of the pioneers tomorrow. Yesterday was an exceedingly busy day at the headquarters of the pioneers at the rooms of the Oregon Historical Society in the City Hall. Secretary Himes reports that more than 80 pioneers have already registered, among them many over 80 years of age. It was quite a common experience for pioneers to meet each other who had not met before for one or two score years. Chairs have been provided in the corridors of the upper floor of the City Hall, so that the snow-crowned foundation builders may sit and chat of the time when this country was new.

Customs-House Costs \$5,000.00.

NEW YORK, June 17.—Rapid progress is being made toward completion of the new customs house in Bowling Green, and while the contractors predict the building will be ready for occupancy July 1, the treasury officials believe it will be September before it is moving day from the present Wall Street building. The new building has been eight years in construction and, including the land, has cost approximately \$5,000,000.

ASK FOR MILLIONS A WEEK

Begging Requests Made Daily on Miss Helen Gould's Fortune.

NEW YORK, June 17.—According to a statement made public today, the requests for millions of dollars made daily on Miss Helen Gould's fortune. They range all the way from the asking for \$10 for a set of false teeth to \$1,000,000 to start a colony in Cuba. Miss Gould gave an itemized list of a week's requests recently to Franz Kallenborn, the orchestra leader. A movement is on foot among the millionaires of this city to make Mr. Kallenborn's orchestra a permanent feature in New York. For this subscription, however, the wealthy persons would be necessary. Miss Gould was one of those consulted. She encouraged Mr. Kallenborn, but incidentally cited the fact that this was not the only thing she was asked to encourage. Then she gave him the list.

In the week referred to Miss Gould received 231 requests for money of all rights. Out of these 193 left the amount to her good will and discretion. Miss Gould was asked in that week for \$5000 to help form an anti-slavery league in Idaho. She received 13 requests for aid for churches, 27 for educational institutions and 26 for libraries. More than 30 were for help for charitable institutions. Four persons, presumably young women, wanted Miss Gould to help them buy trousseaus. Eleven persons wanted pianos and 15 wanted Miss Gould to buy their inventions. Following are some of the other wants:

Bibles, bicycles, a farm and three cows, one invalid's chair, enough air pillows to supply a regiment of soldiers, one set of teeth, five sewing machines and 15 railway tickets.

Branch Railway Completed.

The Cedarville branch of the Green-Hamilton branch of the O. W. P. electric system has been completed to Fairview and Troutdale, and it is announced that cars may be started some time next week. The track passes Fairview nearly half a mile to the south, but the spur has been laid back to this branch of the O. W. P. and the O. R. & N. Company's main line at Fairview, so that cars on the two lines may be interchanged. This connection is for freight purposes only. There is some speculation as to the final destination of this branch, as it has right of way to the Columbia River.

J. P. O'BRIEN SELECTED HEAD
OF NEW HARRIMAN ROAD.

Road Will Be Operated Separately, With Headquarters at Albany. Union Depot Will Be Built.

ALBANY, Or., June 17.—(Special).—The Oregonian's recent story of the transfer of the Corvallis & Eastern to Harriman was confirmed here today by the election of J. P. O'Brien as president of the road. Henry Connor, of W. W. Connor's law office, secretary, and Guy W. Talbot, vice-president and general manager.

The Corvallis & Eastern will continue to be operated as a separate road. Talbot will retain offices in Portland, but the general offices will remain in Albany. The transfer is expected to result in a union depot in this city and the hope of years that the road be extended into Eastern Oregon.

ASK SUSPENSION OF ORDER

Ruling of Interstate Commerce Commission May Hurt Pacific Coast.

Through a ruling of the Interstate Commerce Commission adverse to the collection of the proposed \$5 membership fee in the National Educational Association, scheduled to meet in Los Angeles in July, it is considered probable that the meeting may have to be given up. At least the railroad take this view of the situation and Charles S. Fee, passenger traffic manager for the Southern Pacific, has asked agents of the company all over the system to explain the situation to commercial bodies with the purpose of bringing pressure to bear upon Congressmen and upon the I. C. C. to secure the revocation of the order.

The Portland Board of Trade has taken the matter up and has wired to the Interstate Commerce Commission as follows: "Press reports announce your ruling adverse to the collection of the \$5 fee for N. E. A. membership at the Los Angeles convention. Owing to the lateness of the decision, we fear confusion and a direct injury to the Pacific Coast interests and the probable abandonment of the convention. We strongly urge the suspension of the ruling in this case."

In his letter, Mr. Fee states that the N. E. A. relied upon the collection of this fee for the greater part of the expense of holding the convention, since all who took advantage of the rate would have to secure membership tickets from the Association in order to have their tickets validated at Los Angeles. Mr. Fee believes the result of this method would be the whole Pacific Coast to have the ruling.
