIVOSTOK, June 5.—The Co-
rean exodus into Primorsky, a large province of Asiatic Russia, amounts to nearly 200 persons weekly, many of whom are leaving Korea on account of the Japanese conditions. Twenty-five thousand persons have crossed the border on foot since January and 11,000 have reached Vladivostok by sea. The government officials, who are expecting 60,000 Russians to reach Primorsky this season, today began relieving the congestion by sending a shipload of immigrants to the Kamchatka fisheries.

TRYING TO SOW DISSENSION

Circular Distributed by Socialists
Among British Soldiers.

LONDON, June 5.—"You are perhaps
heretofore of the rights of citizenship. Trial by court-martial is a mere farce and
mockery." "Military law is rotten." These are among the phrases in a circular headed, "An appeal to soldiers," which was distributed at Aldershot today by the Social Democratic Federation. It urges the soldiers to be dissatisfied with their lot and demands the abolition, root and branch, of the national army as at present organized.

KING WILL VISIT IRELAND

Rampant Discontent Does Not Scare
Edward and Alexandra.

LONDON, June 5.—Official announce-
ment is made tonight that King Edward
and Queen Alexandra will visit Ireland

early in July. The news has caused great
surprise, as news of Irish discontent is
common property.

DEFEND HERO'S MEMORY

Sicilians Want to Hang Abbe Who
Slandered Garibaldi.

ROME, June 5.—The people of the vil-
lage of Giardini, Sicily, attempted today
to lynch an abbe, because in the course
of a sermon he denounced Garibaldi as a
spurious hero. The abbe had to appeal
to the protection of the carabinieri to
escape from the mob.

Earthquake Shocks at Guayaquil.

GUAYAQUIL, June 5.—Two earthquake
shocks were felt here last night at 10
o'clock. The first was light and the sec-
ond was 25 seconds long, and was violent
and made many people abandon their
houses.

King Oscar Resumes Reins.

STOCKHOLM, June 5.—King Oscar's
health is so far improved that today he
resumed the reins of government, which
he relinquished December 14, 1906, when
he appointed Prince Gustave, the Crown
Prince, to act as regent.

Car's Daughter Stricken.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 5.—Grand
Duchess Anastasia, the 6-year-old daugh-
ter of Emperor Nicholas, is ill and it is
feared she has diphtheria. The Empress
is caring for the child personally.

Rumors of Portuguese Revolt.

LISBON, June 5.—The rumors of a
dynastic revolution, with the object of
placing Don Miguel on the throne, are
not taken seriously here. The new elec-
tions have been fixed for November.

CHINESE REBELS ACTIVE

Serious Outbreak at Former Refuge
of Pirates.

HONGKONG, June 5.—A serious rebel-
lous outbreak is reported to have oc-
curred at Wei Chou, about 30 miles south
of Pakhoi, formerly the refuge of the
pirates of the Gulf of Tonkin. The
rebels are attacking the city and troops
from Canton have been asked for.

The rising at Lien Chou is dying out,
owing to the energetic action of the local
authorities.

CRUISER CLEVELAND AT AMOY

Joins Helena to Protect Threatened
American Interests.

WASHINGTON, June 5.—The Navy
Department is informed that the cruiser
Cleveland has joined the gunboat
Helena at Amoy. It is stated that the
movement was not ordered from Wash-
ington and that it probably has been
ordered by the commandant of the
Cleveland at Amoy on her way to another
port. Nothing has been heard from the
commandant of the Cleveland since she
left Amoy. The trouble in China, and
the impression prevails here that the
reported uprising is confined to the
interior and is directed against the
government and not against foreigners.
It is not regarded as improbable that
the Cleveland will remain at Amoy and
assist the Helena in the protection of
American interests in case of necessity.

No Wires to Scene of Revolt.

AMOY, China, June 5.—Telegraphic
communication with Chang-Chow, 40
miles up the river from here, is inter-
rupted and river navigation is suspended,
the latter, however, owing to the in-
creased duties levied on vessels and
cargoes. The local conditions at Chang-
chow yesterday were reported to be
favorable.

TRY TO BURN ALLENTOWN

Firebugs Make Effort to Destroy
Pennsylvania City.

ALLENTOWN, Pa., June 5.—What was
apparently an effort of incendiaries to de-
stroy the city of Allentown occurred here
early today, when firemen were called
almost simultaneously to fight three fires
in the business section of the city.

The first fire occurred in the stockhouse
of Bittner, Hunsicker & Co., one of the
largest drygoods houses in the Lehigh
Valley; the Palace Furniture Company,
and the third at the furniture factory of
Helfrich, Bohner & Co.

An effort was made to draw the fire-
men from the business section by turning
in a false alarm from a remote sec-
tion of the city. Total loss \$125,000.

Association, took the visitors in hand and
entertained them during their five hours'
stay in the city. Visits were made to the
mines and the smelter, with side trips
to Anaconda. The Omahans left for the
West this evening and will reach Spokane
tomorrow morning.

HEAVY ADVANCE IN MEATS

Pittsburg Consumers of Beef Must
Pay 5 to 10 Cents More.

PITTSBURG, June 5.—A general advance
in the price of meats was announced
in this city today. Beef is the most
heavily affected. The increase in price
to the consumer is from 5 to 10 cents
a pound, according to cuts.

Smelter Trust's Extra Dividend.

NEW YORK, June 5.—The directors
of the American Smelting & Refining
Company today voted to increase the
quarterly dividend upon the common
stock 2 per cent. This is an increase of
1/4 of 1 per cent per quarter and, if
continued, will place the company's
stock on an 8 per cent dividend basis
as compared with 7 per cent in the
past.

FACT AND FANCY DO NOT CONCIDE

Sullivan Arrested by Indignant
Investor in Mining
Stock.

PITTSBURGER THE LOSER

Former Portlander Sells Him Stock
Worth Par, but Later Tells Him
Ore Exhausted—Wants His
Money Back.

NEW YORK, June 5.—(Special.)—Larry
M. Sullivan, of the L. M. Sullivan Trust
Company, of Goldfield, Nev., was arrested
on a civil order today at the instance of
Frank H. Colton, of Pittsburg, Pa. Mr.
Sullivan was paroled.

Mr. Sullivan's arrest is based on a suit
brought by Mr. Colton for \$102,700, the
par value of stock in one of Mr. Sulli-
van's mining companies, which Mr. Col-
ton alleges he was persuaded to purchase
a year ago. Its name was the Bullfrog-
Rush Mining Company and, according to
the affidavit, the company is now in the
hands of a receiver. Mr. Colton charges
that after he had bought 200 shares of
the stock he received the following tele-
gram, signed with Mr. Sullivan's name:

Sullivan's Room Telegram.
Just returned from a personal investiga-
tion of Rush properties. Fifty feet of ore
opened on Rush vein, which has
widened out to 300 feet and will mill;
1100 feet of tunnel work done to date.
Over 100,000 shares of stock owned and
exposed on this property. Consider the
fact that development work was com-
menced only ten weeks ago, showing is
most phenomenal of any mine in Nevada.
No such enormous body of ore opened up
in the Monticomey-shoshone at same stage
of development. Our engineer on the
ground and almost every miner of Bo-
nanza Mountain buying this stock. Intrin-
sic value at this time not less than par.

Bad News Comes Later.
This telegram was followed by a letter
repeating the good news, and Mr. Colton
could hardly wait long enough to sign
his check for \$40,000, for which he re-
ceived 100,000 shares. Then he sat back
to wait for the big sensation. It came by
degrees, but not the way he thought it
would. Its culmination was last Octo-
ber, when he received his notice that the
management regretted that the Bullfrog-
Rush had not developed as they
thought it would.

Last Winter Colton declared he received
an offer from the L. M. Sullivan Trust
Company to redeem all the Bullfrog-Rush
stock held by its clients, being given the
exchange of the stock of other companies
in which the Sullivan Trust Company was
interested. Mr. Colton refused, and was
informed that the ore veins of the mine
were exhausted.

CHAFFEE GRANT MARRIES

Grandson of Great General Finds a
Bride in Washington.

Dent Wrenshall, of this city, and Chaffee
Grant, of San Diego, Cal., grandson of
General U. S. Grant, were married here
tonight at the home of the bride's mother.

side in California.

by a locomotive, W. C. Risdon, a notable
railroad man, committed suicide this
afternoon by placing his head under the
wheel of a moving train. His neck was

manager of a roofing company in Salt
Lake City, was arrested today at Com-
merce, Oakland County, where he was
visiting on a relative's farm. He was
arrested on a charge of larceny from
Sheriff Emery, of Salt Lake, charging
that when he left Salt Lake City his
books were "bracketed" and he knows
nothing of any embezzlement. The
Sheriff's telegram gave no details of the
alleged embezzlement.

Honest Work Prevents Leak.

WASHINGTON, June 5.—Chief Stat-
istician Olmstead, of the Department
of Agriculture, testified today in the
trial of E. S. Holmes, Jr., former as-
sistant statistician of that department,
on the charge of prematurely divulging
information of the department concern-
ing the cotton crop. Mr. Olmstead
said that a leak in the crop report
would be impossible if its preparation
was honestly conducted.

Killed Woman and Shot Himself.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 5.—The body of
Mrs. Catherine McCarty, who lived in
Minneapolis and who has been missing
since May 24, was found yesterday by
detectives in an abandoned well on the
farm of George Katselbach, a few miles
out from the city. The woman's head
had been crushed and the body was
partly clothed. Today Katselbach's dead
body was found four miles from the
farm. He had shot himself.

Oppose Telephone Affiliation.

CHICAGO, June 5.—Opposition to any
affiliation of independent telephone
companies with the Bell Telephone
Company, "anywise," on the American
continent, was embodied in a resolution
adopted today by representatives of
the independent companies in con-

DOLLAR LOW MARK

Grainraisers Meet in Omaha
to Organize.

SECURE CONTROL IN 1907

Four Hundred Delegates to Ameri-
can Society of Equity Propose to
Have Say in Setting Purchase
Price Hereafter.

OMAHA, Neb., June 5.—(Special.)—
"One dollar shall be the minimum
price for a bushel of wheat, with other
grains in proportion," was about the
first remark of President J. A. Everett,
of Indianapolis, head of the American
Society of Equity, when he called to
order today nearly 400 enthusiastic
delegates for the purpose of national-
izing the graingrowers' organization. Less
than half this number had been
expected, and when the delegates were
joined by 200 Nebraska grain men they
looked ready to make deliveries on
their contracts.

Want Voice in Market.
"Every delegate to this body," de-
clared Mr. Everett, "has paid his rail-
road fare and many of them are here
from as far east as the Atlantic Coast.
There is no politics in this gathering,
but when it adjourns, action will have
been taken that will insure to the grain-
raisers of this country a voice in
making the price they shall receive
for their products."

Today's proceedings were in a large
manner of a preliminary sort, and sev-
eral committees were put to work to
prepare a programme of organization
and procedure. O. B. Schafer, of Ne-
braska, was made chairman; C. K.
Deekman, of Kansas, secretary, and L.
N. Staats, of Illinois, assistant sec-
retary. Thirteen states have representa-
tives at the convention, and state pres-
ents include Schafer of Nebraska,
Jones of Illinois, Wilson of
Oklahoma, Pauley of North Dakota,
and several national officers of the So-
ciety of Equity.

Stop Sales at Low Prices.

The resolutions and bylaws to be
adopted, and the election of officers,
will be the greatest importance. The
bylaws will provide the "modus operandi"
of the organization, and will present
the plan for keeping the wheat at a
price that will enable the grain grower
to secure the price placed on the
product by the National organization.
These bylaws will come up for adoption
tomorrow.

meeting is to secure control of the 1907
wheat crop. It is realized that quick
work will be necessary, and the asso-
