

COLLEGE IS CLOSED

Albany Commencement Exercises Being Held.

STRONG SERMON TO CLASS

President Crooks Advises as to Right Sort of Life—Other Preachers Join in Services—Exercises Last for Several Days.

ALBANY, Or., June 16.—(Special.)—Baccalaureate Sunday of the 1907 commencement exercises of Albany college was observed today. In the forenoon the baccalaureate address was delivered in the United Presbyterian Church by President H. M. Crooks, of the college, and this evening Rev. Edward M. Sharp, of Portland, gave the annual address to the Christian Association of the college in services held in the Methodist Church.

"Life and More Life" was the theme of President Crooks' baccalaureate address. He traced the futile efforts of science to create life and said life is increased only through Christ, who lived that we might have more abundant life. Liberty has been the banner of the Cross, he said, liberty from tyranny, liberty of thought and action, liberty of conscience and more strangely, liberty for women.

Men have no power to increase their days so they must secure more life qualitatively instead of quantitatively, President Crooks argued. The educated man has peculiar temptations. He may make men work for him or he may work for men. Shall men accept the cup of wealth, that wealth comes from men who earn it in the jeopardy of human life? The speaker used the railroad as an example of this kind, stating that profits were often made by saving money that might be expended in safeguarding life of employees and passengers. Stockholders and mineowners also receive profits from the jeopardy of life. The life of men who contributed to liberty and education is the cup people drink who live a life of ease and do not do their duty by the world.

The speaker said that the world is not reading poems but is pursuing the testimony in the Orchard case; is adding paintings but sending pictures postcards, most of them foolish. But with all its seeming coldness, he said, the world is not so unappreciative. The "more life" of his theme, the speaker said, comes to those who live their "life" away. Life is given to its own preservation; "more life" is given to the service of mankind.

Splendid music by the chorus which gave the oratorio Friday evening was a feature of the baccalaureate exercises. Rev. J. C. Elliott, of Grace Presbyterian Church, of Albany, offered the invocation; Rev. W. P. White, of the United Presbyterian Church, offered the prayer; Rev. E. M. Sharp, of Portland, gave the scripture reading, and Rev. W. W. Dougherty, of the M. E. Church, pronounced the benediction.

The remaining exercises of commencement week at Albany college will be held tomorrow, Tuesday and Wednesday.

EXERCISES BEGIN AT PACIFIC

President Ferrin Delivers Baccalaureate Sermon to Students.

PACIFIC UNIVERSITY, Forest Grove, Or., June 16.—(Special.)—The annual baccalaureate exercises of Pacific university began this morning. Before a large body of alumni and students President W. N. Ferrin delivered the baccalaureate sermon. President Ferrin chose as his text Acts xxi, 19, "And I was not desecrated unto the heavenly vision."

The speaker began with an illustration drawn from the experience of being at one time upon Necanic Mountain in Tillamook in a dense fog in which the travelers nearly lost themselves. Suddenly a rift in the fog appeared for a few minutes, affording a brief view of the sea and the surf far below, and then closed, leaving the travelers again in the mist as before, but with a new sense of his position and of the beauties so near, though hidden from his view.

Visions were defined as the means used for communicating divine truth to men. They were given again and again to characters in the Bible narrative. Abraham Lincoln had a vision of the brutality of human slavery when in early manhood he witnessed a slave auction in New Orleans. Visions are sent to nations and cities as well as to individuals. The histories of Greece, Rome and Spain are lessons placed before the American people to teach that national stability cannot be built upon injustice and immorality.

Referring to the San Francisco disaster the speaker expressed the opinion that the attempt to draw any "moral lessons" from it are unjustified. It was a catastrophe of nature and had no moral element in it. The present revelations of official greed and corruption in the city's government are a far different matter. It is a greater calamity than the earthquake was and contains a great moral lesson for other cities to heed.

At the close of the address the members of the senior class, in cap and gowns, arose to receive the usual personal address.

The remainder of the programme will be carried out as follows:

Monday, June 17—Senior day exercises on college campus.

Tuesday, June 18—Academy graduating exercises; Tuesday evening a meeting of the associate alumni.

Wednesday, June 19—The graduating exercises of the university, corporation dinner and an address to the graduating class by Dr. T. L. Eliot, of Portland.

VACANCY IN THE SHEEP BOARD

President Boylen Removes to Colorado, Leaving Plum for Someone.

PENDLETON, Or., June 16.—(Special.)—A vacancy is being caused in the State Board of Sheep Commissioners by the removal from this city to Denver of T. B. Boylen, president of the board. Mr. Boylen is now in Denver and will be joined by his family as soon as the necessary arrangements can be completed.

Though as traveling salesman for the Baldwin Sheep & Land Company, of Crook County, which he has been a member, he will of necessity spend a great portion of his time in this state, his home will be in Colorado. According to the provisions of the law creating the Board of Sheep Commissioners, each member must be a resident of this state, and therefore his place will become vacant.

He has not sent in his resignation as yet, and as his appointment was only for a year, it is not known whether the Governor will immediately appoint another man to fill out the unexpired term or not.

Oregon City Divorces.

OREGON CITY, Or., June 16.—(Special.)—Judge McBride adjourned Circuit Court here last night after a two week session and handed down decrees in the following divorce cases: Dyle A. D. Knotts vs. William B. Knotts, Myrtle J. Parker vs. Harry E. Parker, Leonora A. Cooper vs. W. A. Cooper, Mina Johnson vs. Eric August Johnson. The suit of W. J. Zimmerman vs. Joseph Hawkins was dismissed and a judgment for the plaintiff in the sum of \$15 was given in the suit of W. M. Smith vs. George W. Dixon.

Suit has been instituted by Daisy E. Schikora vs. F. R. Schikora for a decree of divorce. They were married in this city September 18, 1904, and the plaintiff alleges that her husband assaulted her with razor and threatened to kill her. Her maiden name was Fowler.

May Have No Public Wharf.

OREGON CITY, Or., June 16.—(Special.)—Some opposition has been developed to the movement for the establishment of a public wharf at the foot of Eleventh and Second streets, and a possibility that the project will go down to defeat. The soliciting committee of the Board of Trade started out last week with a whirlwind campaign to raise funds to defray the cost of construction, and succeeded in procuring \$500 in one morning, but several property owners who have objected to the proposed site oppose the construction and decline to subscribe.

Chinaman Shoots His "Cousin."

SOUTH BEND, Wash., June 16.—(Special.)—Chun Ming, a Chinaman from the oyster beds, was brought to town by the Sheriff yesterday, charged with shooting another of his own race, near Bay Center, in this county. It seems the two were employed on the same work and Ming accused his victim of "filching" oysters and put a couple of 38-caliber bullets into him.

The wounded Chinaman will recover and Chun Ming stands trial in Superior Court for assault with intent to kill.

Fight Against County Division.

ABERDEEN, Wash., June 16.—The fight against county division which was taken out of the jurisdiction of Judge Rice at Chehalis the past week is to be desperately fought in the Supreme Court when it comes up the latter part of June. Every name on the list of voters who have signed the petition will be attacked if the Supreme Court will allow it. It is possible the Supreme Court may send it back to Judge Rice to be fully tried out with a final decision, if necessary, by the higher tribunal.

Walkout at Hoquiam.

HOQUIAM, Wash., June 16.—(Special.)—The barge Walcott arrived in port today and is now lying at anchor in the harbor, waiting orders. A strike of the stevedores, now loading at the Northwestern Lumber Company, is being rushed. Longshoremen are working to day in order to get the steamer dispatched with a special cargo.

TEACHERS MEET IN SALEM

ANNUAL CONVENTION OF WESTERN DIVISION JULY 1 TO 3.

Many Educators of National Prominence, En Route to Los Angeles, Will Be in Attendance.

The seventh annual convention of the Oregon State Teachers' Association (Western Division), which meets in Salem July 1, 2 and 3, bids fair to be the most successful convention of its kind ever held in the state.

Owing to the fact that the National Educational Association convenes in Los Angeles July 8, 9 and 10, it has been possible to secure Eastern talent that might not otherwise have been available at this time.

The convention is also the regular annual institute for the teachers of Marion, Polk and Linn counties—three counties that rank high among educational lines, being second to none in the state in regard to enthusiastic, up-to-date workers. Portland and Multnomah County will send a large representation, so that in numbers it will probably exceed all former conventions.

The programme, in the judgment of one who has attended many educational gatherings in Oregon during the last 20 years, is a credit to the executive committee. It shows the most careful and judicious thought, the one idea uppermost in all departments being "The New Education," which will be presented by the most able speakers in many phases and from many viewpoints, but the end of all being to show "that that man is best educated who is the most useful."

George E. Chamberlain, Governor of Oregon, will deliver the opening address, Monday, July 1, at 9:45 A. M. William E. Chancellor, Superintendent of City Schools, Washington, D. C., will give two addresses—"What Is General Psychology and Has It Any Lessons for Educators?" and "The Forward Movement in Education" (with particular reference to its administrative features). Mr. Chancellor is a strong, forceful speaker, and is noted throughout the country for having reorganized the whole system of the schools of Washington, D. C.

L. D. Harvey, Superintendent of the Stout Manual Training Schools, Menominee, Wis., will address the convention. Mr. Harvey is a student of note along industrial lines, and his paper on "Education for Girls for the Home" will, no doubt, be full of interest and practical suggestions. Mr. Harvey will also give an address on "Industrial Education for Boys."

The subject of "Compulsory Education" will be discussed by the superintendents of the four neighboring states, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Oregon. "Education from a Business Man's Standpoint" will be presented by W. P. Olds, of the firm of Olds, Worthington and King, of Portland. Mr. Olds is a "Native Son," a leader in Portland's business affairs, and no one is more eminently capable of discussing this question.

W. C. Hawley, representative from Oregon, will address the convention, his subject being "All the World's a Stage." Mrs. Eva Emery Dye will speak on "The School of the Pioneer," and Mrs. Clara H. Waldo will tell "How a Teacher May Lead a Rural Community."

Judge A. L. Fraser, of the Circuit Court, Portland, will talk on "The Relation of the Juvenile Court to the Public School."

"Procedure in United States Senate" is the subject of an address which will be given by Hon. Frederick W. Mulkey, ex-United States Senator from Oregon. On Tuesday evening, July 2, Mr. W. L. Greenleaf, of Portland, will give one of his very entertaining programmes in which he will impersonate Bill Nye, Joseph Jefferson and James Whitcomb Riley. The music for that evening will be under the direction of Dr. Heritage and Dr. Von Jensen, of Willamette University, Salem.

Another programme will be given by R. A. Whitehead.
