CARL SLEEP KILLS HIMSELF—Because he could not sleep, and was in poor health, Charles N. Atwood, of 228 East Third street, committed suicide at 4 o'clock yesterday morning by drinking carbolic acid. He had worked nights a long time at the Portland packing factory, and his constitution was impaired to such an extent that he was forced recently to quit work. Still he was unable to get relief in alcohol, and because so discouraged that he decided to take his own life to end his misery. These are the details given to Coroner Finley by the physician who found the body. The body was found at 3 o'clock this afternoon at the Finley chapel, Rev. Mr. Moore, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, officiating.

PLUNGED INTO BIG WINDOW—A horse belonging to Frank Griffith ran away last night about 8 o'clock, and crashed into a large plate glass window of Fraley's Millinery at 312 Third street. The entire front of the establishment, about 25 feet of plate glass, was broken, and several hats and wax figures in the window were destroyed. Mr. Fraley estimated the damage at \$60. The accident was a painful one, as the horse attached to a Hazelwood Creamery wagon, while coming down Salmon street, became frightened, and started to run. They jumped into the window, and then broke and ran away. At the corner of Third and Salmon streets, someone attempted to stop the Griffith horse, but the horse shied, and plunged into the window.

SNAKE THIEF IN HOTEL—A petty thief is in town, playing his paltry tricks in at least two instances, on guests of the Hotel Portland. The police received word yesterday morning that some one entered the room occupied by Miss Clara Harrington, a visitor from Minneapolis, stealing a purse containing \$5, a gold watch, a musical set and a railroad ticket worth \$100. Yesterday morning, Miss Harrington received a note from this thief, in which was a demand for \$100. He said he could not use it. One week ago Miss Day, daughter of H. L. Day, suffered loss by theft at the same hotel, and the police believe some one of the employees is guilty. Manager Bowers thinks differently. A policeman in plain clothes was detailed to investigate the robbery.

SCHOOLS OBSERVE FLAG DAY—Flag day, being the anniversary of the battle of Bunker Hill, was quietly observed by the Portland public schools yesterday. Flags were raised on the different buildings and some of the schools held appropriate exercises. The occasion was not generally observed for the reason that the pupils are busy with the many holidays incident to the closing of the schools. The anniversary of the battle of Bunker Hill was suggested by the daughters of the American Revolution as a proper day to teach the youth the significance of the National flag.

WILL EXPEDITE ENTRIES—It is announced by Special Inspector Thomas B. Neuhausen, of the Interior Department, who assumed the duties of Chief of Field Division of the General Land Office Special Agents yesterday, that he will expedite all individual homestead and timber and stone entries of the state. Several hundred of these entries have been held up by the department awaiting investigation and in some cases city townships were suspended. Eight Special Agents, two assistants and a clerk, William L. Miller, will be at Mr. Neuhausen's command.

THERE'S no use talking, it is a case of mutual admiration society with the Portland public and the San Francisco Opera Company. Every night since the opening of the engagement, five weeks ago, the Marquam has been the Mecca of those who go to the opera, and in the Summer time it seems that everybody's fancy turns to the lit and frivolity of comic opera.

The organization that has played such a notably successful engagement during the recent weeks gave "The Fortune Teller" last night and got all that was coming to it in the way of appreciation and applause.

It is another one of those singing successes which were written expressly for dear, dainty Alice Nielsen before her grand opera bee began buzzing in her bonnet. Victor Herbert and Harry Smith decided to put some of their best efforts into the score and book. The story differs but little from a dozen other bouffe plots, the theme of which has been interesting if not novel since it was handed down to our generation. The music, however, for the most part original, and while pretentious and dignified, has a degree of swing and go that appeals alike to trained and untrained ears.

As presented by the San Francisco company, there are a great many things to recommend it.

Of the principals, Aida Hamml in Nielsen's role monopolizes the singing opportunities except in the intervals when she is not looking. Albert Wallerstedt, as Sander the gypsy minstrel, and one or two other singing persons in the cast are permitted to warble.

For the comedy honors, Teddy Webb has given a most enjoyable performance and in the burlesque skit with Miss Hamml, while it is not new, he destroys the equilibrium of the house.

The big feature of the show is Miss Hamml's singing of "Parla," in which her magnificent voice has great opportunity.

In the part of the Count, whose penchant is for near-composing, Joseph Miller shows up as a strong bidder for the spot-light. Victor Herbert and Harry Smith make themselves decidedly important to the production, while Miss Sinnott in a bit takes a week off and has little to do.

The chorus, as usual, is one of the principal reasons why the company is popular.

"The Fortune Teller" will run through the week. After that "When Johnnie Comes Marching Home" will be offered and then good-bye to the San Francisco company.

At the Stock Theaters

"Confusion," at the Star.
 "CONFUSION," Nat Goodwin's great comedy success, is the bill at the Star this week. The whole play is full of complex situations, and from the time the curtain rises till the end of the last act, the audience is kept laughing. The conventional old maid in search of a husband, and the girl who has been with the eye for money are the particular mirth-provoking characters of the piece. A quarrelsome married couple and a butler and maid seeking to keep their marriage secret are the other principal characters.

The scene of the play is London, and the first act discloses the young married couple quarrelling over the wife's right to keep a little pet pug dog. The ancient spinster and the old bachelor are next brought out. Then their child, who helps the situation along. Then their child, in a children's home, is taken sick with the measles, and a telegram sent to the mother. The message is mislaid, the old maid picks it up and the funny complications. The old bachelor is charged with being the father of the sick child, the lover of the spinster, and the girl who has been with the eye for money.

Raymond Whitaker plays the part of the quarrelsome young husband, and Margaret Pitt is cast as the wife. To Miss Pitt especially is honor due, as it is her work that makes the whole play a success. The rest of the company is well cast, and in all, it must be said that "Confusion" is one of the Star's best bills.

"Shall We Forgive Her?" at Lyric.
 THERE is a problem play at the Lyric this week, one where the erring woman triumphs, where her sins are condoned, and where she is given a chance to raise out of the sordid world of sin and live the life of a Christian. "Shall We Forgive Her?" is the name of the play, and to Miss Josephine Deffery is the part of the erring woman. The play tells the story of a young woman, fallen from grace, who wanders to Australia, where she meets the loving husband, and he does great work. The rest of the company shows capability, though no special credit is due any one. The play is given every all week, with matinees this afternoon, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday.

At the Vaudeville Theaters

Grand.
 A family theater with something to please all ages and tastes, the Grand is this week maintaining its reputation in fact, the public is given one of the best vaudeville shows in weeks. The first offering is by James and Bonnie Farley, in what they call "A quaint vaudeville wit." In fact they both sing and dance cleverly, especially in Mr. Farley's sing-

ing of "In the Sweet Springtime" commendable. The Maude Isabel Entwistle Company present a one-act comedy play, let called "When the Widow Arrives," that is reasonably interesting, but only moderately funny.

Next follow Burton and Vasa, who term themselves comedians and finger whistlers. Their whistling is good. Herr Sosa presents living pictures from the Hall of Fame, his best impersonation being that of Andrew Carnegie and the second best, with its "Dixie" accompaniment, that of Robert E. Lee. As a scientific demonstration, the work of Captain Henry, wireless telegraphy expert, was exceptionally interesting. John Delmore and Emily Darrell in their "Study in Black and White" have really the star act of the bill. Miss Darrell's make-up is that of a typical "colored lady," while the singing and dancing of both of them are "aces high."

Fred Roberts sings his ballad well this week, and the moving pictures are among the best ever shown here.

Pantages.
 It can be said unreservedly and without qualification that Pantages has a thoroughly good bill this week. There is plenty of novelty, an abundance of comedy, a touch of spectacular and considerable of the thrilling. It is a bill that is costing Pantages a barrel of money.

The feature is the Swan Alligators and there are thrills enough in this act to make the rest of the most exciting. It would seem that Swan takes his life into his hands going into a glass tank to wrestle with a monster alligator. His head would fill only a small portion of its mouth should the big reptile ever chance to get the better of the bout. This act is billed as a "death" act, and it is not without doubt this billing is well founded. Few men would care to take the chances Swan does in wrestling with the abominable alligators nearly twice his own size.

Grace Courtland, billed as a psychic wonder, is put forward as a second feature. She gives a remarkable and entertaining exhibition of thought, transmission and mental telepathy. Her tests are calculated to puzzle even those who claim to know all about such things.

One may try in vain to find something to "roost" this week. It is not the case with Pantages, for in sending on a critic-proof bill and there can be nothing but praise for every act of this thoroughly good bill. Old Joe Hayden, the veteran actor and author of "A Hot Night in the Old Town" is no small part of the show, with a neat dramatic sketch, in which he is assisted by his daughter, female baritone. Lon Cox, a shadowgrapher, does some new stunts in his line. His pictures of people in the audience are clever. Burch and Burch are burnt cork comedians of the better class and keeps the laughter moving right merrily.

John Wilson sings "Down Where the Morning Glories Twine," and the biograph puts on a laughable farce, "A Horse of Another Color." This bill will be offered all week at the Fourth-street house.
