

POURS OUT LOVE
ON MARK TWAINAll England Unites in Honoring
the Veteran American
Humorist.

BIRRELL VOICES FEELING

Great Banquet in London, at Which
He Is Hailed as Finest Living Au-
thor—Mark Twain's Char-
acteristic Reply.

LONDON, June 25.—The finest tribute which Mark Twain has received in England was the Pilgrim luncheon in his honor today, numbered 1300. Two notable speeches were made, that of Chief Secretary for Ireland Birrell, introducing Mark Twain, which was classic and full of humor, concluding with a tribute which brought the company to its feet with prolonged cheering, and Mr. Clemens' reply, which was largely humorous.

The presence of many members of Parliament was particularly complimentary as they were obliged to absent themselves from one of the most important and interesting debates of the season. There were only two toasts, "King Edward and the President of the United States," and "Our Guest, Mark Twain."

All Love Mark Twain.

Mr. Birrell, in proposing the latter toast, said that Samuel Clemens was known to all good minds as a humorist, a writer, a philosopher, and to all boys and girls who are good for anything, as Mark Twain. The dead author, he said, was a mighty army. They should not let the world of a thousand years hence think of Twain, but he was speaking for the men and women of today and their children, to say what Twain had been to them.

He remembered in 1887 buying a copy of "The Innocent Abroad." In the preface of which Twain was described as "the wild humorist of the Pacific Slope," and the "Moralist of the Main," but the author had proved to be an influence dissipating national influence and would leave the world richer than he found it.

Humor and Sentiment Mixed.

Mr. Clemens, replying, said that Mr. Birrell had touched very lightly upon his position as a moralist. He was glad to be recognized as such because he had been since he had been in England. When he came here, he said, he saw a placard announcing that "Mark Twain Arrives" and "The Ascent Cup is Stolen," and he had no doubt that his character had suffered thereby. He was quite sincere in his protest, as he never got the cup because he never had a chance to get it.

Yet in a similar bantering mood he told story after story, until, becoming very serious, he pathetically referred to the loss of his daughter. Concluding, he said: "I have received since arriving hundreds and hundreds of letters from the conditions of people in England. There is complaint and praise in them; but above all there is the note of affection; and affection is the most precious reward man can desire, whether for character or achievement."

"The letters make me feel that in England, as in America, I am not a stranger, not an alien, but at home."

CARLOS MAY LOSE HIS THRONE
Despotism Arouses Wave of Democ-
racy in Portugal.

LONDON, June 25.—A correspondent of the Tribune says in a letter mailed from Lisbon, June 19, that King Carlos' throne is in imminent danger of being swept away by the wave of a great democratic wave, swollen suddenly to dangerous proportions by the act of despotism which he permitted on May 1.

NINETY DROWNED IN WRECK
Only One Survivor of Steamer Santi-
ago in Chile.

SANTIAGO, Chile, June 25.—It is officially announced by the Pacific Steam Navigation Company that there was only one passenger aboard the Santiago, wrecked in a heavy gale 50 miles north of Corral, and he was drowned. The only survivor was the fourth officer. All the rest of the crew, numbering 90 and including 12 English officers, are said to have perished. Only one boat was launched and it was dashed to pieces upon the rocks after drifting for several days.

Japanese Miners on Rampage.
VICTORIA, B. C., June 25.—Following the recent labor trouble at the Asper Commis mines and Muroan collieries, serious occurrences are reported at the Ishii copper mines, near Myanashita, Japan. Ten thousand miners have burned mine buildings, destroyed much property, killed the chief of police at Suimoto and attacked a regiment of soldiers sent to quell the rioting. The miners armed themselves with rifles and ammunition taken from the mining company's magazine, which they destroyed. Dynamite cartridges were also used by the rioters. Many scenes of violence were enacted and a number of fatalities have been reported. Ring leaders of the strike movement are said to be in the city, alleged to have fomented the trouble at the Ashe mine. Damage estimated at over \$1,000,000 has been done to the mine.

Franco-Spanish Agreement.
PARIS, June 25.—The official text of the Franco-Spanish understanding was published today. It declares each government is firmly resolved to maintain intact its insular and maritime possessions in the Mediterranean and Atlantic and binds each country in the event of

circumstances arising which tend to modify the status quo to consult the other with a view to "common action."

Urges Rejection of Treaty.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 25.—Advices were received by the Emperor of Japan from Tokyo that Yamashita Otakichi, of Seattle, who with Yamada, of San Francisco, is in Japan arousing public opinion against the United States with regard to the San Francisco affair, in an interview with Viscount Hayashi, Foreign Minister, urged the adoption of proposals that Japan reject the American-Japanese treaty mutually restricting immigration; that the latter part of article 2 of the commercial treaty be deleted when the treaty is revised in 1909, this passage being that the stipulations of the article shall not affect "the laws, ordinances and regulations in regard to immigrants and other matters that are in force or may hereafter be enacted in either of the two countries," and that Commissioners should be sent to California by the Tokyo government to investigate the matter on the spot.

Venezuelan Cabinet Resigns.

CARACAS, June 22 (via Willemstad, Island of Curacao, June 25).—The Cabinet resigned today, owing to the action of Congress in condemning the policy of the Ministry of Finance. The heads of the departments are transacting the government business.

Mauds Makes London Laugh.

LONDON, June 25.—Cyril Maude tonight produced "The Earl of Parnham" at the Playhouse, he himself playing the Earl most effectively. The play was received with roars of laughter, and there is every sign that it will have a successful run.

Earthquake in Curacao.

CARACAS, June 25, via Willemstad, Island of Curacao, June 25.—A strong earthquake shock lasting three seconds, was felt in the Federal districts at 1:15 A. M. yesterday. No damage was done.

Called Back From Death

SON'S VOICE HEARD BY MOTHER
IN DYING HOUR.

Priest Tells of Parent's Revivifica-
tion When Apparently Beyond
Recovery.

DENVER, Colo., June 25.—(Special.)—Drawn back from the portals of death by her beloved son, Rev. Percy A. Phillips, aged Mrs. W. J. Phillips, of Denver, B. C., was resuscitated after her heart had ceased to beat. Physicians had pronounced her dead a few moments before Father Phillips burst into the room where his mother lay. He had come across half a continent in response to a telegram telling of her illness to see her before she died.

"Too late," burst from his lips as he entered the room where his mother lay apparently cold in death. The words reached the ears upon which death had not quite put its seal. The stilled heart began to beat sluggishly, then faster, the wrinkled eyelids fluttered, opened and the mother brought back from death smiling feebly upon her son.

"I heard you and came back," she murmured. "I wanted to die until I heard your voice. I was dead then, just floating out and out, when I heard your voice and came back."

From that time on Mrs. Phillips recovered rapidly and when her son left her to return to Denver she was well on the road to recovery. Mrs. Phillips is 84 years old which makes her return to life still more wonderful. She suffered from indigestion which affected the heart. The white-haired mother had not seen her son for several years.

"It was a miracle," declared Father Phillips, who has just reached Denver. "My mother was dead when I arrived. There had been absolute cessation of the heart beats a few minutes before, but when I spoke, life came into her cold body. She declared it was the sound of my voice that brought her back to life. When I left Vancouver she was able to sit up and though not entirely recovered, is well on the road to it."

"I had not seen my mother for years. They said before she died she was anxious to see me."

Father Phillips is chancellor of the Denver Catholic diocese.

REBELS IN WAR OFFICE
Revolutionary Group Uncaptured in
Ministry's Department.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 25.—The police last night searched a department of the War Ministry and found in it the headquarters of one of the revolutionary groups. The building was surrounded by police during the search, but only one arrest was made. Much incendiary literature was found. The authorities have made every effort to prevent the publication and circulation of the manifestos of the Deputies of the Social Revolutionists and Group of the Peasants, which were printed surreptitiously on the presses of the Official Messenger.

REBELS SWINDLE BIG BANK
Draw Over \$50,000 on Forged
Checks in Siberia.

VLADIVOSTOK, June 25.—The Russo-Chinese Bank handed out \$36,500 today on a forged check. The man to whom the payment was made escaped.

HARBIN, June 25.—A revolutionist disguised as an officer of the frontier guards today drew \$19,000 from the Russo-Chinese Bank on a forged check and decamped.

URGE RESISTANCE BY FORCE
Revolutionists Attack Emperor in
Manifesto on Douma.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 25.—The Social Revolutionists and Group of Total members of the late Parliament, numbering 129 Deputies, yesterday issued their anticipated manifesto summoning the people to continue by force the struggle for land, liberty and popular representation. The documents, which proclaim that Parliament perished for defending the people's rights, are remarkable for the fact that the Emperor for the first time is attacked by name for breach of peace, the revolutionary parliamentarians having heretofore attributed all sins to the governing class owing to the lingering sentiment of loyalty to the Emperor among the peasant masses.

The manifesto is regarded as being second Viennese addresses, but they lack the authority given to the latter by the participation of an influential party, the Constitutional Democrats.

The Social Democratic members of the late Parliament did not issue a manifesto, being unable to obtain the assent of their Parliamentary committee, most of whom are now in prison. 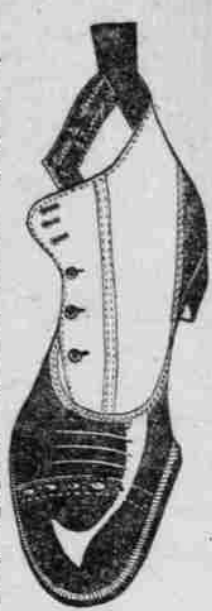
