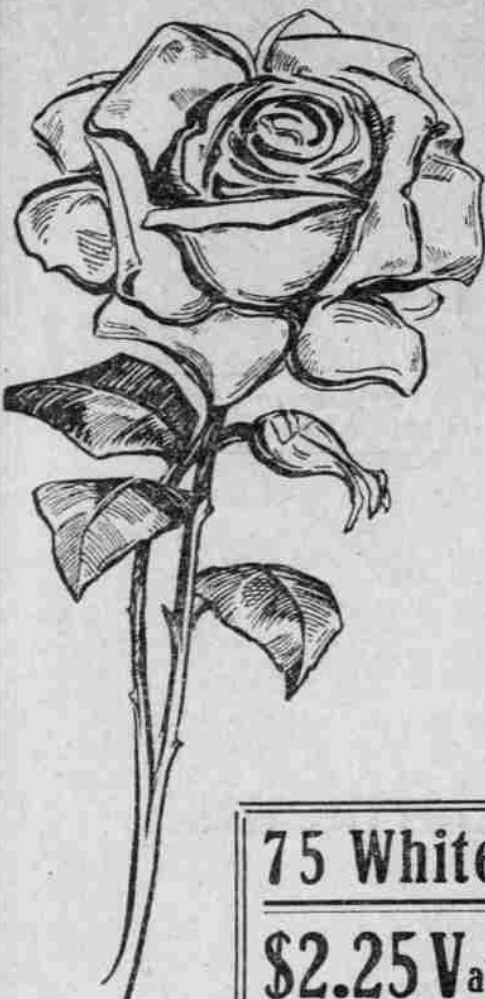

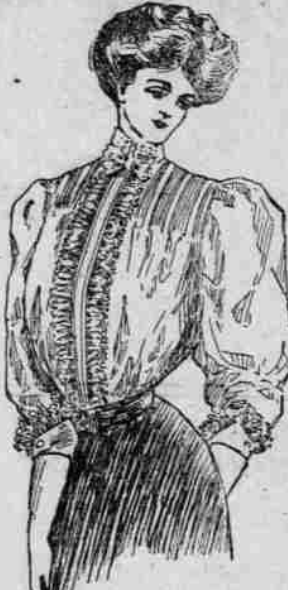

BACK UP ROOSEVELT

Republicans Want Continuation of His Policies.

WILLSON FOR GOVERNOR

Strength of Taft and Fairbanks Men About Evenly Divided, but No Actual Demonstration of Strength Is Permitted.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., June 19.—The Republicans of Kentucky in state convention tonight selected Augustus E. Willson, of Louisville, as their candidate for Governor, and adopted a platform without a dissenting vote. The contest between the adherents of Vice-President Fairbanks and Secretary of War Taft in committee was warm, but there was but one report, naming no candidate and merely expressing a preference for a candidate who would faithfully carry out President Roosevelt's policy.

Augustus E. Willson has been a resident of Louisville for many years, prominent in politics and at the bar. He has held numerous political offices.

The convention was called to order soon after noon today by R. P. Ernest, chairman of the state central committee. Judge W. H. Holt was chosen temporary chairman and ex-Governor W. O. Bradley was chosen permanent chairman.

Avoid Presidential Issue.
The indorsement of a Presidential candidate was the chief issue before the convention. At times the lines were sharply drawn between the Fairbanks and the Taft elements, and the selection of William E. Hart for temporary chairman was regarded as a victory for the anti-Taft element.

The first plank in the platform as introduced before the Kentucky Republican convention today serves as the vehicle for an endorsement of President Roosevelt's administrative policies, and an avoidance of a specific declaration in favor of any candidate for the Presidency. However, it is so worded as to be generally regarded as more favorable to Secretary of War Taft than anyone else. It is as follows:

We approve the policies and commend the ability, courage and integrity of President Roosevelt and his Administration and without expressing preference for any candidate, favor the selection by the National convention for President of one in full accord with those policies and who will energetically carry them out in the interests of all the people.

State Matters Chief Issue.
The foregoing is the only reference to National affairs made in the platform as introduced. The remainder is devoted to state affairs and promises election law reforms, condemn the political use of registration certificates, declares for publicity concerning campaign funds and contributions, demands a law re-districting the state in legislative, congressional and judicial districts, and a revision of the laws governing the common schools and reform in the management of charitable institutions.

The state railroad commission is condemned and the repeal of the law under which it was created is recommended.

Local option, next to honest elections, is the most important state issue touched upon and is treated as follows:

We favor the enactment and enforcement of a uniform local option law, applicable alike to every county in the state, with the county as the governing unit.

LAUNCH FOULED A HAWSER

Naval Board Investigates Fatal Disaster in Hampton Roads.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—Admiral Emory, commanding the fourth division, Atlantic fleet, arrived from Hampton Roads today with the report of the Naval Board of Investigation, which has been looking into the loss of the launch of the battleship Minnesota the night of June 18. The board found that the launch had fouled a steel hawser with which the big tug Cristoforo was towing a large carrying loaded freight car from Cape Charles to Norfolk.

No criminality is attached to the officers of the Cristoforo, who were in ignorance of the disaster.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—The inquiry into the loss of the Minnesota's launch, although closed as far as the Navy Department is concerned, will now be continued by General Uhler, Supervisor Inspector-General of Steam Vessels. His theory is that the accident was caused by the launch striking a heavy acetylene buoy.

Reynolds has two children by his first wife—John, aged 16, and Etta, aged 13. Both are bright, attractive and devoted to their father, and were quickly on hand to assist him when they heard of his trouble. John works at the bath-house and Etta at the Meier & Frank store. Reynolds married his present wife in Pueblo, Colo., four years ago, but states that prior to that time he knew her in Denver. Two years ago they removed to this city, where he engaged in the bath-house business. He is 64 years old and his wife is 30.

Reynolds was lodged in a cell of the City Jail, being held without bail, but no charge was booked against him. The District Attorney's representatives were engaged until late in the night in an effort to secure a statement from Professor Herbert. While at White's Pharmacy, he confirmed the statement of Mrs. Reynolds that he was to set her verses to music. Mrs. Reynolds was at the hospital last night to see the wounded man.

Herbert Well Known in Walla Walla
WALLA WALLA, Wash., June 19.—(Special.)—George H. Herbert was one of the best-known musicians in Walla Walla, where he has lived for the past three years. He came from Portland to this city and began playing in Laverne's Outdoor Theater and later took charge of the orchestra in the Star Theater. When the new Keylor Grand was erected two years ago Professor Herbert assumed control of the orchestra, which he directed until a week ago, when he left for Portland. He was formerly director of the Walla Walla Military Band. His wife is a trap drummer in a Seattle Theater. Herbert built a nice residence in this city, but his wife has never lived here.

Engine Blows Up; Three Killed.
FLORENCE, Colo., June 19.—The boiler of the locomotive drawing a westbound freight train on the Denver & Rio Grande blew up one mile east of Florence today, killing Engineer Thomas E. Wing and Fireman W. G. O'Brien and brakeman C. B. Gorch, all of Pueblo. The train was wrecked and the track torn up for several hundred feet.

AWED BY SOLDIERS

Winegrowers Permit Capture of Their Leader.

M. FERROUL IN CUSTODY

Ten Thousand Troops Occupy Narbonne—Populace Refuses to Shelter Cavalry Horses and Hoots at the Officers.

PARIS, June 19.—M. Ferroul, the striking Mayor of Narbonne, and next to Marcelin Albert, the most prominent figure in the winegrowers' revolt in the South of France, was arrested at his residence at Narbonne at 6:20 this morning and hurried away to Montpellier. Before daybreak all roads leading to M. Ferroul's house were held by cuirassiers in strong force. His bodyguard of winegrowers, among whom were many women, which had been nightly watching over the safety of their leader, was on duty as usual, but when the winegrowers found themselves surrounded by armed forces of the government they did not attempt any resistance. When M. Ferroul appeared in custody of a Police Commissioner, the crowd momentarily threatened a rescue, but the Mayor begged that there be no conflict with the troops, and he was placed in a carriage and, escorted by 150

cuirassiers, taken to the railroad station at Narbonne and started for Montpellier. Intense excitement prevails at Narbonne, but the people thus far have been overawed by the military display.

Troops Hunt Fugitives.
At Argilliers the state and police authorities, escorted by an imposing military force, raided the headquarters of the central committee of the winegrowers' organization at daybreak with warrants for the arrest of Marcelin Albert and the members of the central committee, but they found that the leader of the movement and several of his lieutenants had already fled. Only three committeemen were captured. They were sent to Montpellier. Strong forces of troops are scouring the country, hunting down the fugitives. The escape was facilitated by the fact that the people burned the bridge at the entrance of Argilliers last night, making a long detour necessary and delaying the arrival of the Government's representative.

Martial law is in full force in the vineyards of the South, and the government is hopeful that the display of strength which it is making will soon crush the incipient rebellion. Premier Clemenceau remained at the Ministry of the Interior all last night personally directing the procedure of his troops on the spot.

All telephone lines south have been seized for the exclusive use of the Ministry of the Interior, and they were kept busy all night. The arrest and removal of M. Ferroul from the immediate scene of his activity is regarded as important, as it is thought it will disintegrate the strike of the Mayors, for which he was held responsible. But for the rebellion of the municipalities, the government believes the movement would have ended as it began, in meetings of protest, as Albert did not contemplate civil anarchy when he started his crusade.

Late tonight Premier Clemenceau received grave news from the Midi, where

the exasperation of the people is increasing. Messages came indirectly via Lyons indicating that the wires had been cut. The principal center of disaffection, Narbonne, is now occupied by 16,000 troops, against whom the populace is greatly incensed, refusing to receive the cavalry horses in their stables, and hooting and pelting the officers, and in one instance burning a wagonload of forage on its way to the cavalry quarters.

Premier Clemenceau has as yet received no information regarding the arrest of Marcelin Albert, the leader of the disturbing element, and is inclined to believe that another of the leaders has been arrested by mistake in his stead.

SOLDIERS SENT AFTER MOB

Barricades Are Stormed and Demolished, Only to Be Replaced.

NARBONNE, France, June 19.—A mob in the outlying villages gathered tonight. They poured petroleum over the door of the sub-prefecture, which they set on fire, but were driven off after repeated charges by the troops. In the course of the fighting the manifestants fired revolvers, but no one was hit.

The disorder was augmented by the absence of lights, the mob having cut the electric cables. In other parts of the town, barricades were erected. These were stormed by the troops and torn down, only to be set up again by the rioters.

RECEIVE TROOPS WITH CLUBS

Stones and Bottles Thrown at the French Soldiers.

MONTPELLIER, France, June 19.—Serious rioting broke out here tonight, lasting all evening. The mob attempted to burn down the door of the prison and rescue the prisoners. The troops were turned out but were received with volleys of stones and bottles. Troopers were pulled off their horses and clubbed.

THE DAY'S DEATH RECORD

Was Close Friend of Lincoln.
BLOOMINGTON, Ill., June 19.—Colonel Thomas Snell, a millionaire banker and landowner, died today, aged 89. He was prominent in the Civil War and a close friend of President Lincoln.

Spanish Political Leader.
MADRID, June 19.—Senator Muro, an ex-Minister and head of the Republican minority in the Chamber, is dead.

How Lenses for Glasses Are Ground

If you have chanced to pass along by the Y. M. C. A. Bldg. on 4th and Yamhill, you will be more than repaid by taking a look into the display windows of J. D. Duback, Professional Optician, as you can see a model lens grinder in the window and just under this is the workshop which can be seen from the outside. The only place in the city where the passerby can see the grinding of lenses. On stepping into the Reception Room you will find it very tastefully arranged with comfortable chairs and the walls several eye charts which are self-explanatory, besides beautiful pictures which are restful to the eye, and you will always find some one prompt to wait in your chair in person. Dr. W. L. Smith, a graduate of M. D. from State University Medical College of Missouri, or Miss A. C. Silverwell.

Just in back to the right and left are the testing rooms, arranged so as to obtain the best results with all the latest mechanical appliances for the testing of the eyes. He always gives a written guarantee with the glasses, and you will find there an assortment of eyeglasses and frames that can be duplicated in all the combined optical places in the city, thereby being able to give a nosepiece that will be entirely satisfactory.

In back in the stock room, where lenses, frames, etc., are to be found and the combinations that he has are too numerous to mention. First comes the cut lenses that are all ready to be put in frames or Rimless Mountings. The lenses that are finished on both sides and only remain to be cut and edged to the particular shape, and the 3d, the lenses that are finished on one side and then to be ground on the other side, and last of all are the rough blanks that must be finished on all sides. Walking further on into the basement you will find a complete grinding plant that is well worth the time spent in seeing the same. It is the surface grinder, where the lenses are ground on three different emerys and then polished, taking hours of time. This is a very delicate work, as should the lens be broken it is to go through the same routine; next comes the cutting machine, which shapes the lenses. It has a very fine-pointed diamond cutter, and the lens is placed on the pattern and cut to the exact shape of the lens, then they are edged and the shape finished on Craghead stone similar to the ordinary grindstones, but of a very fine grade and specially imported from Germany. Mr. Duback has two of these special machines. Then comes the mounting of lenses, which is none the less delicate of the shop work, but Mr. Duback is well prepared in that case by having Mr. Downer, Mr. Corcoran and Harold Newcomb, who only do shop work. Mr. Duback has two other men besides the above mentioned, in all a force of seven men. He does both wholesale and retail, so should any one care to know about any of the delicate parts of making glasses it is well worth the while to visit his place, 173 4th, Y. M. C. A. bldg.
